



Special thanks go to Chris Atkinson and 'his team' for their hard work and for allowing us to use this very attractive and peaceful venue.

John Kinross continues his series on castles of Herefordshire with 'Hereford Castle.'

The 16th century writer, Leland, described Hereford Castle as 'One of the fairest, largest and strongest castles in England'. Today, all we have is Castle Green with a house nearby that may have been the Governor's, part of a moat to the north and possibly the watergate. Sometimes in a dry summer, outlines of walls can be seen and Walter Pilley, a 19th century antiquarian, saw 2 or 3 skeletons and a 'pitcher jug' when a sewer was being made. The walls of the town date from AD900 and it is a pity that they have not been continually repaired like those in Exeter. Originally, a monastery occupied the green but in 1046, Ralph, Earl of Hereford, built the castle, a motte and tower which by the 17th. century is shown on Speede's map as having a tower on the motte wall underneath and a large bailey with walls and two gates. The Welsh captured it in 1055 and it had to be rebuilt by William FitzOsbern, who put the market outside the city defences where it remained until this year when it was replaced by Debenhams and surrounding shops. The castle passed to the crown and Henry 1 left it to his daughter, Matilda, but during the Stephen - Matilda war, it changed hands until it was taken over by the Sheriff with the King as owner. In the 13th. century, the castle featured in the Baron's war and young Prince Edward, captured at Lewes, was brought here. He was a keen horseman and when allowed to exercise his horse on Widemarsh Common, changed it for a fresh horse and galloped off to Wigmore where he joined up with the Mortimers.

During the Civil War, the castle was held by Royalists. Waller briefly captured it for Parliament but Barnabas Scudamore took over and fortified it for the King. In Sep. 1645, the Scots who were attacking it were driven off and the King briefly stayed in the Royal apartments. Col. Birch

however was strong enough to retake it and re-fortify it with a garrison that remained until Harley took over and left it to 'public use'. When the new dining hall for the Vicars Choral was built, the castle stone was used and so we have the present situation where there is no sign of any castle buildings other than the possible commander's house.

WAR MEMORIAL CLOCK IN MUCH BIRCH CHURCH DEDICATED TO THOSE WHO LOST THEIR LIVES IN THE WAR OF 1914 TO 1918

In this year of the 100th anniversary of the commencement of World War 1, it seems appropriate to recount the history of the War Memorial Clock in Much Birch Church, which commemorates those of the local community who were lost in the conflict, and which has been part of the village life since its installation in 1920. Research of the records held in the church show the steps taken towards the installation.

The clock was built by T.M. Hartley (thought to be of the Hartley's Jam family) and the first historical fact was documented as a letter to him from a Rev. Groves of Much Birch Parish on 5th August 1919, requesting the costing of manufacturing and erecting a War Memorial Commemorative Clock in the tower of Much Birch Church. His quote for a 4-foot diameter clock which would strike on the hour was £84. 'The clock would have gravity escapement and a compensated pendulum which would maintain the power of the clock.' This quote did not include the work to be carried out by masons and carpenters. After T.M. Hartley inspected the tower, he then quoted an additional figure of £5 to £7 to cover scaffolding for 2 days' work and which would also include the making of a

plain timber case for the clock movement. On file were also additional quotes from Oswin & Co of Hereford and J.G. Wall & Son of Ross-on-Wye. As part of the decision making on who should be awarded the contract for the work, correspondence took place between the Vicars of Bassenthwaite, Cumberland and Much Birch, regarding the condition of a similar clock installed in Bassenthwaite Church by Mr. Hartley, who resided in Cumberland at that time. The recommendation was "to the best of my knowledge the clock is quite a satisfactory timekeeper" since it was installed 15 years previously.

The decision was taken locally to commission Mr. Hartley and work commenced,. However, about that time Rev. Groves still followed up by seeking information on Mr. Hartley's work and reputation from a Rev Harold Chaffer of St. Phillips, Dorridge, Birmingham. Rev Chaffer replied that Mr. Hartley had moved from Cumberland to Birmingham to undertake engineering work as a skilled mechanic related to war work. He had no clock reputation but his work generally 'was well defined and carefully executed' and he found him conscientious and painstaking in everything he had undertaken. The records show that local subscribers had by then contributed £110.11.6d. With interest, this amounted to £114.2.8d., which covered the final total cost.

In October 1919, it appears that work was delayed because of an iron moulders' strike, which subsequently continued for some time, but eventually work commenced on the installation in October 1920 although Mr. Hartley was at that time busy on work in other parts of the country. A local builder by the name of V.P. Court did the preliminary work by erecting scaffolding at a cost of £5.17.5d and the carpenter's work amounted to £2.16.9d; the clock itself cost £76.00

From correspondence on file is apparent that other renovations took place in the church at the same time, which culminated in a 'Re-Opening of the Church' Service on Sunday, 14th November 1920 after refurbishment, when the clock was dedicated together with the memorial tablet which is situated inside the church, by the Bishop of Hereford. The clock then struck every hour and needed to be wound twice a week. There were initially some teething problems with the function of the clock, partly due to dust caused by work in the church, but the last letter on file was from Mr. Hartley who had looked at the timekeeping of the

clock and was surprised to be told that the local time is usually somewhat different to that in Hereford!

Following mechanical problems in 2004, the clock was refurbished in its entirety by the Cumbria Clock Company, which carries out clock maintenance throughout the UK. The company removed the entire clock, including the clock face and mechanism, to Cumbria enlisting the help of a rock climbers and abseilers to lower and later reinstall the clock face. After this, a yearly maintenance contract was instigated, the cost of which is met by Much Birch Parish Council, who, as with other councils, hold financial responsibility for upkeep of war memorials.

When the clock stopped in January 2005, it was discovered that the independent automatic winding mechanism, designed, constructed and installed by two local engineers Robin Allum and Ron Blewitt in October 1989, had failed. It was revealed that the mechanism was made up of parts of a washing machine and the gears from a Raleigh bicycle, which was driven by an electric motor and switched on automatically by a float switch. It was established that the motor had burnt out and this was subsequently repaired locally and remains in good working order today.

The clock is of benefit to the whole community and it is of exceptional quality and considerable merit. People expressed concern when it was not in good working order and therefore supported the work done. With care and good regular maintenance, the clock will remain an appropriate acknowledgement of those that were lost for many years to come.

I believe that the whole audience left with an appreciation of her expertise and lively personality. I also undertook a driving assessment by one of the observers. One of the best £15 I have spent for a long time!" David Williams, IAM Herefordshire's chairman, sums up the need for Refresher Days for Older Drivers by saying "Driving on today's roads should be every bit as enjoyable for the older driver as for anyone else. It's about learning the skill of being in the right
