As mentioned elsewhere, Sister MICHELLE TYDEMAN is retiring after serving the community for over 20 years as Practice Nurse at Much Birch Surgery. There will be a party on 30th December to say "Thank You" and wish her well in her retirement.

Several weeks ago now, Princess Anne visited Holme Lacy and the 'Riding for the Disabled' unit. The visit was reported together with a photograph in the 'Hereford Times'. Unfortunately, HEATHER WATHEN did not feature in that photograph but she was introduced to the Princess and the family have a lovely photograph of 'the handshake', of which they are very proud. Heather has worked tirelessly for the unit for many years, as has CELIA BAKER, of Hollybush Lane. We congratulate both on their fine record.

Sadly, CLARE ATKINSON of 'Hampden House', Little Birch Road, died on 18th October, at the age of 89 years. Clare was born in Kelona, Canada and on the outbreak of WW2 joined the Royal Canadian Air Force. He flew Catalina bombers and at one stage was posted to Co. Fermanagh in Northern Ireland. He was not actually flying on the day in question, but his colleagues happened to spot the German cruiser, 'Bismarck', which had escaped temporarily through the fog, from the chase of the British navy, and successfully torpedoed her. Clare also spent a posting at RAF Locking, near Weston super Mare. After the war, he returned to Canada and worked in a bank. He could not settle in this job and asked his father if he could go farming in England. Some friends of the family got in touch with the Powell family at Newton Farm, Belmont and Clare was invited to come and stay. So began a friendship that has lasted for over 50 years and it was most fitting that Mr. Derek Powell gave a tribute to Clare, outlining his

early years in Herefordshire. Clare spent about six months at Newton Farm and then looked after cows and livestock on several other farms. It was when working for Mr. Sidney Andrews at Sutton St. Nicholas, that Clare met Sylvia, who was working as a Milk Recorder. They were married in July 1951 and went to live in a cottage at Brockhampton. In due time, Jane and Chris were born here.

Clare had always wanted to have his own dairy farm and so the family moved to White House Farm, Vowchurch and again, in due time, Jonathan and Rosamond were born. After 5 years or so at Vowchurch, and with the larger family to support, Clare sold the farm and joined Sun Valley Poultry in 1964, being appointed Cold-Store manager. The family moved to 'Hampden House' in 1965 and Clare set about creating a large vegetable garden to the rear and lawn and borders to the front. This took a lot of hard work as the whole plot was on a steep slope. In 1972, Clare was appointed Scout Leader for the Much Birch Troop, which met at the Memorial Hall, King's Thorn and led the Troop with great energy and enthusiasm for about 15 years. Many of the young men in this area have said how much they owe to Clare for the training and guidance, which he gave to them in their formative, teenage years. Clare stayed with Sun Valley until he retired in 1987 and then returned on a part time basis as a factory guide for visiting parties. He had always kept himself very fit and at the age of 65, completed the Hereford Half Marathon just to prove to himself that he could do it. Being a keen gardener, Clare became a member of the KT and LB Gardening Club, when this was formed in 1984. He served on the Committee for 10 years and worked very hard behind the scenes in so many ways. He was always first there to set up for the Annual Show and acted as steward for the Fruit and Vegetable Judge on many occasions. He also involved the Scouts in the mini Agricultural Show, which started in 1977. In fact, the whole family have been very supportive of village activities.

Sylvia and Clare were faithful members of Much Birch Church, where Clare did sidesman duties for many years. He also loved to play indoor bowls and was a member of HARA and Wormelow Indoor Bowling Club for many years. Clare's funeral service took place on 27th October at Little Birch Church and was conducted by Rev. Keith Blackburn. The Church was full with family and friends, such was the high regard in which Clare was held. After Derek Powell's reflection, Jane gave her tribute to her father. Her first memories began when she was able to walk and always wanted a story. Clare would relate his encounter with a grizzly bear when he went exploring in the mountains near his Canadian home and this was repeated over and over again to her brothers and sister and the grandchildren as they were growing up. Only in later years did they find out that the story was not strictly true but he did have a pioneering and adventurous spirit in his younger days. He was always an 'outdoors man 'and took the family on many outings, including a visit to Weston super Mare and the re-opening of the pier in the 1950's. He was a great provider and in the garden grew so many beans that many were given away, "Enough to feed King's Thorn". When the children were making their way in the world, he supported them all the way, even if he did not agree entirely with what they wanted to do. Over the last few years, Clare looked after Sylvia so well that, with his non-stop care, she was able to stay at home until a few months ago He then became ill himself and was cared for at the Old Rectory until he had to move into West Bank as well.

On the Order of Service, there is a lovely photograph of Clare with his 'trademark' smile. The service was followed by internment in Little Birch Churchyard. Clare was a loving husband and devoted father and grandfather and we send to Sylvia, Jane, Chris and Helen and their children, Melanie, Luke and Rhys, Jonathan and Sally and their children, Ben and Evie, and Ros and her children, Charlotte and Nicholas, our deepest sympathies. Clare will be sorely missed by the family and so many friends.

The death of DENNIS HANDS at the age of 86, erstwhile of King's Thorn, has also been recorded. Dennis with his wife, Betty, lived in Aconbury Close since the mid 1960's at 'Mayhill Lodge', which he designed

himself. Dennis was an architect and was with Hereford Council for many years and then joined the firm of Scriven, Powell and James as principal. In the 1970's, he did the drawings for the King's Thorn Bus Shelter. Dennis was the driving force at Wormelow Cricket Club during the 1970's and 80's, serving as secretary during a difficult time for the club, when many feared it would not survive. It then went on to become established in the then newly-formed Hereford and District cricket league. Dennis was born in Gloucestershire and grew up to be a very correct batsman. At Wormelow, he became one of the club's heaviest run-scorers and was an excellent close fielder. He was also a long standing member of the Whitecross Squash Club. A hip-replacement curtailed playing cricket and squash so he then took up golf, with typical enthusiasm. At the age of 80, he was honoured by being made President of Wormelow Cricket Club. Dennis did meticulous drawings of more churches and buildings than 150 in Herefordshire and the ones at New Mills and Rowlston's Barn are mentioned in the Local History Book, 'Little Birch on Aconbury Hill'. Dennis also gave an illustrated talk to 'The Forum' group in the 1980's. Dennis and Betty moved to Cornwall about a year ago to be near their son, Michael, and his family. We send to them all our sincere condolences.

The death of OLIVE SAYELL has just been sadly announced but her funeral has not taken place before this Newsletter is printed and so a tribute will be given next month.

A number of generous contributions towards the production of the Newsletter have been received over the last few months and these are gratefully acknowledged.

Faster Broadband Services

BT is in the process of increasing the speed of Broadband services throughout the UK by introducing fibre optic cables. Pub night

Around 100 people dropped in at the Pub Night held at Little Birch Village Hall on 6th November. It was great to meet up with people whom we don't so often get the opportunity to see now. About £300 was raised towards the Castle Inn Action Group. Many thanks to all those who came and supported us and also to the Silver Branch and Beccy Cameron who entertained us so well with their music.

Hereford Cathedral's Secrets

Penny Platts gave us a fascinating and wellsupported talk in Little Birch Village Hall on 21st October. She began by telling us of the foundation of the cathedral, which is secular, although the date of the first building is not entirely clear. A Saxon building preceeded the present one which was built by the Normans in Romanesque style and with 'peapod' carvings. Much of this remains but the Lady Chapel is later – transitional period - and the west end dates from 1920s, a replacement for repairs after the collapse in 1786. Before this the nave had extended to the pavement.

We were then taken on a virtual tour of the inside of the cathedral visiting various tombs and looking at many other items with many an interesting tale on the way. The shrines of St Ethelbert and St. Thomas Cantilupe were shown, the former became an attraction for pilgrims from the 800s and the latter from 1320. Some of the tombs (which are of former bishops and local notable people) suffered damage in the Civil War when the cathedral was used as a stable but were saved the worst excesses by Col. Birch who said 'we are not barbarians'. Bishop Audley's chantry chapel still has painted decoration on the stonework and Penny emphasised how the whole cathedral was filled with bright colours before the Reformation, supposedly to give people a view of heaven.

Our virtual tour included many other items of interest such as the eagle lectern, the new corona in memory of Bishop Eastaugh, the altar table, Stephen's chair (dated 1138, he declared himself king in Hereford), the organ, refurbished with money from Bulmer's, the bishop's seat and the misericords dating from We were told that a new the 1300s. decorated metal screen had been installed for the International Exhibition in 1862 but was removed and returned to maker in 1967 to open up the high altar. It is now in the V and A. There is some medieval stained glass remaining but most is newer, we were told we could recognise the medieval as the faces were in semi-profile and eyes looked out of the corners! The Chapter House with magnificent fan-vaulted ceiling fell into disrepair and was demolished after the Civil War as lead was removed from the roof.

The chained library, modelled on the Bodlean, was originally in the Lady Chapel which was closed in the Civil War. The library was removed to the room above the porch in 1841 then installed in the new building in 1996 along with the Mappa Mundi, re-located from its insignificant cupboard in the north aisle. The chained library contains books dating from the 8th century. The Mappa Mundi, dating from the 1300s, was a probable teaching aid and possible marketing tool for the canonisation of St Thomas Cantilupe, and is now one of the major attractions of Hereford.

This was an incredibly informative talk and beautifully illustrated. It will certainly encourage us to go and have a look for ourselves.

Report of Meeting held on Wednesday 3rd November 2010

No interests were declared.

Matters Arising

Village Hall – Several successful events have taken place including the Postman's Retirement Party and Historical Talks. Eight new whist tables have been purchased and the insurance which now covers historical walks is to be paid by Direct Debit over 12 months. Events included a Historical Walk on 25th November. Still to come are Christmas Bingo on 2nd December and the New Year's Eve Party.

Parish Lengthsman –No further work to be completed until next year.

Parish Initiative – No further defects reported.

Community Led Plan – Steering Group Meetings were held on 15th September, 6th October and 17th November where Sophie Pryce (Community First) described in detail the Planning for Real event.

Parish Field – Justin Usherwood to be contacted as none of his previous contact details are still relevant.

Emergency Planning Coordinator – Mr Morley attended the Parish Council Resilience Co-ordinator Event and gave feedback with a recommendation that an emergency plan is to be created and published within the Community Led Plan. All Parish Councillors agreed.

Planning - Planning application for Bromley Court, Hoarwithy for the construction of one new poultry unit, to include control room and two feed bins - DMS/102576/F – returned with no objections.

Any Other Business

CSO K. Powell informed the Parish Council that there was no recorded crime for Little Birch however there have been scrap metal, fuel and farm machinery thefts from surrounding areas.

John Penrice has agreed to fulfil the role of Internal Auditor and complete intermittent audits throughout the financial year.

Parish Councillors were given a copy of the Newsletter Accounts and all agreed to pay the annual payment of $\pounds 200.00$.

Mr Morley attended the HALC AGM & SAM Meeting and recommended that Little Birch Parish Council continues to subscribe to HALC. All Parish Councillors agreed.

The external auditors (Mazars) have completed the annual audit for 2009/10.

Correspondence has been received from the Ramblers Association concerning footpaths LB17 & LB19. Mr Dillon (Footpaths Officer) will investigate.

There have been a number of rumours about the reopening of The Castle Inn pub. Clerk to send an email to Anthony Bush and Lisa Hughes for further clarification.

The Parish Council agreed a precept of $\pounds 2300.00$ for the 2011/2012 financial year.

An email has been received from Pixley Parish Council requesting support for their issue of limiting the maximum speed limit throughout Herefordshire to 50mph. Clerk to reply that Little Birch Parish Council does not support this initiative.

Clerk to reply to Herefordshire Council's email that there are details within the ldf consultation with which the Parish Council does not agree.

It is almost six years since the launch of the 100 club and we are proposing to run it again during the next 12 months. The aim continues to be to raise funds for the development of the hall for the benefit of the communities of Much Birch and the surrounding areas.

I would like to start with a huge thank you to those of you who have contributed so far by subscribing to the 100 Club over the years and I do hope that you will continue your membership during this next year.

During 2010 we were able to pursue, with the help of grants from the organisations 'Welcome To Our Future', Herefordshire Council and the Big Lottery with their 'Awards For All' Grant, the building of the new Resource/Meeting room and updating the heating system. Crime Trends

Overnight on Saturday 13th/Sunday 14th November, a battery was stolen from a tractor at a farm in Garway - the scrap value for batteries has gone up considerably and we are receiving more and more reports of such thefts in rural areas.

Several ceramic pots and an iron garden seat were stolen from an isolated property up for sale in Callow sometime last month.

Overnight on Monday 15th/Tuesday 16th November a cement mixer, disc cutter and a ladder were stolen from a builders yard in Pontrilas.

Suspicious vehicles

On the 1st November 4 car ramps were taken from a car repair centre in Allensmore. On the 2nd November S538O*T was seen acting suspiciously in Ballingham. People were also seen nearby possibly poaching. Please keep an eye out for this vehicle. Enquiries are ongoing as to the registered keeper's reason for being at this location.

On the 3rd November petrol was taken from a car in Much Dewchurch and a loading bucket was taken from a farm in Much Birch. Numerous items were stolen from a farm in Orcop. Items included an off road motorbike, a quad bike, a trailer, various tools a lawn mower and also 2 electric egg washers.

On the 4th Nov, diesel was taken from a farm in St Weonards however many drums full of fuel were left at the scene. Offenders were possibly disturbed.

7th November. A vehicle was seen acting suspiciously on Rotherwas industrial estate N140*VS. A light blue pick up. Please report any sightings of this vehicle to us asap.

9th November diesel was taken from a vehicle at Rotherwas Ind Estate. Again offenders may have been disturbed as the drums were again left at the scene.

11th November a property at Wormelow was burgled. A barn was entered and numerous items were taken. Items included an Ifor Williams Trailer, strimmers and a motorised children's jeep.

At 05:45 on the 13th November milk was taken off a residents drive in Llanwarne. A vehicle was heard coming onto the drive with its radio playing very loudly.

At around 12.15 on 16th November a small white van WJ0*UXU called at a farm near Rotherwas, the occupants, two males with Irish accents, were offering chainsaws from the back of the vehicle. The same vehicle had been spotted in How Caple earlier that day.

The same day, a yellow high sided Ford transit pick-up Y2**FOD called at a business premises in Kingstone, the occupants were asking if there was any wood for sale. The occupants had Welsh accents.

On Wednesday and Thursday this week a blue Ford Fiesta FG1*PHK was seen on several occasions in our area, the Irish occupants were offering second hand chainsaws. They were also spotted on Dyffed Powys area. If you have similar callers, let us know, and **never buy anything** from them!

Also on Friday at about 4.45pm, two Welsh males in a green VW Golf P84*LKJ called at a farm and business premises in Wormbridge, when challenged, they had a story of looking for a lost dog. The males were described as white, early 20's, wearing light coloured jackets, one had a trilby hat on, and one had a blue tattoo on the right side of his neck, going to under his ear.

More chainsaws were on offer from the occupants of a black VW Touareg estate YH08YC* yesterday afternoon. They were in Wormbridge, Orcop and Kilpeck, offering Stihl chainsaws for £150. Patrols spent some time searching for the vehicle but were unsuccessful.

Yet another vehicle offering chainsaws for sale, this time a white Citroen Berlingo WJ03UX* called at a farm in Orcop yesterday about 4pm, again officers were despatched to the area but once again there was no trace of the vehicle.

Finally, on Wednesday morning a van with a winch on the rear, called at a property in Llanwarne, the male occupant asked the householder if he could do some work on their property, when they refused to do business with him, the male was rude, but left the property. The registration of the vehicle was similar to L989DOC - if you can help with identifying this vehicle, please let us know. The male is described as about 50 years old with a very dark beard, close cropped.

All these reports of suspicious vehicles have been called in by readers of our briefings, and we would like to say 'thanks', and keep the calls coming. Please be assured that all are followed up, where possible the occupants are spoken to, and intelligence reports are filed. In some cases intelligence markers are placed on the vehicles so they will show up on our ANPR cameras, so we can keep track of their whereabouts!
