## Horticultural Show Report

The morning of Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> September was cool and clear when we arrived at Little Birch Village Hall at 8.30am. Busy helpers had set out the many white paper covered tables the previous afternoon while Janet Gwinnett was busy with the Children's Workshop. The bright emptiness would not last, as by 11 o'clock 58 people had displayed 452 exhibits, 82 more than last year, filling the tables to over-flowing.

The largest increase was in the Domestic Section where last year's 58 entries rose to 96. Floral Art almost doubled and with the abundant displays of produce presented a colourful scene.

A note on the Entry Form this year drew people's attention to the fact that the **Llywellyn Sutton Cup** is open to families and this produced a lot of interest giving the whole proceedings a good family feeling. Many, like three generations of the Humby family, put in a great team effort, including **Peter Humby** winning the coveted 1<sup>st</sup> prize for the **King's Thorn Fruit Cake.** They were only 1 point behind the joint effort of Derek Scrivens and his granddaughter Poppy, but they were all eclipsed by the Father and Daughter team of **Vic Townsend** and **Sue Waldron.** 

**Vic Townsend** also won the **Horticultural Shield** impressing us, once again, with his wonderful vegetables.

Last year's winner, Martin Gallagher, decided this year to have a go at the Domestic Section and came very close to our Winner of the **Domestic Cup, Patricia Kelly**.

The David Enoch Cup for the Best Exhibit in the Show was won by Selby Lloyd for a wonderful vase of Chrysanthemums but Des Wathen won the Rose Bowl for the Flower Section.

The Floral Art Shield was returned to Mary Hill for another year and the Children's Shield was awarded to 3 year old Poppy Scrivens who also won the Cup for Children under 8 years. The winner of the Cup for Children over 8 years was Iona Collinson.

There were no entry fees and no charge to come and see the Show, but the Raffle, run by Derek and Margaret Scrivens, the refreshments, organised by Mike Leigh and Jennifer Jones, and the Auction of Produce at the end, ably conducted by our Chairman, John Bryant, should go some way to fund this community event.

This was another very successful Show and thanks must go to the King's Thorn & Little Birch Gardening Club Committee and their helpers for the time and effort involved to stage this popular Show. We also thank all the exhibitors and visitors for making it so worthwhile and look forward to doing it all again next year!

#### Walk round Aconbury Woods

At the beginning of July over 30 people were led on a very informative walk around Aconbury woods by Geraint Richards, Head Forester for the Duchy of Cornwall, and Graham Taylor from Pryor Ricketts, who manages the forestry the Duchv estates for in Herefordshire. We were informed of their plans for the wood in the immediate and long-term future and shown particular areas which illustrated their points.

They told us that their plans for the next five years involve a variety of activities. These include the process of clearing conifers from the sweet chestnut/conifer stands planted in the 1980s and cutting down the sweet chestnuts for the stumps to re-grow as coppice. A few undamaged trees will be left as standards. We were shown the area behind the chapel which has been cleared over the past 2 years and the shoots from the stumps were clearly visible. The remains of the conifers are to be left to decompose slowly, being the most environmentally friendly method for disposing of them. Two other stands of conifer and sweet chestnut are to be dealt with in the same way over the next four years or so. The ultimate aim is to have a proportion of the woodland down to coppice which will be harvested every 20 years or so mainly producing fencing - the benefit of chestnut is that it does not rot so does not need Hazel will also be treating. coppiced, but on a 10 year cycle, to produce such items as wattle fencing. Some of this is being carried out by the Wye Woods Project.

The rest of the woods will continue to be managed by selective felling of hardwoods and softwoods, each tree being assessed for the best time to fell. Healthy trees are being left longer than the usual age of 150 years. The assumption is that healthy trees will produce healthy acorns and these can be harvested, grown on in the nursery then planted in the gaps created when tall enough to out-compete the bracken.

The time for felling is very restricted, usually March/April, in the hope that least damage will be caused to the environment. Horses have been and will be used for hauling timber but they are not always available.

When re-planting takes place, seed from the woods is often used but a mixture of species is planted as this discourages the spread of speciesspecific diseases.

In order to encourage healthy growth it has been necessary to cull the huge number of squirrels which untold damage, particularly do noticeable on the sweet chestnuts (we were shown several examples) where bark is stripped killing the tree above that level. Squirrels are either shot or trapped, not poisoned. A concerted effort had removed a large proportion of the squirrels but young males have been moving in from surrounding areas so the culling will be ongoing. It is also cull necessary to the deer population as they too strip bark but the idea is to keep their numbers at a sustainable size.

It was made very clear that we are most welcome in the woods – it is a facility for which we are most grateful. We may be able to benefit in the not-too-distant future from wood blocks and charcoal from the Duchy who hope to arrange sale of these locally.

**Report on LBPC Meeting 2<sup>nd</sup> Sept.** No interests were declared. Minutes of the meeting held on  $1^{st}$  July were read and signed as a true record.

*Matters Arising* from previous minutes: Little Birch Parish Council Chairman informally spoke to Much Birch Parish Council Chairman concerning the Communications and the outstanding Group newsletter payments. At the same time he expressed LBPC's full support for the newsletter. The Parish Freighter was deemed a success with many residents making use of this facility. Future costs of this service are expected to rise considerably during the next financial year and must be budgeted for within the next precept.

**Village Hall** – To comply with the Charities Commission, LBVH Committee members were declared trustees of the Village Hall with LBPC as custodial trustees. It was agreed that LBPC must keep copies of all legal paperwork concerning the Village Hall. Current fund raising events were discussed.

It was stated by the PC that the Grit bins are provided by HFDC and are topped up at intervals throughout the year. They are for the purpose of gritting minor roads and **NOT** for parishioners own use to grit their driveways.

#### Footpaths Report

A good start has been made on inspecting the condition of footpaths. This is an ongoing process that will take many more months to complete. An accurate survey is the aim.

The PC has applied to join the Parish Path Partnership Scheme which offers an opportunity for community involvement in safeguarding the future of our footpaths. The role of volunteers is important and there is a small group of parishioners who are helping. It is important to bear in mind that any footpaths and bridleways created before 1949 which are not recorded on the Definitive Map by

2026 will be lost for ever. One path has already been identified. If anyone knows of others please let us know. Also, it would be most appreciated if all walkers who encounter problems on their walks would report them to the Footpaths Officer.

#### Neighbourhood Watch Crime Trends in August

A bike that was against a hedge on **Lowe Lane, Much Dewchurch** was taken on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> between 10:00 and 12:00. It is a sporty looking bike black and yellow in colour. It is possible that someone may have picked it up for safe keeping. Does anyone remember seeing this bike or seeing anyone in possession of it?

A property in **Dinedor** was burgled around the 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup>. The owners of the property were away on holiday. If anyone is going away or knows of anyone going away feel free to let us know so we can help keep an eye on the property.

Some scrap metal was stolen in **Little Birch** on the 19<sup>th</sup> between 12:30-18:00. This is just a reminder to keep any scrap out of sight or locked away. Please try to keep gates shut/locked if possible it all helps as a deterrent.

Large amounts of fly tipping have been reported in the last few days!

At this time of year Fly tipping is a problem. If anybody see's anybody possibly fly tipping or acting suspiciously please report it to us. A registration number from vehicles is always very helpful.

A member of the public came across 2 people breaking into their garage in the **Garway Hill** area. After the offenders were disturbed they ran off across fields to a vehicle similar to YX51\*\*F. If you ever find yourself in a similar position please call 999 straight away and again vehicle registrations are very helpful. Enquiries are ongoing.

A hay turner worth £3,000 was stolen from a field between **Dinedor** and **Holme Lacy** overnight on Fri 21st/Sat 22nd August. It was a Vicon HS360 model, mostly red in colour but with some black.

Over the weekend the Village Hall at **Orcop** was broken into. The suspects gained entry by forcing a window, and then broke into the electricity meter, which was empty at the time. Nothing appears to have been stolen from the premises. **September** 

Overnight on 10th/11th September, a crate of woodworking tools valued at over £1000 were stolen from a workshop at a house in Kings Thorn. Also a green John Deere Quad bike and a 14ft Ifor Williams trailer were stolen from a farm in Pontrilas. The items were not secured in any way, which made it an easy night's work for the The following night a suspects. Ford Transit van was stolen from a garage premises in **Much Birch**, and was found burnt out in Gwent the same day. Again at night a vehicle was entered in Much Dewchurch, and a flashing beacon was stolen, as well as five litres of diesel.

A white/orange 110 mini digger was stolen from a farm in **Clehonger**, believed on the back of a trailer that was also stolen from the farm, and was used sometime during the night to attempt to remove a vehicle from woodland between **Little Birch** and **Little Dewchurch**. The attempt failed,

and the vehicle, a Ford Maverick, was set alight at aprox. 7.00am. the following day. The digger was unloaded from the back of the trailer at the side of the road near Little Birch - just down from the Caldicott Crossroads, and later put back on the trailer in the same place. The digger had a tracking device attached, and we have now just found the vehicle in woodland nearby, still with the trailer, possibly waiting to be collected! It shows that it is worth fitting tracking devices to farm and plant machinery, as well as marking them with SmartWater. We are hoping that someone saw this digger at some point during the journey - if so, please get in touch asap.

Throughout the county we are experiencing a number of thefts of farm machinery and equipment please ensure that these items are secured, preferably locked away, and also marked in some way or another - SmartWater is an excellent product which can be used.

Another reminder that if you call one of our mobiles and there is no answer/no signal please call the 03003333000 number to report the incident as it could then be passed to us via our control system.

Thieves are using large vehicles, probably with hiab lifts on the back, to steal these items, and often the thefts are occurring during daylight hours. These people are brazen, and will go into fields and steal trailers, equipment etc in broad daylight - it is because they are so brazen about it that they get away with it - any witnesses assume thev are legitimate! Please be suspicious of any vehicles like this seen in our rural lanes, and take registration numbers if possible and pass them to us so that we can make some enquiries. We can soon establish whether or not they are genuine.

It aims to encourage greater public participation in the prevention and solution of crime, and the panel works closely with the police to this end. They played a large part for many years in 'Crucial Crew' which is an annual event run for all primary school pupils in the county, teaching youngsters many aspects of personal safety.

More recently, the panel have worked with us and Smartwater, and those of you who have purchased this product will recall writing your cheques to the panel! Now, sadly, there are only six members left on the panel, and in order for it to continue its valuable work, they are looking for 'fresh

blood', which is why I am including this item in our bulletin in the hope that some of you out there can spare a few hours for this worthy cause.
