BETTER BROADBAND FOR HEREFORDSHIRE

Better Broadband will make a massive difference to businesses, communities and households in Herefordshire. Many people have no access to broadband or very low speeds makes accessing which services, making the most of opportunities business or simply for entertainment very difficult. There is a risk that more rural areas in the country will lose out on future opportunities as there is more and more reliance on the internet.

To address this in-balance along Herefordshire. with Gloucestershire been has awarded one of the 4 national pilots to deploy better broadband in rural areas. The first phase of the deployment will be in the southern areas of Herefordshire and the Forest of Dean area of Gloucestershire, for then wider delivery to the rest of the counties. REPORT OF THE LITTLE BIRCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 6TH JULY 2011

An interest was declared as one of the Planning Applications discussed was a Parish Councillor's residence.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting held on 11th May 2011were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

Village Hall – A full report to be given during the next Parish Council Meeting.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme & Parish Initiative –Waiting for the results of a walk around the Parish.

Led Community Plan Representatives from the Steering Group informed the Parish Council that the Questionnaire currently is being developed and agreed with Herefordshire Council. Other concerned parties to be issuing notified before in September.

Parish Field - A further day's clearance work has been organised for Friday 29th July.

Localism Bill – The Chairman voiced his concerns that the Parish Council had not been consulted on the creation of localities and he was assured by both Cllr. Hamilton and Cllr. Powell that localities are not linked to the Localism Bill. Cllr. Hamilton voiced that he was not happy that his Ward had been divided into three localities and would encourage any feedback on the proposals for localities to Herefordshire Council.

Participatory Budgeting – Mr. M. Morley informed the Parish Council of this subject after attending a HALC meeting.

Community Transport and Public Transport Consultation – Clerk to send agreed comments to Herefordshire Council voicing its concerns about the removal of subsidies for the 411 and 38 routes.

County Councillors Update -After being welcomed by the Chairman Cllr. Hamilton gave outline of his duties an especially to promote good communications between himself and the Parish Councils in his Ward. He voiced that he can be contacted at any time and gave details of surgeries to enable issues to be tackled early. Cllr. Hamilton informed the Parish Council that he is especially Highways concerned with issues and requested a briefing on the Parish Plan. The Mobile Library service was discussed other and current responsibilities that include cabinet support being a member. Mr. M. Morley asked a question on the status of the Local Development Plan (ldf) and Cllr. Hamilton responded that there was a paper going to

cabinet at the end of July which will lead to a public document.

Broadband Presentation by Councillor Graham Powell -Cllr. Powell handed out an information pack on this issue which he also summarised. Cllr. Powell talked about the scope of coverage and timescales with an education program to monitor the need for broadband which will culminate surveys in to demonstrate to suppliers, the demand. A local champion would be advantageous to promote this topic and the Chairman was to contact a local resident to see if they would adopt this role. As broadband is discussed in the Parish Plan Questionnaire, any responses that could support this issue to be forwarded to Cllr. Powell.

Ordnance Cottage – After a discussion Cllr Hamilton offered to talk to the resident. The Parish Council stressed that it wanted assurance that the Highway was safe even if the wall collapsed.

DMS/111150/F – Bromley Court – Hoarwithy – Construction of one new poultry unit to house broilers – returned with comments querying the run off.

CSO. F. Witcher reported no crime for the area and recalled a local good result incident where a scrap metal merchant was stopped after a call and hopefully deterred with an 'on the spot' fine for not having a Waste Carriers License.

A few weeks before her 96th birthday, **JOSEFINA JONES** of Sunnybank, Little Birch passed away peacefully at 'Westbank', Ross on Wye, where she has been cared for over the last 5 years or so. A Celebration Service for her life took place at Little Birch Church on

Thursday, 14th July and was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson.

There were many musical items during the Service as many of the family are accomplished musicians. At beginning, the grandson, Sebastian Power, played the Prelude to Suite No.1 by JS Bach on the Cello, and Ella Phillips sang 'Amazing Grace', unaccompanied, most beautifully. The eulogy was given by son in law, Murat Basaran. Josefina was born of Spanish parents and came to Hereford to look after a colony of refugee children brought here during the Spanish Civil War. She met her late husband. Jack, and shortly after, they were married. Soon after, they were off to Marseille, in the south of France, where Jack set up a small factory producing insecticides. The factory was destroyed at the beginning of World War 2 and Jack was imprisoned by the German Army. Josefina made her way to Bilbao, in Spain, where her first daughter, Josefina, always known as Fini, was born. Jack forged new identity papers and managed to escape to the Loire region. Although hunted by the Gestapo, he managed to live and work as a wood cutter and charcoal burner. After the war, The family was reunited in Marseille and a year later, they moved to Hereford. where Richard was born. London was their next home for a few years where Carmen and Lita were born. They were soon on their travels again to Spain, where Rose was born in Miranda del Ebro and John in Bilbao. The family were taken all over the continent by motor bike and

side car and many stories of their adventures of camping in the mountains have been told. When the children reached school age, the family decided to move back to England, finally settling in Little Birch. The story of their staggered return would fill a book. They set up a smallholding with chickens, and geese and garden produce. They sold eggs and produce, making them just about self sufficient. Richard was chief 'egg laying charmer' having been banished from the house to practise on the violin with the hens. Increased egg production paid for his lessons. Husband Jack was away working for Cooks Travel and Josefina worked extremely hard to look after her large family.

At the age of 50, Jack decided to study for a degree and finally obtained a 1st. Class BA in Spanish and Portuguese at Leeds University and became a lecturer in languages at Leeds Polytechnic. Again Josefina looked after the family and continued working their smallholding. She could often be heard singing opera to herself and so it is not surprising that all the family are blessed with musical talents. Locally, we know that John had a band for many years and set up a recording studio. John and Toni's children travel the world playing in concert, but they all came home for Josefina's funeral. So we say farewell to a very hard working mother who always put the family first and courageously came through many adversities. Her body was laid to rest in the churchyard near to that of her husband, Jack. We send sincere our

sympathies to all the children and grandchildren. Donations were given to Christian Aid for the East Africa Food Crisis.

We are also sad to hear of the death of JEAN LATHAM, 'Capricorn', erstwhile of Wrigglebrook. Unfortunately, her husband, James, has also been in hospital but hopes to attend her funeral service at the Crematorium. A Service of Thanksgiving for Jean's Life will be held at Commercial Road Baptist Church on Tuesday, 30th August and a tribute will be given next month. Also the death has been announced of JOHN WAINWRIGHT of Hereford who was brought up in Little Birch and lived in Tump Lane for many years. We send to Florence and the family our deepest sympathy.

A number of friends have been in hospital recently but are now back at home and we wish them well in their recovery.

CRIME TRENDS
