Police Warning After Spate Of Burglaries – Herefordshire

People in Herefordshire are being urged to be vigilant after a number of burglaries across the county. In the space of 48 hours, 5-7th. February, at least nine burglaries were reported to police in Hereford, Clehonger, Weston under Penyard, Llangaarron and Upton Bishop.

“Experience tells us that burglars often live reasonably close to their victims and work a local patch,” says Detective Chief Inspector for Herefordshire, Sean Paley. He adds: “They will return to or near to properties they have already broken into, so please bear this in mind if you live in any of the neighbourhoods where these recent burglaries have taken place.

“We have had as many burglaries reported to us in two days as we typically see over the space of a week. Obviously this increase is a concern to us and officers will leave no stone unturned in finding those responsible for these offences.

“Tackling burglary is a priority for West Mercia Police and under Citadel, a force initiative which aims to drive down burglary rates and catch offenders, we continue to work very hard to beat the burglars.”

Det Ch Insp Paley adds: “In light of this recent spate of burglaries, I would urge people to act on crime prevention advice and help police by ringing 999 if they see anything suspicious in their area.”

People can take the following steps to protect their homes:

- While the dark evenings are still with us, residents are urged to leave a light on to make it look like someone is at home.
- We recommend householders invest in timer switches to turn lights and radios on while they are out.
- Plenty of outside lighting will also deter burglars as well as gates to the rear of properties being secured.
- We advise everyone to property mark their valuables and make the details viewable to the police by registering them on Immobilise - <http://www.immobilise.com/>. It's free to register your belongings and should the worst happen, it will improve the chances of getting them back if they are lost or stolen.

Older residents may remember Mr. Jack Walker, erstwhile of ‘Green Acre’, Hollybush Lane, Much Birch, who has died aged 100 years. Jack was well known in farming circles having worked for many years at Passey Nott, the agricultural merchants in Hereford. He also served on Much Birch Parish Council for a very long time. He died in South Wales near to his daughter’s home and a short service was held at Hereford Crematorium on the 25th. January and the Service Sheet has a good photograph of Jack reading HM the Queen’s Congratulations card.

It is very sad to record the passing of DAVID BRINLEY PRICE of Much Birch after a long illness so bravely borne. Such was the high esteem in which David was held that over 350 gathered at

Hereford Crematorium on Sat. 16th. Feb, to commemorate his life and support his family. The Service was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson, poems were read by NATALEIGH and BETHANNIE (granddaughters) and a tribute to David was given by a friend, John Williams. The Welsh National Anthem was played on entry by Andy Hoare (trumpet) of the AXE and CLEAVER. David was born in South Wales where his parents ran a small farm in a mining village. He attended local schools and said his one claim to fame was that 'he went to school with Tom Jones'. He was obviously accomplished at school and attended Pontypridd Grammar School and later gained a place at Aberystwyth University. It is not certain what his studies were but Chemistry and agricultural related subjects were his main focus. He later moved to Herefordshire and worked on many farms but came to live locally to work for Mr. Geoff. Snell at Treberva farm. He married Angela and they had 3 children, Chris, Brinley and Annette, who in turn had 6 grandchildren and these were the light of David's life. He was an avid follower of cricket and played for Harewood End and served on the committee for many years. He always listened to the radio to keep up to date with the Test Match commentaries.

The family moved to the Old Forge in Hollybush Lane where David ran a one man haulage business and at one time was also a Lime Spreading Contractor, transporting the lime from the quarry and applying it with his own machinery. He was go-ahead and a very hard working contractor. He also ran a small herd of sheep. David was a long serving member of the Llanwarne Ploughing Society and was Steward of the Horse Ploughing Section on Show Days. He was very interested in ploughing and accompanied his good friend, Keith Williams, wherever the National Championships were taking place in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Keith is a well known Champion and David helped out wherever he could.

Sadly, David and Angela separated some 20 years ago and he later became partner to Lin Bridges and helped and guided her 3 boys through their teenage years. He gave great support to Lin especially following the loss of her son, David, in a tragic motorcycle accident with his own father. David was never without work and more recently built up a business as a constructor of agricultural buildings and domestic garages and extensions.

David was a true countryman, he loved all animals, especially his dogs and cats and could cast an expert eye over sheep.

His illness started some 7 years ago and David was stoical and always optimistic about the outcome. Lin nursed him with great fortitude over the course of his illness. David passed away peacefully on his 72nd. birthday and donations in memory of David were given to the Charles Renton Unit at the County Hospital.

He will be sadly missed by a very wide circle of friends and we send our deepest sympathies to Angela and her family and to Lin and her family. It is also sad to note the death of Sirrell Jones erstwhile of Wormelow. Sirrell was married to Pat (nee Bishop), who was brought up at 'The Gospel Hall on the Barrack Hill, where her father Horace Bishop had a scrap car and motor cycle business. We offer Pat our sincere sympathy.

PARISH MEETING – at the Parish Meeting held on the 7th February, at the Much Birch Community Hall, Councillors were addressed by members of the public about a further possible affordable housing venture to be built within the Parish. It was reiterated that a Parish Council meeting would be held once planning proposals had been submitted to discuss the application(s).^{*} CSO Witcher gave an update on crime trends and said that thefts from outbuildings, of tools and power tools, had been an issue recently. Cllr Russell Hamilton gave an overview of the budget position facing Herefordshire Council and explained some of the implications. Council tax would rise by 1.9% for the year. Work was in progress to try to address some of the issues with deteriorating roads and potholes in the County. The self help gritting that had been carried out, over the snowy period, had been hailed as a success and grateful thanks to all who had made this possible were recorded.

Another reminder, to everyone, is that we are still looking for willing volunteers to join the Parish Council. Come along to a meeting, and find out how you can join in, or contact the Clerk, or any of the other councillors, for details of how you can make a difference to the community by being part of the Parish Council.

Clehonger

Between 01:00 and 09:30 on Sunday 3rd February somebody has broken the locks to some units. The person has had a good look around the units before taking some power tools from within. Incident number 237S030213.

Between the early hours of Sunday 3rd February and the early hours of Monday 4th February suspects appear to have driven at least one vehicle up a drive and into a courtyard area, where there are a number of brick outbuildings, a coach house, stable block, and a metal barn are located. They broke the lock off the metal shutter doors and they took a number of power tools from the shed and made an attempt to take a small tractor which was inside the shed. Incident number 22N040213
