

The Hereford City South & Rural Safer Neighbourhood Team is responsible for Policing in the following wards in Hereford: Hereford City,

St Martins & Hinton.

The team was set up in October 2013 and is a mix of regular Police Officers, who are supplemented by a dedicated team of Police Community Support Officers. This is turn is assisted by members of the West Mercia Police Special Constabulary. Members of the Special Constabulary are volunteers who give up their time to assist the Police and their communities, and have the same powers and equipment as regular officers.

The role of the team is to make the Police more visible and accessible to the public. We liaise with partner agencies, in order to find viable solutions to community concerns and issues. This can involve working with community groups, housing associations, schools and the local authority as well as parish and ward councillors.

The area has approximately 10000 dwellings and covers a widely differing area from a city centre retail area to isolated rural communities, as well as industrial areas. Therefore, patrols will be carried out using a combination of bicycles, foot as well as the use of vehicles, in order to provide reassurance. To enable effective patrol officers work from two sites the main Hereford Police Station and the South Wye Station located in Newton Farm, Hereford.

It is however intended to use a mobile Police Station in order to be better accessed by our rural communities.

Policing surgeries are also run from a number of community sites, such as local schools, shops and community centres. We are always on the lookout for venues to hold the surgeries.

Our local priorities are identified through a process called PACT (Partners and Communities Together), which enables you to tell us about the issues that are causing concern in your neighbourhood. Once a priority is identified, your safer neighbourhoods team will work with partner organisations and the community to find the best solution.

Getting Involved

There are a wide range of opportunities available within West Mercia for people who want to make their community a safer and better place.

PACT - Agreeing Local Priorities

PACT stands for Partners and Communities Together. It gives you the chance to tell your local policing team, local authority and other partner agencies about the issues that are causing concern within your neighbourhood and which ones you want us to deal with as a priority.

Join A Watch Scheme

Watch schemes encourage communities to work together to protect themselves and their property, which in turn can help to reduce the fear of crime and improve the local environment.

Become A Volunteer

There are a number of ways to get involved directly to help your community by volunteering with West Mercia Police.
Opportunities can include helping to run PACT meetings, assisting at police station front counters or helping us undertake public surveys

Special Constabulary

Special constables are volunteers who carry out a variety of roles alongside regular officers to help police their communities. They have the same powers as regular police officers (e.g. being able to arrest), wear a similar uniform and face the same challenges, but the role is a part-time one -a minimum of four hours each week, normally at evenings and weekends. Specials form an important part of local policing teams and carry out a whole range of policing duties, including foot patrols, road safety initiatives and house to house enquiries.
