Based on the book by the same name and directed by **Clint Eastwood**, it tells the story of how the three surviving flag-raisers were used as propaganda tools by the United States government to lift the morale of the American people and raise money for the war effort.

A Service to Celebrate the life of LYNNE BAKER was held on Monday, 15th October at Much Birch Church conducted by the Rev. Kay Garlick and readings were given by members of the family.

Lynne was born in Norfolk and had a sister, Pat. They were educated at the Masonic School in London and Lynne proved to be a fine athlete as well as a very bright pupil. Unfortunately, her athletics career was cut short by a serious foot injury. She completed her education at college where she was found to have a high IQ and finished the top student in the country in the RSA examinations. As a result, she entered the banking profession and held a senior post in Lombard's Bank, which involved travelling the country to pick out potential sites for new branches as well as interviewing potential staff. She was given a free hand to choose a car and being Lynne, selected a Triumph Stag. It's not hard to imagine her driving around

with the top down and her hair flying in the wind! She met and married Roger Baker and they had 2 children, Clive and Victoria. When the children were in their mid teens the marriage unfortunately broke down which badly affected Lynne, and ill health dogged her for the rest of her life. She came to live in Much Birch to be housekeeper to Terry Mock and the family have always been grateful to him for sticking by her in good times and bad. In her good times she was a good debater and in meetings was never afraid to ask pertinent questions which many of us would have avoided. She was well read and her taste in music was very catholic. Her faith in God was absolute even in her dark days when she spent lengthy spells in the Stonebow Unit. The Garlicks and the Dinnens stood by her at times when it could be very frustrating to understand her personality changes which, of course, were part and parcel of her illness. She was a real character and we send to Clive and Victoria and their families and to her sister, Pat, our deepest sympathies. Her body was cremated on Friday 12th October and her ashes were interred at Much Birch on Monday after the service.

Fern Gwinnett

Many of you have supported Fern in her fundraising towards the Expedition to Borneo and have asked how it all went. Fern has had a particularly busy summer. After finishing her GCSE exams she set off (on the wettest of wet July weekends) for Borneo. One member of the group was unable to get through the floods to join the party and the journey to Heathrow was eventful with floods deep enough to get into the luggage compartment of the coach and a U turn being necessary on a flooded dual carriage way. The expedition part of the trip involved exploring a tropical valley called Danum Valley where they encountered leeches in embarrassing places, showered in rain storms and had to sleep in a tropical storm.

The group were also involved with aspects of conservation and gained a deep insight into the problems of deforestation for logging and palm oil plantations. They visited the Sepilok Orangutan sanctuary and were also lucky enough to see these amazing creatures in the wild.

The main part of the expedition was working with a very remote village who have been badly affected by deforestation and they have no resources to make basic progress. The group split into two, some of them helping to rebuild a bridge which was the only way into and out of this isolated community and the others (Fern's group) helped to install a water supply and a public bath for the mothers to collect water and wash their children. Fern learned many new skills including building block walls and concreting. She worked with the locals and visited their homes which was a real privilege. The experience was fantastic and Fern would like to thank all of you who helped her along the way and enabled her to take part.

Upon her return Fern had to quickly prepare for her next major adventure. Many of you know that Fern was one of two British students selected by United World Colleges to spend two years studying at the Mahindra United World College of India which is 40 miles from Pune. Fern has now been in India for 6 weeks and has already had some amazing experiences. Although she has been quite unwell for over month she has already been on hikes, climbed a mountain, spent a weekend in Bombay (Mumbai), visited the Ellora and Ajanta caves and 'the poor mans Taj Mahal', which are all spectacular cultural sights. However, it's definitely not a holiday. The academic study is intense and demanding, with all of the students being very intelligent. The competition is stiff and Fern is finding that many students from other countries have studied the subjects at greater depth than we do. She is learning Hindi so that she can communicate with the locals when she does her community and charity work.

Fern has to share a room with three other students, all of whom are from different continents. This is quite a challenge for someone who has always had their own bedroom. The students at the college are from all over the world all contributing their cultural differences to college life. In addition to the subjects that Fern has to take for the

International Baccalaureate (A level equivalent) she also has to study global issues and this is India, which keeps them up to date on Indian issues and culture.

The college campus is built on a mountain side with far reaching spectacular views. They are restoring the tropical rain forest that once existed where the college stands and there is a large nature reserve within the campus. One of the unusual aspects of living there is the snakes. There are 9 species of snake on campus including deadly Cobras and Vipers so students have to be informed of what to do if the worst should happen.

Thank you to all of you who continue to be interested in Fern's adventures. She will be looking for a job next summer from June – August to help out with her costs so if any of you have any ideas let us know.

Neighbourhood Watch Safety

On a safety note, the nights are starting to draw in and for those who walk or cycle in the area it is time to check whether you are safe on the roads.

Cyclists.

- At night you must have front and rear lights lit. The cycle must also be fitted with a red rear reflector and amber pedal reflectors. White front reflectors and wheel reflectors will also help.
- Light coloured and reflective clothing should also be worn. Reflective belts, arm and ankle bands are also suggested.

Pedestrians.

- Avoid walking with your back to the traffic.
- Wear or carry something light or reflective.
