

Geoengineering, the Weather and Health

Several people from our parishes attended a polished presentation in February on Geoengineering at the Steiner Academy by David Lim a researcher at Reading University.

According to him, governments are controlling the weather and human health by dispersing chemicals in high flying aircraft contrails and by using electro magnetic radiation from the US HAARP project. This may relate to the UN Agenda 21 policy on population control.

Whist holidaying in Goodrich, they explored Shropshire and Herefordshire and fell in love with the 2 counties so much so, that they moved to a cottage in King's Thorn and later purchased 'Fairfield'. Harry and Win delivered the monthly Newsletter to neighbouring properties and kept a pretty garden. They enjoyed watching cricket and attended Herefordshire matches at Brockhampton for many years. Win was an active member of the Women's Institute and had been at one time, President.

After Harry's death, Win coped extremely well with help from the family and very much enjoyed the company of the grandchildren. Win was an avid supporter of Manchester United and joined the Evergreen Club for their many outings during the summer months. Win loved driving her car and was sad when she had to give up in 2012 due to eyesight problems. Win was extremely grateful to the doctors and staff at Much Birch Surgery and to Dore Transport for taking her to town and to the Red Cross day at Orcop once a month. Win was very proud of her grandchildren's achievements with Lilian graduating at Newcastle and currently working for Microsoft at their UK headquarters in Reading while Lewis continues his course in Land Management at Harper Adams University. Goodrich Castle

This massive pile was mentioned in Domesday as Hulla and it isn't until 1146 that it is called Goodrich. The original builder is believed to be Godric Mapson, who wanted to protect the Wye crossing, first a ford, then a ferry and much later a bridge. From the air, signs of earlier ditches

outside the moat can be seen but it must have been a huge operation. The keep is the work of Richard 'Strongbow' de Clare c1160. and the following century, William de Valence who married the Countess of Pembroke, rebuilt the Castle with his son, completing it with financial help from the King in 1296.

Today, it is the chapel that is complete and could be used for services in the summer. It was Talbote who built a wooden balcony so that they could see and take part in the services. The stone stairs to it are still there. In 1500, there were nine priests or clerks and 200 residents in the Castle, mostly soldiers. In 1992, the window commemorating the 1942 crash of a Halifax belonging to the Royal Radar Establishment was placed there. One of the dead was at my school but apart from seeing his name in our school chapel, I did not know him. Then in 2000, Nicola Hopwood put up the 'Upon this Rock' stained glass window showing the river winding around the three parishes of Goodrich, Marstow and Welsh Bicknor. Perhaps the local church could have a once a year service to remember the people who lost their lives defending the castle during the Civil war.

Sir Henry Lingen put a Royalist garrison into Goodrich in 1644 with about 100 men and numerous horsemen. In 1645, the Scots attacked Hereford but the Royalists kept them out. A further Parliamentary attack in 1645 succeeded and Lingen plus 50 of his men escaped to Goodrich. Colonel Birch (his monument showing him in armour can be seen in Weobley Church) attacked Goodrich, firstly getting into the stables at night, removing the horses and then setting fire to the wooden buildings. He then returned with 'Roaring Meg' the mortar still seen at the Castle. The damage was intense and not a roof remained. On July 31, 1645 Lingen and 50 gentlemen plus 120 soldiers marched out to the tune of 'Sir Henry Lingen's Fancy' and Birch moved in. The castle didn't need slighting and the Ministry of Works (now English Heritage) opened it to the public putting in all the safety measures but still leaving it with an air of magnificence.

The most recent meeting on Wednesday March 5th and all Councillors were present.

Ward Councillor Jon Norris informed the meeting of a new university that is due to start in Hereford in 2017. It will aim to pull in 20 – 40 year olds to the county and will be a speciality university for Science, Technology and maths. It will be funded jointly from private and government funds. The Chair asked Cllr Norris what was happening with the Core Strategy, and he said that it might not go through at all this year. Cllr Norris invited parishioners to look at his blog for further information:- jonnorris.co.uk

In regard to the Neighbourhood Plan, with the Council's lack of progress with the Core Strategy

in mind, the Chair surmised that it might be seen as a waste of time and money to commit to a plan at this juncture when it has to tie into a document that has not yet been written. The PC was in agreement.

The Chair told the meeting of a great pancake night event in the Village Hall, with over 50 people attending. He then talked about the Village Hall constitution saying that specific Trustees need to be appointed to keep an eye on governance. Following advice from Cllr Rees, a little more research will be done to see if the Village Hall is incorporated or not, before Trustees are appointed.

A map showing the worst pot holes in the Parish has been submitted to Balfour Beatty in the hope that they will be able to start work on them shortly.

The next meeting is on Wednesday May 7th at 7.30 in the Village Hall, this will start with the Annual Parish Meeting, and then be followed by the Parish Council Meeting and all parishioners are warmly welcomed.
