#### FASTER BROADBAND - MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD

A major survey has been launched in our parishes and market towns to help bring high-speed broadband to rural Herefordshire.

With the support of Government funding to improve broadband in rural communities, work is expected to begin in south Herefordshire next year, and will then be extended throughout the county.

Local Broadband Champion volunteers are being recruited to help engage their local communities. In the coming weeks questionnaires will go out to thousands of homes and businesses to gather evidence on demand for superfast broadband. Or you can do the survey online at

#### AN APPEAL FOR HELP

Aspire Living, the local charity helping people with learning disabilities, is actively looking for volunteers to support its work in Herefordshire. There are a number of opportunities volunteering available for across the range of services which Aspire Living offers and anyone with some time to spare and an interest helping people less fortunate than themselves is urged to get in touch.

If you enjoy working on your computer, Aspire runs Online Centre and needs more volunteers to give one-to-one computers skills training at different levels. The recently launched Music Gym at Point 4, Venns Lane, which offers a unique sensory experience whatever the level of disability, needs activity assistants to help provide stimulation in a fun environment. The Music Gym is the only one of its kind in the UK and is a groundbreaking project from Aspire Living.

The Tan Brook centre in Hereford provides facilities for older people with learning disabilities and also needs volunteers to help with their activities. The Leominster and Ross on Wye areas both need volunteers to act as 'life experience buddies' for clients, helping them to access local facilities.

Aspire's Work Right scheme needs job coaches to teach people with learning disabilities who are accepted for work by local employers, how to do the job and stay with them until they are confident on their own.

A spokesperson for Aspire says "Volunteers can make so much difference to the work we do and to the lives of our clients which makes it mutually rewarding. We provide training and support and can reasonable expenses required. If you are interested but a little nervous of making a firm commitment, then we do offer 'tasters' so you can try it out before you commit".

#### PARISH PRECEPT

Little Birch Parish Council is financed by an amount of money called the precept which all residents in Little Birch contribute to via the Council Tax. The Lengthsman Scheme is an additional pot of money received from Herefordshire Council to pay Lengthsman the maintain roadside verges and drainage, public open space and pathways and this is usually around £600-£700.00 per year. For 2012/13 financial vear, Little Birch Parish Council's spending is expected to be budgeted as follows:

During the summer he became an Associate of the Royal College of Music and has been invited to continue playing in some concerts with the Birmingham Symphony Orchestra. So well done William, it looks as though you have a very busy schedule.

As reported last Month, JEAN LATHAM sadly passed away just as the Newsletter was being prepared. Her funeral service took place at Hereford Crematorium on 17<sup>th</sup> August and a Service of Thanksgiving for her Life was held on 30th. August at Hereford Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. Niels Waugh. Her husband, James, has given the following resume of her life. Jean was born in Birmingham in 1928 and attended the Grammar School in Erdington, admitting she was more later that interested in athletics and sports than in studying. In her final year, 1946, she was selected as a member of the first youth athletics team to visit Holland after WW2. She competed in the High Jump and ran the final leg of the sprint relay. She then spent 2 Lincoln years at **Teacher** Training College, studying P.E., Games and Home Economics. In 1948, Jean met James and they were married in 1951. She taught schools in Birmingham and Sutton Coldfield until David was born in 1952, followed by Kate in 1954. She continued teaching on a part time basis for 6 years and played hockey up to County standard. Jean was then appointed Head of Dept

dressmaking teaching needlework at Riland Bedford and was also involved with producing costumes for Gilbert and Sullivan stage productions. joined flourishing a Bretheren Assembly at Duke Street and was involved with flower arranging and catering.

Some 38 years ago, Jean and James decided to have a change of direction in their lives and moved to Hereford where they converted a large house into a small hotel. They joined Barton Hall Assembly and started a second business. Jean asked to start a Bible Study Fellowship with a friend, Doris Gell, and they travelled to San Francisco for a month's training.

Their business interests in Hereford were sold and they moved to open a shop in Weobley, where they stayed for 6 years. In 1988, Jean and James retired to King's Thorn, where they involved themselves in numerous activities, including Church Much Birch flower arranging, catering and Alpha bible study courses. James sang in the choir and Jean served as churchwarden. They joined the Meals on Wheels delivery team and also League of Friends the Hereford Hospitals. They did house to house collections for the annual Poppy Appeal, Rose Day Alexandra Christian Aid. They also joined the Halfway Theatre Company when it was formed. And what about those hats!! Jean was always dressed very smartly and had a wonderful collection hats, suitable for any occasion.

Jean and James celebrated their Golden Wedding in 2001 and in 2006 decided that the garden was becoming a burden and so they moved to Whitecross in Dec.. They were able to see their family more frequently and delighted in their grandchildren. About two and a half years ago, Jean was diagnosed with cancer and

given 6 months to live. Typically, they met this problem head on and earlier this year, celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary. Jean had several spells in hospital and James selflessly gave her the utmost care. Both Jean and James were in hospital when Jean passed but James determined to be out for Jean's funeral service. Jean was a very proud mother, grandmother and became a grandmother a few months before her death. Jean will be greatly missed by her family and so many friends and we send to James, daughter, Kate, and her family our heartfelt sympathies.

A number of friends have been in hospital recently for operations or treatment and we send our good wishes for speedy recoveries.

Many of our young people are off to college or University this term and we wish them every success in this new sphere of their lives. We send our best wishes to RONAN GOODE of 36 Tump Lane, and WILLIAM and LEWIS PRATT of 16 Tump Lane, who have just started their first term at Much Birch School.

#### **ORNITHOLOGY**

Summer came slowly to Little Birch, the long awaited return of Swallows and House Martins was a disappointment. The first birds stayed for a few days and then moved

on. Eventually greater numbers arrived, with the Martins attempting to refurbish their nests only to be promptly ejected by the resident House Sparrows. In due course

enough Martins were on the scene to regain control of the air-space and were able to c ommence nesting. It was interesting to see that as the season progressed the

Martins would seize every opportunity to divert from their normal flight-paths in order to harass the Sparrows.

regular garden birds seemed to have had mixed fortunes this year - larger ones having apoor breeding season, with often only one youngster following a parent Blackbird, Thrush or Robin. exception (of course) were the Starlings who seemed to have more than their fair share of fledglings The smaller residents were

more successful, the Blue-tits in particular seemed intent on keeping the Sparrowhawks well provisioned. Two pairs of Bullfinches arrived in late winter, staying

around throughout the spring and summer, ultimately bringing their youngsters to the bird-feeder. These birds are still around, the unmistakable rosy-pink

colour of the male is always a striking sight, although its presence is not welcomed by fruit growers.

Later in the season the Warblers became more noticable in the garden. These small yellow/green birds are not easy to identify; one exception is the Chiffchaff which

has black legs and an eye stripe, spending much of its time chasing away the resident small birds.

As autumn approached the Green Woodpeckers began their annual assault on the ants

in the lawn, the male bird having a red nape and a red chin-stripe. The female

lacks the latter and the juvenile is heavily spotted and striated. The Great Spotted Woodpecker is an altogether different bird, predominately black and white with red

markings, smaller than the Green Woodpecker and a more regular visitor to the garden.

At about the same time the Mistle Thrushes began to make an appearance, small flocks raiding the berries on a nearby yew tree. This bird is similar to the Song

Thrush but larger with a more upright stance and has darker spots or blotches.

Some absentees from the summer garden included :- Treecreeper, Nuthatch, Goldcrest and Wren; hopefully next summer will see a return of the once common

residents. As the days shortened the feeding activity of the summer migrants became ever more frantic. Before long they will need great reserves of energy to help them on their hazardous flights to warmer climes (bon voyage). We wish them well and look forward to their return.

Essentially they tell you that you have won up to £15,000! If you read their small print you will find that you would need to purchase some of

(overpriced!)products their which are advertised and then you will get placed in a prize draw. This company have been investigated by Trading Standards, but due to the fact they are not actually breaking the law, albeit sailing very close, there has not, as yet, been a successful prosecution. I would just like members of the public to be aware of this and similar scams that are operating up and down the country. Ιt is just important to ensure that your and more elderly vulnerable members in the community are not duped by these scams.

Having spoken to Trading Standards in Hereford today there advice is that when you order goods online, even trusted companies, make sure you request that you do NOT want to receive marketing literature from other companies, you usually have to tick a box if you want to select this option. ... remember if it sounds too good to be true then it generally isl

A lady in Little Dewchurch reported that she found a card that had been left through her door from a male who was interested in buying furniture and other household effects, with a name and telephone number. As the lady was moving house

she decided to call the male, who came round and they agreed a price for the items. He agreed to come back the next day and collect the items, and asked if she had any jewellery to sell. She offered a brooch which he agreed to buy for £60, he paid £30 there and then, and would bring the remaining £30 along with the cash agreed for the furniture the next day. He never returned, and despite several phone calls, she has had to accept that he never intended to buy the furniture in the first place, it was just a ruse to see what else there was in the house. Please be aware of any cards left offering such services, and let us know if you have been in receipt of one.

### Results
