It is sad to report the sudden death of EDWARD BINGHAM of Much Birch on 26th. March, at the age of 83 years. Edward and his wife, Joyce, came to live here some 30 years ago. He retired from the day to day running of his business near Birmingham but continued as a member of the Board. Edward and Joyce became good friends with the late David Enoch and Mary and the late Pat and Cliff Farmer. Edward was a committee member of the gardening club and was its treasurer for the first three years. He continued to collate and distribute seed orders for a further 4 years. He was a member of Probus in Hereford until the time of his death. His funeral service took place on 26th. March at Hereford Crematorium and was conducted by Canon Richard Bolland. Tributes were given by his daughter, Susan, and grandson, Matthew. Susan gave thanks for her parent's guidance throughout her life and the encouragement to study to obtain good educational qualifications and the ethic of hard work. Matthew recalled the playful nature and good humour of his grandfather and that he was always interested in their academic and sporting achievements. Edward will be sadly missed by a wide circle of friends and particularly by Joyce, his daughters, Susan and Elaine, and

their families to whom we send our sincere condolences.

The funeral service for TREVOR WILSON of Orchard End, Tump Lane, took place on 9th April at Much Birch Church and was conducted by the Rev. Mark Johnson. These notes are taken from the Rector's address. Trevor was born in Kerry, Newtown, Wales in 1922. He was one of 4 children in the family and recalled going to school in a pony and trap. At the age of 14, he left school and went to work on his parents' farm. During WW2, he served in the Home Guard while continuing to work on the farm. Moving out from Wales during the war, he went to work on a farm with a friend near Highley in Shropshire. Just after the end of the war, he met Edna, who had been serving in ATS. Edna came from the Stainforth, near Doncaster and so when they married in 1947 it was to Yorkshire they went to start married life and Trevor embarked on gamekeeping. Having worked in Nottinghamshire for a while, Trevor and Edna were blessed with the arrival of 2 children. June born in 1950 and Roy born in 1952 and the family then moved to Oakwood, Kidderminster. In the early 1960's, they moved again to work for Sir Charles Clore on the Shenmore Estate shoot in the Golden Valley. The children completed their education at Kingstone High School and then June went into secretarial work, before going on to work with educationally challenging pupils and Roy went to Wiggin to do engineering before becoming a project manager in the oil and gas industry.

The shoot at Shenmore went from strength to strength under Trevor's management and he completed 40 years service in this role. When retirement beckoned, Trevor refused to go quietly and he kept on working well past normal retirement age partly because he loved his work and partly because

he was always happy out of doors with nature, come rain or sun. Meanwhile, 3 grandchildren had been born, and Trevor and Edna delighted in their progress as they watched them grow, change and take university courses and were proud of their achievements. Trevor and Edna sold their cottage which had been given to them by Sir Charles, having worked hard to renovate it, and in 1995 moved to the bungalow at the top of Tump which gave Lane. them а view wonderful over the countryside and a blessing for Edna's knees with no stairs with which to cope.

They settled а life into of gardening, whist drives and continued their support of Hereford United, through thick and thin. Over the last 18 months or so, Trevor's health gradually deteriorated and after several spells in hospital he died peacefully on 22nd March. Edna had given him the utmost care and we send to her and the family our deepest sympathy.

Well known local solicitor, GARY DAVIES, sadly passed away on 6th. April following a lengthy illness. Gary was born in Brecon in 1934 and was one of 3 brothers, who all studied at Pembroke College, Cambridge. Before university, he did his National; Service with the Devonshire Regiment. On his return, he joined a legal practice in Brecon and after a few years, the town clerk's moved to department in Newport, where he qualified as a solicitor. Gary came to Hereford in 1962 to join the late Sam Beaumont in his practice and partner then became а in Beaumont, Smith and Davies in Offa Street. He married Jenny (nee Page) and they were blessed over the years, with the arrival of Guy, Jessica and Rowena. Gary enjoyed fishing and shooting and always kept Welsh Springer Spaniel dogs. He was a friend of the late Basil Mullins and they had many days in the Aconbury shoot during the

season, usually finishing up at the Castle Inn. He was a Freemason and former chairman of the Hereford Conservative Association. He was a good friend to Little Birch Village Hall and drew up the first constitution, free of charge. He will be very sadly missed by a wide circle of friends and some 250 joined the family for his funeral service at Christ Church, Llanwarne on Tuesday, 13th. April, which was conducted by Rev. David Johnson. We extend to Jenny and the family our deepest sympathy.

It is good to report that MARILYN KAYE-ALLEN, AMBER and EWAN are now back at home from hospital after their horrific accident on the M6, when their car was crushed by a lorry. All of them suffered severe injuries with Amber being cared for in Nottingham and the others in Birmingham. Thankfully, they are all recovering well although mother in law, MRS. ALLEN, is still in Selly Oak Hospital having sustained broken limbs and ribs as well as injuries to her spine. We send our good wishes to them all.

Press Release

The Much Birch Hall Management Committee is pleased to announce that during the next few months, construction work will commence on the building of a new resource/meeting room to the south-west side of the Community Hall. The development is possible because it will be part funded by grants from Herefordshire Council **Community Building Capital Grant** Scheme and 'Welcome to Our Future', an organisation dedicated to sustainable development, which Severn Waste manages the Environmental Fund in Worcestershire and Herefordshire. Matched funding was raised by a number of fund-raising events organised by members of the Hall Management Committee such as the 100 Hundred Club and choir concerts etc The Halfway Theatre Group also donated £500 for which we are extremely grateful.

The Committee has recognised a need for this addition for some time and it will add to the other developments and improvements which have taken place during the last three to four years. The provision of this new room will enhance facilities for the Resource Centre and will meet a need for an additional meeting place for small group activities.

The last few years have seen improvements to the car park which is provided for the users of the hall, to the pavement outside of the hall, alteration to the driveway to the adjacent Rectory as well as a ramp constructed to the rear of the building in order to give easier access to the grassed amenity area. In addition the heating boiler was replaced and relocated, insulation in the roof space was upgraded and redecoration was carried out to these some areas. A11 improvements required great effort Management bv the Hall Committee in putting the schemes together with the overall objective of providing a more welcoming and comfortable environment for the benefit of the community. MB Hall Car Park

During the construction work to the hall, there will be reduced parking spaces for users of the hall, although every effort will be made by the contractors to ensure that there will be as little disruption as possible in order to maintain the continuity of the hall's activities. Car drivers are requested NOT to park their vehicles on the pavement outside of the hall for the following reasons:

- It results in inconvenience and danger to pedestrians walking to residences beyond the hall
- Impedes free flow of vehicles, including large commercial lorries and emergency vehicles
- Causes damage to the pavement, underlying drainage pipes and manhole covers

Court Farm have once again very kindly agreed to allow limited alternative car parking in the vicinity of Court Farm packing house, which is approximately 50 metres past the frontage of the hall. The Hall Management Committee would appreciate car driver's forbearance and co-operation during this time.

Neighbourhood Watch Crime Trends

Catalytic converters have been stolen from vehicles at garage premises at Callow. The offenders have been using pipe cutters to remove the items. When taken from the vehicles they usually target 4x4's as they are easier to get under. Catalytic converters have also been stolen from garage premises at Orcop. The value of scrap metal is starting to creep back up which makes it more attractive to steal.

A heifer was stolen sometime between January and the end of March from a farmyard at Wormbridge.

Animal and Wildlife crime

Within the last month there have been reports of both sheep worrying and wildlife crime in the area. At Dinedor a number of sheep were killed and others injured by dogs which had been left to roam on their own. This is quite distressing for the farmer and also has financial consequences.

Remember that if you allow your dog to roam and it is seen attacking sheep, the farmer has the right to shoot the dog.

In the Golden Valley area there have been reports of Buzzards being shot, this is an offence under the Wildlife Act. If you see any incidents of this nature please report them to the police.

Results

Grow Your Own Security

West Mercia Police is urging greenfingered residents to help weed out garden crime by reviewing and improving their garden and shed security. Although we are in a lowcrime area, around 1,500 shed burglaries occur across the force area every year, with the spring time having a seasonal spike.

Many people leave expensive equipment in poorly secured sheds and garages, which are easy pickings for the opportunist thief. Later this month, thousands of seed packets will be distributed, packed not only with seeds but also loads of good advice on how to protect your garden equipment.

Most of the measures that you can take are quite simple. For example, if you have expensive lawnmowers and power tools, don't leave them in a shed when you could put them in a brick-built garage with better locks and security.

If you do want to increase the security around your shed, you can ensure you have a good padlock, hasp and staple on the door and that hinges don't have the screws showing - otherwise they'll remove the screws and hinges to open the door. You can also consider purchasing a small shed alarm which will activate, either on the opening of the door or on detecting movement in the shed. These are reasonably cheap and found in DIY stores.

You can also use plants to protect your belongings. Consider using thorny hedging and prickly plants to deter burglars from entering the property and getting close to windows or drainpipes. Good external lighting can also put thieves off, who prefer not to be seen.

Don't give thieves a helping hand either. Make sure tools and other valuable items are locked away and not left lying around the garden. Ensure ladders are locked up and not handy for criminals to make use of. You can also property-mark your items, either by putting your postcode on them by etching or using paint or consider using a UV pen or UV chemical solution such as Smartwater or SelectaDNA.

Leaflets entitled "Tips To Nip Garden Crime In The Bud" will shortly be available from your local policing teams or at selected garden centres around the county. The brochure will be very useful advice on how to reduce garden and shed crime and keep your property even safer.
