Twitter is a real-time information network that connects you to the latest stories, ideas, opinions and news about what you find interesting. Simply find the accounts you find most compelling and follow the conversations. At the heart of Twitter are small bursts of information called Tweets. Each Tweet is 140 characters long, but don’t let the small size fool you—you can discover a lot in a little space. You can see photos, videos and conversations directly in Tweets to get the whole story at a glance, and all in one place. You don’t have to build a web page to surf the web, and you don’t have to tweet to enjoy Twitter. Whether you tweet 100 times a day or never, you still have access to the voices and information surrounding all that interests you. You can contribute, or just listen in and retrieve up-to-the-second information.

Much Birch and Little Birch Parish Councils have joined together to provide this service to their parishioners, which will be in addition to the newsletter. By its very nature, Twitter is instant, so local news stories can be publicised immediately, without waiting for the newsletter to be published. However, if you want to join in and add your own comments, you will have to set up your own account. If you want to publicise your own local event, simply add @lbmbinfo to your Tweet so that it can be circulated to interested parties.

Local News

It is sad to report the death of GEOFFERY PRIME of Wormelow, a few weeks before his 85th. birthday. Geoff. was born in Stroud, the son of a Vicar, who later

took charge of the Church at Lydbrook when Geoff was in his early teens. In Lydbrook, he was befriended by Pat Mann, who eventually became his brother-in-law. At the funeral service at the Crematorium on 1st November conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson, it was fitting that Pat, a lifelong friend, gave the eulogy. As teenagers they both loved music, particularly jazz, and the old black and white films with all the glamorous stars, such as Hede Le Marr. Geoff loved cricket, playing as a fast bowler and was a good tennis player where his height gave him a great advantage at the net. He did extremely well at school and went to Bristol University from where he graduated in French in 1948. He was appointed to teach at Long Eaton, Nottinghamshire and in 1957, married Val whom he had first met when she was 15. A vacancy for a French teacher at Ross Grammar School was advertised in 1959 and Geoff was successful in obtaining this appointment. They moved to Tump Lane where in due time Richard, Alison and John were born. When Ross Grammar School closed, Geoff taught at John Kyrle High School and became Vice-Principal, but had to retire on health grounds in 1985, having given 25 years of teaching service in Ross.

A keen sportsman in his younger days, he was associated with Wormelow Cricket Club for many years and gave much encouragement to Richard and John who, in turn, played for many seasons at the club. Geoff had a fine record of service to the community both as a member of Much Birch Parish Council and Much Birch Parochial Church Council. He also administered the Much Birch charities and served on the board of governors at Much Birch School. Sadly, Val died just over 2 years ago after 53 years of marriage and this was a bitter blow to Geoff as he had suffered a stroke a few years before and Val had given him her utmost care. He suffered another stroke a few months ago and was treated at Ross Community Hospital, but died in the County Hospital on Oct. 20th. Donations in memory of Geoff were given to Ross Community Hospital. We extend our sincere sympathy to Richard, Alison, John and grandchildren, Sarah and Georgina. He will be greatly missed by many friends, neighbours and former pupils.

The sudden death of JUNE LEWIS of Hollybush Lane was a shock to family and friends alike as she was due to be taken by neighbours to a coffee morning that day. Her funeral service at a packed Much Birch Church was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson from whose address, these notes are given.

June was born at Llansteffan, near Carmarthen, on 13th. June 1927 and was the oldest of 5 children, her father

being an auctioneer and her mother a district nurse. June attended the local school and set her sights on becoming a nurse. When she was 14, she spotted a local lad riding his cycle with a dog running as fast as it could alongside.

June was so incensed that she told the lad exactly what she thought of him and of course that young man was Noel Lewis. They started courting and while Noel trained to be a teacher, that career was put on hold as he was called up into the RAF. June came to Hereford to start nursing but missed her family so much that she returned home without completing the course. When Noel came home, they were married in Llansteffan in 1949 and his first teaching post was in London but they lived on the western outskirts, near Kew Gardens. The family increased to three when Susan was born in 1951 and Jane arrived in 1954. Noel was well established as a respected teacher and the opportunity came for a move to Goodrich School. This was a sad period for the family as their third daughter, Sarah, was born with a split spine. With June's love and care, she lived for 18 months, much longer than expected.

Noel meanwhile, had been appointed head at Little Dewchurch, so the family moved there and Sarah is buried in the churchyard. This sad loss was partially healed by the arrival of Carol in 1958, which meant that June's love and energy had a new outlet.

In 1964, Noel succeeded the late Miss Frances Lawrence, as head of Much Birch School and Alison was born in 1966. The head teacher's house was usually integral with the school and often lacked many amenities. Noel oversaw the building of the new school, which was opened in 1966. The family then rented the old school house and classrooms for a few years, but later purchased them. June could make any house a home and with Noel, transformed the building into a real family home.

With all the children at school, June worked for a while in the radiology department at the County Hospital and then became school secretary for some 5 years. Noel retired in 1984 after 20 years of inspirational teaching at the school. They moved in time to Far End in Hollybush Lane, where they enjoyed great times with visits from the family and the growing grandchildren, Matt, Ben, Nick, Isobel and Angus. June, meanwhile, enjoyed a busy social life with the WI and Probus and rediscovered her artistic talents in painting and flower arranging in addition to her dressmaking and cookery skills.

Naturally, music played a large part in the family life with Noel and June both playing the piano and encouraging their daughters to take up several

instruments. Many former pupils at MB School have expressed their thanks that Noel, with others, introduced music and singing and taught them with great enthusiasm.

Noel and June were great friends with Douglas and Peggy Manning and their family and also the Millers at Rosslea.

June did not speak fluent Welsh but certainly understood it and this proved useful in discussions with Noel when they did not wish the children to understand what they were talking about. After some 16 years of retirement, Noel's health began to decline and June gave him her utmost care, although they could not get out and about so frequently. Noel sadly died in 2004 after 55 years of marriage and although devastated by her loss, June did not give up and continued to attend MB Church, the WI, Flicks in the Sticks and Evergreen outings with the help of many friends as well as delivering Meals on Wheels.

Her sudden passing on 24th October followed the death the previous day of Matt, the eldest grandson, has been a double tragedy for the family.

Noel had written many poems throughout his life and one of them,

'One Life, One Love', was read at June's funeral service by the Rev. Preb. Kay Garlick.

Donations in memory of June were given to 'Shine'- the Spina Bifida Charity and Much Birch Church and we send our heartfelt condolences to Susan, Jane, Carol and Alison and their families.

The death is also announced of Mrs. Maisy Powell, erstwhile of Tump Lane. Her funeral service takes place on Nov. 20th at St. Davids, Much Dewchurch and further details will be given later.

Andrew Holley was badly injured in a serious motorcycle accident some months ago and is currently being treated at Oswestry. This is a bitter blow to the family as his brother, Stephen, died just a year ago. We send our best wishes to Andy, wife Katy and mother Eileen.

Update

The four males that were arrested in the layby outside

Bredwardine on 8th November that had been involved with offering tarmac services were all released without charge later the same day, after having been interviewed by Trading Standards Officers.

This is however, not to say that they were legitimate, but they are the 'monkeys' and Trading Standards are after the 'organ grinder'!

The male they are after is the one that went round touting for work in the area, we know who he is and we have supplied Trading Standards with the contact details of several residents who have been visited by this male and are willing to make statements. Once all the evidence has been gathered, it is the intention of the TS officers to arrest and charge this male with offences relating to false representation. If you have been visited by this male offering to lay tarmac, saying he is with Amey, and have not yet reported it, please get in touch if you are happy for Trading Standards to make contact with you.

The male in question has already been in prison for similar offences committed in Devon. He has registered his company as Amey Roadworks, which unfortunately is legitimate, but obviously the sole reason he has done this is to mislead people! He will give out business cards with that name on, which also gives people the false impression that **he can be trusted.**

I doubt they will be in this area again for a while, but please let us know if they are!

At least we lost them a days 'work' and a lorry load of tarmac by keeping them in custody all day!

The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam:

A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 DO NOT call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize. If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £315 for the phone call. If you do receive a card with these details, then please contact Royal Mail Fraud on 020 7239 6655 or the Police on 101.

Our dog "Bailey" was set upon by an aggressive Dalmatian breed of dog near the perimeter of the woods. In a frantic bid to evade his aggressor "Bailey" ran (with the Dalmatian in hot pursuit) the length of the main lane from Aconbury woods down to the main road at Kingsthorpe near the Thorn bus shelter. By the time my wife made it to the road our dog was nowhere to be seen.

So began a traumatic 10 hours of searching for "Bailey" around all our regular walking routes. Our dog is chipped and tagged so we informed the relevant authorities that our dog was missing. Thankfully, at around 11.00pm that night we were reunited with "Bailey" near the Thorn bus shelter. Remarkably, our dog was in good health – he was clean, dry and warm which makes us wonder if someone in the area had taken him in during this time. If this was the case we would like to extend our thanks to the person/ persons who looked after him. We would also like to thank all our neighbours and fellow dog walkers who were supportive and kept a look out for "Bailey".

To the owners of the Dalmatian we would like to say that it is your responsibility to keep an aggressive dog under control/muzzled and on a lead at all times. Fortunately, this time around we are so glad that it was a happy ending but suffice to say it may be a different story next time when the confrontation with this Dalmatian will result in your beloved pet being seriously injured or killed.
