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### ***A Note of Thanks.***

John Bryant would like to sincerely thank all those who sent cards and goodwill messages during his recent treatment at Cheltenham. So many friends kindly offered transport but fortunately, I was able to drive during the 5 week trips although 2 friends kindly took me when procedures involving some anaesthetic took place and to them I am profoundly grateful.

As I had no symptoms of Prostate Cancer and men are usually reluctant to seek medical tests, I urge all men over 50 to ask for a PSA blood test so that the condition can be detected early, when it can be easily treated. If left too late, the effects can be very painful and treatment options can be limited.

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### ***Are You a Carer?***

If you look after and support a relative or friend who could not manage on their own, you are. There are support groups who meet on a monthly basis. There are free specialist courses from safe moving & handling to managing challenging behaviour and there is a Newsletter giving details of local interests & updating carers concessions. You can find out about the Lions Scheme or the Careline Carers' Card whereby, should anything go wrong, the person for whom you are caring will have their needs met. The comforting thing to remember is that you are not alone. You can register with your local Hereford Carers' Group by telephoning Rachel on 01432 356068. By so doing you will get help, support and access to their services. Registration is free.

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### ***Neighbourhood Watch***

#### ***Crime trends***

Overnight on 12<sup>th</sup> /13<sup>th</sup> August 3 large gates and a cattle crush were stolen from a farm at **Wormbridge**. They were later found on land at Llanrothal near Monmouth, along with a trailer that had been stolen from nearby at the same time.

Overnight on 17<sup>th</sup>/18<sup>th</sup> , 4 hubcaps were stolen from a motorhome parked on an industrial site at Callow.

Overnight on 22<sup>nd</sup> /23<sup>rd</sup> , a large quantity of used catalytic converters were stolen from a breakers yard near Hereford.

Overnight on 24<sup>th</sup> /25<sup>th</sup> a Stihl chainsaw and disc cutter were stolen from a vehicle parked in a driveway in St Weonards.

Overnight on 12<sup>th</sup>/13<sup>th</sup> September a quantity of red diesel was stolen from a farm at Broad Oak. However, the farmer found most of it stored in 200 litre drums that were hidden in a bush and covered with twigs at the end of the farm drive, it would appear they were ready for collection.

The farm was later visited by a green Peugeot 405 Estate, M55\*MWL, when challenged, the occupants, who spoke in a Welsh accent, were enquiring about shooting on the farm. It is possible (probable even!) that they were returning to collect the fuel.

A house was burgled at Dewsall on **Friday 10<sup>th</sup> September** between 10.00am and 11.30 am, and a laptop and TV were stolen. The thieves entered the rural property by breaking a rear ground floor window.

#### ***Suspicious incidents***

On the morning of 27<sup>th</sup> August an elderly resident in St Weonards was visited by 3 males in two vehicles offering tarmac services. They gave the usual story of working nearby and having some spare tarmac left. They had a black van, with some writing on it, and on the rear a strip saying 'Highway Maintenance'. There was also a truck carrying tarmac, towing a roller. The men were wearing high visibility jackets, and were 40-50 in age. If you have seen or heard anything about this, or any other cold callers, please let us know. Fortunately, the lady called a nearby relative who came along and sent the men on their way, other elderly people may not be so switched on and end up with a very bad job and a very large bill.

#### ***Can you help?***

**Allensmore** - a red Nissan Sunny vehicle had been left in a layby on the B4348 near Allensmore Nurseries for a few days last week as it had broken down. Between 8.15pm and 8.35pm someone attempted to steal this vehicle, but for some reason was unsuccessful and abandoned it in the middle of the road. Bearing in mind that it was by then dark, and raining hard, and on a bend, this could have had serious consequences had it not been for a member of the public remaining with the vehicle with his hazard lights on until police arrived. Somehow, during the attempted theft, the vehicle was severely damaged on both sides, as if it had been hit by another car, but there were no reports

of an accident. Did you pass that way that evening and maybe saw something? Any information would be very useful.

**Kingstone** - on 27th August, just after 12 noon, a tractor towing a trailer collided with a green Renault Clio in the lane between Cockyard and Kingstone, at Barrow Common. The car was heading towards Kingstone, and the Tractor towards Cockyard. The tractor did not stop after the collision, which left the lady needing hospital treatment. The driver of the red tractor was elderly, he did speak to the lady, saying it was her fault, and then left the scene without giving any details. Any information regarding this would be very helpful

### **Crime Prevention**

**Distraction burglary - free stickers**  
Distraction burglary is an unpleasant crime and the force is committed to reducing the number of offences that take place. A door sticker is available, which can be distributed within communities - particularly to elderly and vulnerable residents - to remind them not to open the door if they are not expecting or do not recognise the person, and to let callers know that they are not welcome without an appointment. We have had a few reports of a male calling himself Alan King phoning businesses and farms stating that he is the local community police officer, and asking them to contribute financially towards a community magazine. He gets quite rude and aggressive when challenged, or if the person he has called states they are not interested. If you have had a similar call, please let us know.

We have received the following message from Worcestershire Trading Standards - this is off our area, but well worth being aware of" Doorstep Callers Operating Worcestershire Regulatory Services are warning residents to be on their guard after an incident in the Wyre Forrest area of the county where unsolicited callers offered to carryout driveway repairs.

The works carried out were unsatisfactory and there were concerns over pricing for the job. Initial prices

quoted increased once the job had been finished.

The callers did not provide the legally required cancellation notice. If this notice is not provided then the contract cannot be enforced against the consumer (you do not have to pay). There is also an offence for failing to provide the cancellation notice.

The law allows a householder a seven day cooling off period on all contracts agreed in the home (above £35). A trader must provide a specific notice detailing your rights to cancel. If any works are started within the cooling off period the trader must get written permission from the householder and provide a warning that if the contract is cancelled from that point then a consumer will have to pay a reasonable amount for any works that have been done.

The law allows a consumer a cooling off period to ensure that they are not pressured into buying goods or services in their home. Failure to provide cancellation rights is a serious offence. Householders should always get three quotes before agreeing to any services.

### **Rural Crime prevention**

Across Herefordshire division we have seen a rise in rural thefts over the last couple of weeks, which is a timely reminder for us all not to rest on our laurels when it comes to crime prevention.

- Never leave keys for any cars, tractors, quad bikes etc with the vehicle.
- Always lock gates for fields/drives and properties when not in use, remember you can invert hinges to gates to deter would be thieves.
- If you are able, lock any metal items away out of sight, (this is due to the increasing value of scrap metal).
- Never leave high value items on show at any time throughout the day, especially if you are away working in other parts of your property.
- Mark your property with a property marking solution such as SmartWater

If you think a vehicle is acting suspiciously, take the registration and call us on 0300 333 3000 to report it. This helps us to see who is travelling

around on our patch, enabling us to disseminate the information to our rural watch members and other local schemes. In most cases a simple PNC (Police National Computer) check can determine the drivers personal details and address, if that isn't the case, further checks can be carried out by ourselves to establish any previous dealings. Officers can be dispatched at any time while these checks are being carried out. Never think that reporting suspicious vehicles or people would waste our time, we want to deter any would be thieves and there is no better way than officers stopping vehicles to have a 'chat'.

Last year we had a number of thefts of staddle stones and garden ornaments reported across rural Shropshire. In the last few weeks we have received reports of the theft of staddle stones and stone planters and troughs from a number of locations in Shrewsbury. And lately a report of a theft of large stones from a driveway in the Alveley area of Bridgnorth. These are not yet in our area but it is good to be vigilant. These thefts are occurring overnight and due to the weight of items being stolen at least two persons with a vehicle are likely to be involved. It is unlikely that the thieves are being opportunist and it is more likely they are spotting targets during the day and returning at night. In one incident it was reported that a 4x4 vehicle with two males had been seen in the area earlier in the day. Please keep a look out for suspicious callers in your area, suspicious vehicles in your area or anyone delivering flyers for gardening or maintenance services and call us as soon as you can with any details we can check out.

### **Banking Scam**

Currently there is an alleged scam circulating, householders are being telephoned by someone claiming to be from the Council suggesting that they are due a Council Tax refund following a reduction in their Council Tax Band. The caller is then asking for Bank account details so that the refund can be made to them. It is a blatant scam to obtain Bank account details. **If you receive such a call, please let us know on 0300 333 3000 or in an emergency 999**

### **Another Scam**

The following information has been received from Shropshire Ringmaster:- There has recently been an email "scam

warning" circulating regarding the use of children's car seats, complete with "dummy child" strapped in, left "abandoned" on the side of the road to stop motorists so that "gangs" can then commit crimes against the driver. As far as can be established this "warning" is completely bogus and should be disregarded. It appears that the message originated from the USA. There are no known incidents even vaguely along these lines in the West Mercia area, and it is doubtful if this has happened at all anywhere else - it was probably written by someone with an overactive imagination, as many of these "warnings" are. For future reference, as mentioned before, it is worth visiting [www.hoax-slayer.com](http://www.hoax-slayer.com) if/when you receive such a "scam warning" as many are hoaxes. Whilst West Mercia cannot vouch for the accuracy of the information on that website, it is probably a good starting point when trying to establish if a scam warning is genuine.

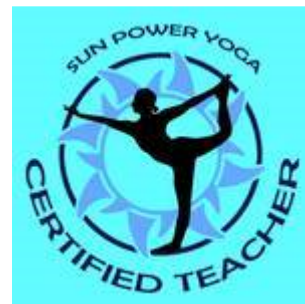

If you want to keep the joints oiled, the wrinkles at bay and the toes within sight, perhaps Yoga could suit
