A reminder please, that salt grit is supplied for our roads, and is not intended for personal use.

It was interesting to hear of the purchase of various items designed to help in these conditions: TYRE SOCKS which are placed on the drive wheels of a car, and enabled one resident to travel from Hereford and then up Barrack Hill when others had long given it up as a bad job. Also, for the feet, ICE GRIPS, that can be fitted over shoes and boots. Both items can be found on the internet.

#### PARKING DURING BAD WEATHER

The following notice has been received from the Clerk to Little Birch Parish Council:-

Little Birch Parish Council have received complaints about the selfish parking around King's Thorn bus stop during the bad weather, with a number of near miss accidents occurring. These parked vehicles caused enormous hazards to other drivers by reducing the size of driveable area on already very dangerous roads. slippery, Before Christmas this led to the bus service declaring the road unsafe for buses, and ceased the service from visiting King's This during a period Thorn. when residents really needed the bus service!

It is understandable that residents should want to park overnight in this area in order to get out to work the next morning, but many cars were not moved for several days.

Drivers should park with consideration and avoid causing hazards and congestion. It is illegal to park on or around a road junction, as well as on the bus stop. West Mercia Police are now aware of the complaints, and agreed that sending them photographic evidence of the cars and their plates may be a solution to ensure that vehicles are parked responsibly.

#### LOCAL NEWS

A belated welcome is given to JACY and JOHN KINROSS, who moved into Ash View, at the top of Tump Lane, some months ago. John is an author and his latest book is entitled, 'Discovering Scotland's Smallest Churches'.

It is with sadness that the death of JOHN WEALE, of Tump Lane, is recorded. John was born in 1923 at 'Broughton Cross', the minor cross roads, half way down Hollybush Lane. His father was the village blacksmith and having the forge at this strategic crossroads was very important for horse drawn vehicles, as the main Hereford/Ross road went along Hollybush Lane opposite Cleaver. the Axe and At Broughton Cross, traffic to Much Birch and Hereford would travel up Hollybush Lane, onto the existing, but much narrower, main road and on to Hereford via King's Thorn and through to Callow, turning down past Callow Church and on through Grafton. Horse drawn traffic to Little Birch and Aconbury would go straight on at Broughton Cross and down 'Conigre Lane', past 'Strickstenning' and on up to Church Farm and Little Birch Church.

Iohn attended Much Birch School and his contemporaries were the Manning sons from Minster Farm and the Cooke boys from Much Birch. Leaving school at 14 years of age, he had several jobs in the locality until he was 18, when he was called into the Army in WW2. He was drafted into the RASC, where he learned to drive both cars and lorries, transporting vital supplies. He also became a favourite 'chauffeur' for а particular General.

With the experience of driving trucks, John joined the Fire Hereford Service in after demobilisation, a job which he enjoyed for many years. At this time, he met Betty and they were married at Cyngenedd in Wales, which was a pretty small village in 1946, with a pub, a church and a couple of houses and cottages and hasn't changed that much over the years. They started married life in Church Cottage, just behind Much Birch Church, and lived there for about 10 years, during which time, David and John were born. In the mid 1950's, the estate in Tump Lane was being developed and the family moved there in

1955, when Colin was born, and John senior had lived there ever since. With the 3 sons at Much Birch School and then Haywood John went to work at Wiggins for 15 years whilst Betty supplemented the family income by working alongside other mothers 'on the land', including fruit picking at Court Farm for Col. Howorth.

After his time at Wiggins, John went back into driving, first with George and Tudors, the builders merchants, then to Dave Price's, delivering lime and slag to farmers near and far, then to Ron Jackson and Blue Circle at Stretton the Sugwas gravel quarry and finally to Saunders Valves in Grandstand Road, from where he retired at the age of 61 when the company closed down. John's early retirement was a blessing as he did get time together with Betty, until her untimely death at the age of 61.

John was always proud of his family and they were a great comfort to him as a widower. The grandchildren brought a new focus and lease of life and again with the arrival of great grandchildren. The family were pretty much all boys for so many years but the latest great granddaughter was the first Weale girl to be born in 106 years!

Arthritis badly affected John's mobility for many years and music of all sorts was a great consolation. His family took him to airshows and he particularly enjoyed the trips to Fairford and elsewhere. More recently, a large screen ΤV enhanced his enjoyment of his favourite programmes. Sadly, his youngest son, Colin, died in March 2010 and this was a bitter blow to John. In 1991, John underwent a

successful triple bypass heart operation, which did somewhat ease his health problems. A few weeks before Christmas, he was admitted to the County Hospital and although he came back home, his condition deteriorated and he passed peacefully away. The funeral service was held at <sup>11th</sup>. the Crematorium on January, conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson, from whose address these notes have been taken. We send to David and John and their families our deepest sympathy. John will be very much missed by them, his neighbours, and all who knew him.

Dear Local Residents,

Knowing how much many of you enjoy walking in Aconbury Wood it was suggested that I give you an update about activities in the Wood.

The Duchy's general aim is to reduce the number of conifers in Aconbury and grow mostly native hardwoods instead; some further felling of conifers will take place in 2011 with subsequent replanting of hardwood species.

You will also see some more of the sweet chestnut being coppiced. Coppicing involves cutting stems off at stump level so that multiple stems then grow from the same stump; it is a particularly productive system. With sweet chestnut. the coppice cycle is about 15 years by which point the stems are of a size to yield excellent fencing posts and stakes (which are naturally durable and which we use on the Duchy estate). Hazel is another species that can be coppiced but usually on shorter cycle of 6 - 8 years; the Duchy uses cut hazel stems for stakes and binders (or 'hetherings') for hedge-laying. Coppicing has a long tradition in this country

and offers many benefits including for biodiversity.

With regard to the hill fort, the Duchy is hoping to continue some clearance on the ramparts so that these boundary features are not damaged by tree roots and are generally better seen; all such work is carried out in agreement with English Heritage.

The Wye Wood Project has moved from Aconbury Wood to another Duchy Wood nearby; the Project continues to deliver valuable training and education to local people.

I am very glad that so many local eniov walking people in Aconbury Wood and that the vast majority do so verv responsibly. Can I appeal to dog owners, however, to please clear up any dog mess; there is a problem with this particularly near the main entrance to the wood and it makes it most unpleasant for other walkers and those working in the wood. Can I also remind horse-riders that you must purchase a permit to ride in the woods; please write to the address below for a permit.

He was sure the new room would be a great asset to an already well used building. Then, to a packed hall of invited guests, the Bishop cut the ribbon to officially open the new room. Following a brief vote of thanks from the Rev Mark Johnson, the flooded with new room, sunshine, was viewed by the gathering, with several guests taking their refreshments at the tables. Most people were surprised at the size and lightness of the room with immediate enquires for bookings.

#### Report on the Parish Council Meetings in November & December 2010

## Proposed bus stop near the Old Shop King's Thorn:

The Parish Council have been in discussions with Herefordshire Council regarding a request for a bus stop near the Old Shop, Kings Thorne. Herefordshire Council have indicated that although a stop could be provided in that area, they have some road safety concerns.

It has been advised by parishioners that there was a stop at the location of the Old Shop some years ago. To prove the existence of the stop the Parish Council ask parishioners that if they recall a stop existing at this location would they please write to the Parish Clerk with details to help compile a submission report for to Herefordshire Council advising them of that past existence.

### Parking Issues in the Parish during bad weather:

Parishioners are asked **not** to park on or near junctions or pavements during bad weather. Parking of vehicles has been causing difficulty for road users with visibility at junctions and for those walking on pavements. **Highways Issues reported to AMEY:**

There is no immediate replacement for my position and due to the financial situation all such posts have been put on hold, pending a reorganisation that will take place in the coming months.

#### **CRIME TRENDS**

Overnight on 7th/8th January, an attempt was made to steal a battery from a tractor at St Weonards. The tractor was in an open shed, and the suspects had removed the battery and left it on the floor, they were possibly disturbed by the farmers dogs barking.

However, thieves were more successful overnight on 9th/10th January at another farm near St Weonards, when three tractor batteries were taken, two were taken off machines, and the third was being charged at the time.

Between 10pm on Friday 7th January and 8am on Monday 10th January some industrial equipment was stolen from an industrial unit on the Holme Lacy Road, Rotherwas. The items are described as three stainless steel 'Orga' screws, about 9" diameter and 12 feet long, very heavy, and worth over a thousand pounds. A padlock was removed from the gate to the unit, and the 'screws' were taken from a pallet where they were stored at the rear of the premises.

On 11th January, a householder in Orcop discovered that aprox 400 litres of heating oil had been stolen sometime over the previous week

Overnight last night, a quad bike was stolen from a yard near Pontrilas, it was green in colour with a 1300cc engine. It had been chained up in an open barn, it appears that bolt cutters were used to cut it free. Unfortunately, the owner of the bike is away and we do not have the make or other details of the stolen item at present. There were also diesel tanks at the property that appear to have been tampered with.

Between 11th and 12th January, an attempt was made to steal heating oil from a tank inside a barn at a property on Saddlebow Hill, Orcop. The offenders were possibly disturbed as the occupier found the top unscrewed and a pipe leading to a bucket.

Between 8th and 11th January, 3 batteries were taken from tractors at a farm in Broad Oak. Several hundred litres of heating oil was stolen from a tank at a domestic property in Broad Oak over the past couple of weeks. <u>Suspicious vehicles</u> At about 11.30am last Monday 17th, a white Nissan van FG03KL\* was in the Much Birch area touting for scrap. The two male occupants spoke with Irish accents.

#### TAX REFUND EMAIL SCAM WARNING

There is currently a scam email in circulation, which purports to be from HM Revenue & Customs. The email tells the recipient that they are due a tax refund of approx £180. Recipients are asked to complete an attached claim form (giving bank details, card verification numbers and bank password) to receive the refund. Should you receive anything similar - IGNORE IT - DON'T SEND ANY INFORMATION. This is a "phishing" exercise, which could result in accounts being used fraudulently to obtain large amounts of money. HMRC have confirmed that they have never offered refunds by email

#### **CRIME PREVENTION**

Many people will have received valuable Christmas presents or treated themselves during the January sales, so it is timely to remind you about the importance of property marking, and also to inform you of a new "Immobilise". scheme \_ Property marking is of prime importance and you should all hopefully be aware of property marking solutions such as

"SmartWater" which is still available to you from your Local Policing Team.. For any of you wishing to purchase SmartWater packs feel free to get in touch with us.

Another useful way people can help themselves is to register their property on the "Immobilise" database http://www.immobilise.com

What is the Immobilise database?

Immobilise is supported by the Home Office and used by the majority of UK police forces. It is a free website which allows individuals to create a database their personal property of including serial numbers and even photos. The database is accessible to police forces nationally, and in the event that recorded property is lost or stolen, it can be flagged as such on the website by the user. This officers alerts should they subsequently recover property check and it against the database.

Please take time to have a look at the website and register your property.

#### FUEL THEFT WARNING

West Mercia Police is urging residents that use oil to heat their properties to be extra vigilant following fuel thefts in the county. Hundreds of litres of heating oil were stolen from a local farm property near St Weonards, Hereford on Tuesday (11 January). Also 500 litres was Wood, from Arrow stolen Kington (12 January). A number of similar thefts have also occurred recently in Shropshire and Worcestershire.

Sgt David Bishop at Hereford Police Station said: "While this not a large problem, we have noticed a slight increase in such crimes in the county. It is possibly due to the increase in fuel costs over recent months so they become may more prevalent across the country. We are warning local people who heating use oil to take precautions against being targeted by thieves. "Among other security tips, we recommend fitting an alarm which rings if the oil level suddenly drops or installing security lights to alert residents when there are intruders." "Residents are also urged to keep any eye out for unusual activity or vehicles and report anything suspicious as soon as possible on 0300 3000, 333 or ring **Crimestoppers** anonymously on o8oo 555111. Of course, if you see a theft in progress, call 999." Sgt Bishop recommends the following hints and tips, which can help reduce the chances of heating oil being stolen from your property.

Plant shrubs or install fences to hide your tank from view. This is especially important if you live close to the road - although heating oil theft has also been known to occur at secluded properties with long drives. Remember to check your tank's oil levels on a regular basis. Where possible, install security lighting that covers your tank and the immediate surrounding area. If your tank is openly accessible to all, consider resiting it to an area or building where it is better protected. Be extra vigilant of tankers or large vehicles close to your property. Note down any suspicious vehicles' registration numbers and report them to the police.

If your tank is located in an outbuilding, ensure it is kept

locked and secured at all times. Remove any empty containers or drums from the immediate area - they could draw attention to the presence of your oil tank. Deter the thieves from entering your property by installing and using lockable gates and by maintaining boundaries and perimeter fencing.

#### KINGSTHORNE VILLAGE COMMUNITY NEWSLETTER

February 1977

The Open Meeting, held in the Village Hall on January  $27^{th}$ , was very well attended when between 80 and 100 people turned up despite the rain.

Mr. David Dyke, who was in the chair, gave a brief history of the Hall since its inception some 25 years ago and explained the purpose of the present meeting. He emphasised the 'tremendous effort' made by the local community at that time in raising the very considerable sum of £2,000 (equivalent to about £25,0000 today!) in the space of three years and hoped that as much effort would be put in by the local folk today to make the Hall a worthy centre of social life for the whole community.

Mr. Dyke made it clear that the venture would be conducted on a 'non-religious, non-parish, non-political basis' and would be open to everybody in the neighbourhood to take part. This is obviously such an important point that it is perhaps worth quoting the original paragraph written when these matters were first discussed. "Every effort will be made to avoid any kind of division of the community, whether by age, social grouping, natives and non-natives, religion, church and non-church, haves and have-nots etc. The programme of activities will reflect this by its variety and wide scope and its attempt to cater for all ages and types of people".

Following Mr. Dyke's introduction two speakers outlined the aims and objects of the venture, giving details of the activities which it was hoped to hold, necessary work on the Hall, funds required etc. It was stressed that nothing could be achieved without good will, enthusiasm hard work and, of course some hard cash.. Both speakers referred to the necessity to get the whole family involved in as many activities as possible, so that a true community spirit could be achieved.

During the tea break, the Hall buzzed with talk, so that it was hardly surprising that the following session for questions and comments was very lively. A tribute to the Youth Club and its Officers was made in recognition of their continued effort to keep the Hall open and the Club going over a period of years. In turn, they promised their support for the new venture.

Finally, the Chairman asked for a vote of confidence in the venture as a whole, to which he received unanimous and enthusiastic assent. He then proposed that five of the people who had formulated the idea should be elected 'en bloc' as members of a Working Committee for the first twelve months. Nominations from the floor were invited for a further seven members to form a Committee of twelve. It was pointed out that this would be very much Working Committee, whose chief function would be to get the venture off to a good start, by arranging all the necessary services, repairs and redecorations to the Hall to make it suitable for all the functions which it is intended to hold. To organise the raising of funds; the use of voluntary effort; the setting up of sub-committees and working parties for various activities; and, above all, to get something actually happening at the Hall so that people can start using it again and we can all start meeting each other there.

A call for volunteers met with a good response and a good number of people came forward to give their names and addresses. There was no shortage of ideas for functions of many types. It looks as though the main problem will be fitting them all in! Nevertheless, YOUR views, ideas, suggestions, criticisms, as well as your HELP and SUPPORT, will all be welcome.

It is hoped to make the Village Newsletter a regular event to keep everybody informed of what is happening. There will also be further Open Meetings at which everybody can have their say and there will of course be the Annual General Meeting on a date to be decided.

Remember, it is YOUR Hall, YOUR Village and YOUR Community and it is YOUR help, YOUR support and YOUR enthusiasm that will make it a success.

#### **Brief History of the Newsletter**

Following an 'Open Meeting' in January 1977, a new management committee was elected to reopen Little Birch Village Hall, which except for Youth Club use had been closed for many years.

The late John Danks was elected as Publicity Officer and edited the first edition in February 1977. John's wife Gill, did the typing and Ian Porter duplicated about 200 copies of a doublesided single page of news at Commercial Road Baptist Church. These newsletters were distributed by the Danks family on foot to each household in the area for many years. This continued until the late 1980's when Mrs Sarah Mathews undertook the typing and later, the layout of the text.

The Resource Centre at Much Birch Community Hall opened in the early 1990's, and with modern equipment, made the printing of the Newsletter much easier and with the production of 300 copies, more residents volunteered to help with delivery. Only small numbers of advertisements were included, mainly from Les Jenkins, John Robert's Carpets and a few others.

In 1995, the Danks family moved to Ross and Mrs Mathews took over as editor. Under her leadership, the Newsletter has expanded and the number of advertisers increased, so much so, that an extra 200 copies were produced for the Much Birch area. Now that the copy is available by e-mail, many local residents elect to receive it in this form and erstwhile residents who have moved also like to keep up to date in this way.
