If you like to grow your own herbs there is wide variety of herb plants, both the common and the not-so-common. There is also a Fair Trade stand and a local craft stand. Refreshments are provided and sold in aid of MacMillan Cancer Support.

Sadly, but peacefully, EILEEN MARY LEWIS, erstwhile of Mill Cottage, Kings Thorn, passed away at the end of June and Much Birch Church was full of family and friends for a Memorial Service on 1st July. Eileen was born in London into a very musical family but against her parent's wishes, took up a nursing career. Her fiancée was unfortunately killed in WWII

and after some time, Eileen married his best friend. In due time, Eryl was born and she in turn gave birth to Jenny and Lucy. Eryl is a fine musician and continues to play with several orchestras as well as teaching music in schools. The whole family moved to Mill Cottage in the 1980's and Jenny and Lucy attended local schools. Eileen was always a very busy person and was a great help to many friends in the community. She worshipped at Much Birch Church and was a very active member on the flower rota for many years, as well as a member of the Mother's Union at Much Dewchurch. Eileen thoroughly enjoyed flower arranging and gardening and had had tuition from very well known teachers in and around London. Locally, she was a member of both Kings Thorn and Little Birch Gardening Club and also the Much Dewchurch Club, serving on both club committees for a long time. Eileen visited virtually all the local garden centres and many more further afield, always filling her car with choice plants and shrubs and fitting in her passengers as best she could. Her gardens at Mill Cottage and later at Grosmont Grove, were full of wonderful plants, expertly arranged. Eileen was very involved with the Old Tyme dancing afternoons at Little Birch Hall where a dozen or so older folk from villages all around enjoyed dancing to the music of the war years, the 50's and 60's. Birthdays in the group were always celebrated in style with a birthday tea and cake or a meal together. Her social life also included the Evergreen Club and the Over 60's at Little Dewchurch and she lunched at least twice a week with Elizabeth Dyke, Polly Perkins and others, but always on Wednesdays at the Axe and Cleaver. Eileen had a real gift for making and keeping friends. The group of nurses with whom she trained and worked with in London during the war, kept in touch and met up every few years in various

parts of the country. The last meeting was in Cardiff some four years ago and the journey home was fraught with dense fog. However, she decided to follow a large lorry along the M4 trusting that it would get her to the junction of the A449 and an easier drive home through Monmouth. She enjoyed driving and generously transported her friends to all these social gatherings.

She also loved lace-making and joined two classes at Usk and Abergavenny. This was mentioned in conversation one day with Alwyn Bulbeck and so began a long and close friendship as Alwyn had also started lace-making some years earlier in Wales. They travelled together to the classes each week with Eileen driving in the early years and later with Alwyn driving when Eileen's fingers became badly affected with arthritis. Eileen sought out the best instructors while in London and usually took on the most intricate and difficult lace forms, which again demonstrated her determination and perseverance to achieve high standards in whatever she did.

Her family was her greatest treasure in life and she was very proud of all their academic and musical achievements. Grand daughter, Jenny, is a superb athlete, excelling in long distance running, swimming and cycling. The marriage of Jenny and Justin was a real highlight for Eileen and the radiant photograph of her in her wedding outfit was used on the front cover of the Memorial Service sheet. She loved to hear of grand daughter, Lucy's adventurous travels in Tasmania and Australia and was very excited when shown photographs of these exploits.

After her heart attack and several operations, she spent eight months in hospital fighting off many infections but determined to get back to her bungalow and resume her social life and activities. Sadly, this was not to be and she gradually got weaker but was very

well looked after by the family and team of carers. A few days before she died, Eryl took Eileen to see Olivet Lewis, who was convalescing in 'Hillside' and although too weak to speak she communicated her love through her hands. She will be greatly missed by her family and a very wide circle of friends and we extend to all the family our deepest sympathy in their loss.

A Service of Thanksgiving for the Life of JOHN MELVILLE LANGFORD, known to most people as Jack, took place on 17th July and was conducted by Rev. Tony Kelk. Jack died on 8th July, at the age of 91 years. He was born in 1918 at Wellington, where both his father's and mother's parents also lived and farmed. At the age of two, his parents moved to a smallholding at Westbrook, near Hay on Wye and with his brother, Arthur and sister, Dorothy enjoyed an idyllic childhood in the wealth of the surrounding countryside near the river Wye and Merbach Hill. The walk to school was two miles each way but was enjoyed in the company of his siblings and several other local children.

The family moved to The Grove at Bullinghope when Jack was 13 and at this age he left school, as money was not available for further education. However, he was very good at mental arithmetic, which stood him in good stead throughout his life. When the family moved to Grafton Villa, Jack met Peggy Millichamp and they married in 1946 when he was aged twenty-nine and soon they had a young family when Richard and Rosalind were born. Many family activities were enjoyed including gymkhanas, ploughing matches, picnics on the Black Mountains and outings to point-to-point races.

He loved horseracing throughout his life and travelled with his brother-in-law, George Meredith, to Ascot, Epsom and Cheltenham as well as to Hereford Races. He enjoyed fishing trips with friends, especially to Salcombe, returning

home with loads of mackerel, and to the Smithfield Show in London each December, which was celebrated with festive cheer. He once made a wager at the Farmer's Club in Hereford as to what was the shortest time it would take to drive to the Regent's Palace Hotel in central London. He set off in his Ford Pilot, with George Meredith as witness, making the journey in less time than he had wagered. He prided himself on his driving skills but for the passengers it was often a terrifying experience! He drove in all the counties of England often to farm auctions or to pick up farm machinery parts. In recent years, the pace of his driving slowed considerably and he agreed with the tips on eco-driving which Rosalind had given him, saying that he now drove at slower speeds, braked more gently and changed gear more appropriately.

Jack was a great socialiser for much of his life and he had a passion for ballroom dancing, at which he excelled. He also had a good singing voice and admired many of the great tenors. Being a poor sleeper in his later years, he would often sing through the small hours.

When he took on the farm at Norton Brook in 1946, he gradually moved away from using Shire Horses and traditional farming techniques with which he grew up and adopted mechanisation and modern farming approaches leading to increased crop yields. He loved the livestock, keeping sheep and cattle for many years, finally settling with a pedigree Hereford herd. He studied the breeding lines and liked to show the cattle in Hereford.

Jack and Peggy 'retired' in 1984 and moved to 'Copper Beeches', that lovely house on the Callow. In 1986, they were ready to take up another challenge and bought Church Farm, Little Birch when the Bowen family gave up their milking herd and moved to Anglesey. They worked incredibly hard together transforming their new home and

he fed the cattle in winter into his late eighties, dug a 6-foot deep trench across the yard for a water pipe to be laid up to the field to a cattle trough and meticulously constructed and hung, with the help of a front-end loader, the huge corrugated iron doors, which moved effortlessly across the entrance to the large barn.

Peggy and Jack loved the birds and wildlife at Church Farm, where they also constructed a pond and the binoculars were always to hand near the window. Together they lived a simple life and Peggy was a good gardener, keeping them more or less self-sufficient in fruit and vegetables and with the poultry, an ample supply of eggs. She was also an excellent cook. She attended the Church regularly, cleaned and provided flowers as per the rota and baked cakes for teas in the Church, never seeking the limelight but always getting on with the job in hand in her own quiet way. Sadly, Peggy died in 2001 and although a farmer rather than a gardener, Jack continued in the garden, doing all that Peggy had previously done and was glad to share the produce with the family. He continued to bottle the fruit from the trees they had planted together and was especially proud of the peaches, being very pleased that, under his direction, grandsons Jamie and Alan, maypoled the tree to prevent the branches breaking with this year's bumper crop. This took place a few weeks before his death.

Jack celebrated his 90th. birthday last year with all the family of whom he was very proud and would spend hours with the grandchildren discussing their latest experiences and sporting achievements and was thrilled to become a great grandfather recently. He was a very independent man, worked hard up to the last few months, cooked for himself and dressed himself smartly. He kept his mind alert by doing the Telegraph crosswords

and Sudoku puzzles as he had always done with Peggy over the years. Despite two heart attacks in 1955 and 2001, he never gave up, believed in hard work and kept a very upright posture. Richard and Jo and their family have given him great support in their daily visits and Rosalind too whenever she and her family were able to journey over from Devizes. Jack will be sadly missed by the family and many friends and we send them our sincere sympathies in their loss. The family have asked that, through the Newsletter, their sincere thanks is recorded to all for the cards and messages of sympathy, attendance at the memorial service and the donations in memory of Jack for St. Michael's Hospice, which to date have exceeded well over £400.

The whole community was shocked on 28th July to hear of the sudden death of ALISON ANDERSON, at the age of 66 years. Alison Margaret Riddihough was born on the South Devon coast towards the end of WWII. and had two brothers, Robin and Nicholas. She always had a sunny smile and possessed what was known as a 'placid' disposition. Robin remembers quite vividly a bad fall in the kitchen, which she suffered when she was three or four years of age. From then on, she experienced thirst, comas, fits and hallucinations, which finally resulted in the diagnosis of diabetes. Those were the early days in the treatment of childhood diabetes and her mother had to quickly learn to give her daily injections and to start her on a strict diet. The ritual of measuring her blood sugar levels with test tubes, a Bunsen burner and complicated colour charts was all part of family life.

Looking back, Robin reflected that the psychological effect of these restrictions on a child of Alison's age must have been horrendous – never to be able to eat in the same way as other children, to be prodded with a needle everyday and denied sweets and treats for

reasons beyond her understanding. Perhaps because of the disciplined childhood that she endured, Alison developed her fighting spirit and will to survive. To this endless battle, she brought an inner calm and fierce determination that remained with her all her life. She was always a happy child, content to sit on the nearby beach, splashing and giggling whilst her brothers energetically rushed around collecting caterpillars, and pleading for rides on boats. Her love of animals developed early on despite a memorable episode in a tea-room in the Cotswolds when a small dog bit her savagely for no apparent reason. It was about that time that she delivered her most famous public speech on seeing a picture of the Royal Family -: "Mummy, Mummy, look at all those people waiting for a bus".

Alison's lifelong love of horses began about the age of ten, when her closest friend, Rosemary, was given a pony. From then on, she could be found enthusiastically mucking out, grooming and generally getting involved at any neighbourhood stable. This led through the years to her becoming a dedicated and skilled horsewoman riding with a number of Hunts and participating in Horse Shows whenever she could. A bit of her mother's passion for theatre brushed off with appearances on horseback in re-enactments of historical events, Robin recalling that she once convincingly played Friar Tuck.

Caring for others was the key to Alison's character and she applied that care generously but firmly to both people and animals. Colin and Alison were married in 1968 and they raised three fine sons, Dominic, Tony and Simon, bred innumerable dogs (she once was a judge at Crufts) and kept a goat. She was a familiar sight as she rode her horse, Prince, around all the local lanes and in the woods. She helped with the mini-Agricultural Shows that ran in Little Birch for some eight years from

1978 and was involved with the production side of the Village Pantomime with Margaret Stevens and Anne Thomas, teaching the children to dance and mime.

She worked at the Newstead Nursing Home in Hereford as a geriatric nurse and gave nursing care to the residents of the Old House just down from the Monmouth Turn on the Callow (later called High Meadows) with Virgil Lay. She was one of the first to have an insulin pump permanently attached to her body and she gave lectures to other diabetics and their parents on the early challenges before the invention of portable blood sugar monitoring equipment and insulin pumps. Her achievement in living as a full diabetic beyond 60 years was recognised with a medal from the Diabetic Society. When her parents became ill in their Devon home, Alison courageously travelled on her own by train to visit them whenever it was possible. Over the past four years or so, life was not easy for her as she developed circulation problems in her leg and had to endure a 3rd operation after the scars of the first two became infected with resistant bacteria.

She was a remarkable person with a fundamental good nature and friendly disposition. These were coupled with a steady and calm determination to overcome difficulties and challenges of a kind that few of us can even imagine. If she had moments of despair and self-pity, they seldom showed as her good humour, kindness and thought for others continued to the end. Colin has given Alison the utmost help and care, particularly over the last five years and took her out to lunch every day, which got her away from the cottage and the chore of preparing a meal. When she could drive or walk she attended Little Birch Church but in recent years, she found getting into the Church too difficult and so Colin took her to Much Birch Church for Evensong once a month.

She joined the knitting circle at Much Birch and to the end, she remembered all the family birthdays and painted or knitted little gifts and cards for the growing group of her grandchildren, grand nephews and nieces, most of whom she had never met as they lived abroad. She delighted in Dominic's son, Jacob, and every effort was made to meet up when Dominic was home on leave.

Robin said that he was fortunate enough to speak to Alison by telephone from his home in Canada, the night before she died. She was not feeling well due to a chest infection but thought that she would be better in a few days with some new pills and agreed they would talk again in three days. In her mind, she was experiencing a minor set-back that would be overcome, just as she had overcome so many set-backs so many times before.

Alison's funeral service took place at Hereford Crematorium and was conducted by Rev. Elaine Goddard of St. Weonards. There are two delightful photographs of her in obviously happy times on the front of the service sheet. The service was attended by all those in the neighbourhood who knew her as well as by the immediate family and her brother, Nicholas, who is a member of the Hare Krishna faith and who in a senior capacity, travels all over the world. We send to Colin, Dominic, Tony, Simon and the wider family our deepest sympathies. Donations were given to the 'Insulin Dependent Diabetic Trust' which was obviously a charity close to Alison's heart.

It is also sad to report the sudden death of AMY MORRIS who lived in Tump Lane and condolences are sent to her family.

The death has also occurred of PERCY BRISTOW, who was the local policeman in the late 1950's and the first to occupy the Police House next to the Village Hall and now known as Ross View. He was of the old fashioned school who,

Crime Trends

Two properties in Kingstone had outbuildings broken into. This was overnight on Friday 31st July/Saturday 1st August, probably around 2.00am. as one occupier was disturbed by her dogs barking, and then heard the sound of someone walking along the track by her property. A Husqavana 357XP chainsaw and a full fuel can of 2 stroke mixture was stolen from this property.

Further down the track, a garden shed was entered and a Ryobi brush cutter and two full plastic fuel cans containing unleaded fuel were taken. A lawnmower was removed from the shed but left a short distance away, maybe the suspect was disturbed.

Two vehicles and an Ifor Williams trailer were stolen recently from a business premises in Allensmore. There was a silver Peugeot Estate R 547 YUD and a white LDV van BD 51 UUA stolen, and the trailer is a P7E model. Any sightings of these, please let us know straight away. Two vending machines on the site were also broken into and a quantity of cash stolen.

Results

A 45yr old male from Tump Lane was arrested for criminal damage, charged and bailed to court.

A male from Much Dewchurch was cautioned for failing to comply with the conditions of his shotgun certificate.

Three males, 16yrs, 20yrs and 21yrs have been interviewed in relation to the theft of wheels from Callow. Enquiries are continuing

receiving a written apology, monetary compensation or even giving money to charity. Unfortunately, putting them in the stocks is not an option.

Parents - please note

West Mercia Police have become aware of new web site that allows children and young people to connect to a complete stranger for on-line chat. The web site is www.omegle.com and it appears that the whole point of the site is to allow a connection to a complete stranger and to engage in a one-to-one chat with them. There are obvious concerns of unsolicited adult/child contact taking place.

West Mercia Police continue to advise parents to show caution when permitting their children any unsupervised access to the internet.

SmartWater

To date, we have sold in excess of 1000 kits in our community, and you will have seen that most villages as well as some businesses are displaying the 'Thieves Beware - SmartWater in this area' signs. In some cases we are selling the kits to household or businesses that have suffered a break-in, it is a good idea to obtain a kit before you are a victim!

It has proved to be a good deterrent to criminals, but only if the warning stickers are applied and the property marked! I have spoken to several people who purchased kits some time ago, but have not 'got round to it yet'. If you are one of these people, please check the 'sell by' date on your kit, as the solution has a limited shelf life whilst in the container. Once applied to property, it is has been carbon tested to stay on it for in excess of 100 years! Shedding Light on Stolen Goods

Police staff will become a regular sight at auctions and car boot sales in Herefordshire, thanks to a high-powered UV lamp that can easily detect marks on property, made by

UV pens or liquids such as SmartWater. The lamp, to which all officers in the Division will have access, shows marks on property as a yellow light, indicating to the user that the property has been marked in some way and may be stolen.

The portable lamp will be a great step forward in identifying possible stolen property at car boots and auctions, where before, the police did not have the capability to quickly scan large numbers of items for UV markings when away from their stations.
