## LOCAL NEWS



The recent local news is in the main not good.

Sadly, Sid Hitching our erstwhile long serving milkman has been in hospital twice following falls at home but we wish him a speedy recovery.

*Since writing this we have heard that, very sadly, Sid Hitching died in hospital last Sunday. A full tribute will be given next month*

Roger Thomas has also had an overnight operation and is now back at home and feeling more comfortable.

There have been 5 deaths in the community and Mrs. Peggy Newman's passing was notified in the last Newsletter but unfortunately her funeral service was delayed until Dec 12th and a full tribute will be given next month.

In the second of two accidents on the A49 near Much Birch, tragically Joe Mayers, son of Chris Mayers of Kings Thorn, was killed in collision with a lorry on 19th Nov. He was just 30 years of age and leaves a son, Cameron, aged 7. Cameron is now living with his grandfather Chris and his partner, Amanda, and attends the Steiner Academy. We send our deepest sympathy to Cameron, Chris and Amanda and also to grandfather, Eric.

Don Ingram of the erstwhile Post Office and Stores sadly passed away on 19th. November in the County Hospital, a few weeks before his 87th birthday. A Service to celebrate his life was held in a packed out St. Martins Church on 1st. December.

Don was born in South Wales and had 7 brothers and sisters. The family moved to Cardiff when he was quite young and thence to Pontrilas eventually settling in Hereford. Don's first job was as a butcher's delivery boy cycling around Hereford. He had an older brother who had joined the Royal Navy and Don wanted to join up as well but was refused because he was too young and WW2 was still raging. However he did join the Royal Navy straight after the war and was based in Portsmouth representing his ship in boxing and gymnastics. He married Joan in 1951 and Ray was born in 1952. After his naval discharge, Don joined the staff of Brook Bros. garage in Blueschool Street Hereford, where a number of young men took apprenticeships to be motor mechanics.

In 1963 Don founded his own private hire firm which began his long association with taxiing and driving jobs. In 1964, a second son, Mark was born and later in 1964 the family set sail for Australia, where Richard was born. They returned a few years later and Don continued his taxi work. In 1971, the call to return to Australia was very real and the Ingram family set out with one of Don's brothers to make the journey overland. There were conflicts going on in the Balkans and when the van engine overheated for the second time in Greece, despite Don's optimism they took the advice to return to England. My first recollection

of Don, although I didn't know him at the time, was in 1973 when I saw him running up the Callow with a group of younger men, he was very fit.

Don and Joan took over the PO and Stores in 1983 but immediately Joan was invited to represent Hereford Midwives at a Conference in Australia and Don paid for himself to go along privately. After the Conference, they took a 3 week tour to catch up with old friends.

Tragedy hit the family in 1997 when Mark fell from his motorcycle landing on the back of his head near to the Skippit on the Kings Thorn road and was killed.

In 2003, Joan became very ill and in April, she passed away. Don and Ray carried on the business as best they could but the Post Office wanted to reduce the number of hours making it unviable and so the shop closed in 2005. Don had angina and was fitted with a stent giving him a new lease of life. Don and Ray continued the taxi service and Don was able to play more golf on the slopes of Kington Golf Club. He lived life to the full and was very active until the last 6 months of his life when aches and pains began to take their toll. Sadly, Don lost his sight completely some 2 months before his death but even in hospital he was laughing and joking with the family but slipped away peacefully at the end. He will be missed by a wide circle of friends and we send Ray, Richard and their families our sincere sympathies.

Colin Swift of King's Thorn passed away on Nov. 27th at home after a lengthy illness bravely borne. His funeral was attended by neighbours, friends and family at Hereford Crematorium on Friday, 4th December on what would have been his 87th birthday. The service was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson and the entry and exit was accompanied by the music of Glen Miller. The tribute to Colin was given by daughter Jill from which these notes have been taken.

Colin was born in Coventry on 4th Dec. 1928 and remained a loyal supporter of Coventry FC for all his life. Most of his schooling occurred during World War 2 and he left in 1942 aged 14. His family came through the bombing relatively unscathed but a house opposite was badly damaged. In the air raid shelter along with the other boys he used to frighten ladies by releasing frogs to jump around their feet. On leaving school his report described him as a well mannered, intelligent boy who should make good progress. He achieved a 'Very Good' standard in all subjects, Maths, English, Science, Art, General Studies and Manual Work.

In 1946, Colin joined the Royal Navy and served on many ships and aircraft carriers in his 8 years of service. During this time he was able to indulge in his love of sport, particularly football and hockey.

He sustained a nasty knee injury in Malta in 1948 which necessitated knee surgery in later life.

On leaving the Navy Colin enlisted with the Royal Naval Reserve for 4 years. His quiff of long blonde hair turned

heads in the town as he could easily be mistaken for Danny Kaye.

He took a trip up to the West End Ballroom in Birmingham where he met Menna who also loved dancing to Big Band music especially, Glen Miller and their romance blossomed. Exactly a year later Colin proposed to Menna and they were married on New Year's Eve 1955 enjoying a long weekend in London for their honeymoon. In due time Sue and Jill were born. Colin always instilled into the girls the need for qualifications which duly paid off with Sue qualifying as a medical doctor and Jill graduating as a microbiologist, making their parents very proud. He put his engineering skills to good use in civilian life first joining Armstrong Whitworth Aircraft as a Rocket Inspector and then as a Guided Missile Inspector at Hawker Siddeley, followed by a long career in the motor industry with the Rootes group in Coventry.

Colin loved football which he played in local teams and then managed one of them. The highlight of his 50 years of support for Coventry City was rewarded when they won the FA Cup in 1987, beating Spurs 3 - 2.

After Sue and Jill left home, Menna and Colin enjoyed peace and quiet once more and settled into a whole new rural life in Kings Thorn. Colin got stuck in to creating, with Menna, a new garden, planting trees and shrubs and a vegetable and fruit patch, and then enjoying the fruits of his labours. Menna and Colin thoroughly enjoyed their grandchildren, Jamie, Heather and Adam and the 3 generations took holidays together when the children were young.

In retirement, Menna and Colin were able to indulge their love of travelling enjoying holidays on Baltic cruises and St. Petersburg, South Africa, Thailand and Florida.

One dream they fulfilled was to visit Canada, Niagara falls and ride the famous Rocky Mountaineer train. Latterly, as he became frail, Colin kept his mind active watching quiz shows, solving crosswords and reading history and adventure books. He bore his failing health with patience and fortitude and made clear his wishes 'not to be messed about'. He was also determined to die at home in his own bed and with the utmost care from Menna and the local doctors and carer's teams. At the end Colin passed away peacefully in his sleep.

Family and neighbours will sorely miss a gentle, kind, reliable and intelligent man who in a way had the last laugh in that his brother in law, Robert Hughes, sportingly wore a sky blue ribbon at Colin's funeral, Rob being an avid Birmingham supporter.

We send our deepest sympathies to Menna, Jill, Sue and grandchildren, Jamie, Heather and Adam and to Eryl and Rob Hughes.

It is also sad to record the death of Mr. David Rogers of 'Sunnybank Farm', Little Birch and we extend our condolences to son, Guy and Carmen and the family.



### **Don't let a Burglar think no one is home!**

As the nights are getting darker earlier, burglaries tend to increase so leave lights on inside your house when you are not home. Leave a light on in more than one room. Use a timer if you have one. Make sure your front door is well lit. Police recommend dusk to dawn lighting that automatically comes on as it gets dark. Keep shrubbery and hedges at the front pruned to below one metre to remove cover for a burglar and allow visibility for neighbours. Keep your curtains closed at night, if you are away, ask a trusted neighbour to close them for you. Check existing lighting is in good working order and remember to check batteries in your torches and smoke alarms.
