#### FASTER BROADBAND FOR HEREFORDSHIRE

#### Why should you register?

Because if you don't then you are not going to get the best broadband possible. It's all down to demonstrating demand the private to companies who will deliver the service. The bigger the demand the better the broadband. Government has Central thrown its weight behind broadband, to the tune of £530m. However, this needs to be matched by private sector investment. It's up to us to show the private sector that there is demand for superfast broadband and it's worth their while to invest. Herefordshire and Gloucestershire together have started a project to bring superfast broadband all across both counties. The Borders Broadband Project has invited tenders from the telecom industry to deliver the service starting in 2012. Their goal is to achieve better than 30 Mb/Sec speeds wherever they can.

They want to understand how you use the Internet now, and what you might need from fast broadband.

# REPORT OF THE LITTLE BIRCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 2<sup>ND</sup> NOVEMBER 2011.

No interests were declared. Minutes of the meeting held on 7th September 2011 were read and signed as a true record.

#### **Matters Arising**

Two extra items were agreed to be added to the agenda

**Police Update** – CSO K. Powell informed the Parish Council about the new non-emergency number for West Mercia of 101.

#### County Councillors Update -

Cllr. R. Hamilton was unable to attend and sent his apologies together with an email explaining that his Parish Council newsletter will be released imminently and amendments to the confirmed minutes. The Parish Council

responded to each of the points made.

Village Hall – The stage extension is complete however further work may be necessary. Bingo, Whist and the Pantomime are organised although the Christmas Fayre has been cancelled.

# Parish Lengthsman Scheme - List of works completed by

the Lengthsman and invoice received.

Parish Initiative – The Clerk is in discussion with Amey due to problems accessing the new internet based PC-Iris system. A number of sand bins were reported to the Parish Council as inadequate due to repair or design and Clerk to report these to Amey together with the erosion of the sleeping

policeman at Chapel Pitch and highway erosion at Crows Nest.

Community Led Plan Representatives from the Steering Group informed the Parish Council that the Ouestionnaires have been distributed and are currently in the process of being collected.

**Parish Field** – The quote from Tugwell Trees to finish the clearance of the Parish Field was agreed by the Parish Council.

Parish Precept – Only one response was received from a resident who wished the notice board adjacent to the Castle Inn pub to be 'tidied' with a village logo displayed and the introduction of signs for the Ancient Hill Fort.

**Ordnance Cottage** – Clerk to request a copy of the surveyor's report from Amey for Parish Council records.

**Parish Councillors Packs** – It was noted that the Clerk requires a contract and appraisal process.

Training Courses – All training course's details were distributed and discussed with Mrs. E. Godding and Mr. M. Morley to attend the HALC Bright Ideas on 30th November 2011.

**Internal Auditor** – The Clerk informed the Parish Council on the attentiveness and flexibility of the internal auditor, John Penrice. The Parish Council agreed to continue with Mr. Penrice as internal auditor.

Japanese Knotweed – A case has now been reported in the village in the hedge between Higgins Well and Little Birch Church. Clerk to write to landowner.

Response to Herefordshire Council paper "Help plan the future of Herefordshire"

- Clerk to email research documents so that comments can be circulated and agreed by the consultation end of 28th November 2011.

Winter Gritting - Little Birch Birch Parish Much Councils have worked together and each submitted application to join the Winter Gritting Self Help Scheme with Little Birch Parish Council sending their forms in on 24th October 2011. Both **Parish** Councils are awaiting response from Amey.

Purchase of Projector – The Parish Council agreed to the joint purchase of a digital projector with the History Group and the Village Hall Management Committee.

Report on recent HALC AGM and SAM Meetings – Mr. M. Morley and Mrs. E. Godding summarised the discussions held within these meetings including HALC subscription possibly increasing next financial year.

Neighbourhood Planning – Mr. R. Riddell came directly to the Parish Council Meeting after attending the Neighbourhood Planning event and gave feedback to the Parish Council.

#### REPORT FROM THE MUCH BIRCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING OF 3<sup>RD</sup> NOVEMBER 2011

A member of the public gave feedback to the Parish Council from the AGM of HALC.

**Apologies** were received from Ward Councillor Hamilton and Parish Councillor Mike Smith. The **minutes** of the meeting of 3<sup>rd</sup> November were signed as a

true record.

**CSO** Witcher explained that the Police would no longer be giving reports at the Parish Council meeting. Electronic briefings would continue and be available for anyone who them. signed up for briefings will also appear in the newsletter and at www. muchbirchparish.org.uk. The public are encouraged to use the new 101 number to contact non-urgent the Police in matters. Posters about the 101 service to be placed on the parish notice boards.

A **financial report** was given to the Council by the Clerk, and all payments listed on the Agenda were approved.

Three **donation requests** were received and considered, the Council resolved to give  $\pounds$  100 to Dore Community Transport and  $\pounds$  100 to The Parochial Church Council of Much Birch toward grasscutting in the churchyard.

The Council resolved to maintain the **Precept** at its current level of  $\varepsilon$  **6,000.** 

Parish Roads and Footpaths were discussed. The height of hedges along The Thorn and wood side of c1263 King's Thorn Road were discussed, and the Clerk instructed to contact landowners to request that hedges be cut in accordance with Section 154 of the Highways Act 1980.

The Clerk was asked to contact the Planning Enforcement Officer for the area with regards to the building works at Kingsthorn Cottage.

resignation of the Footpaths Officer was noted and the Clerk instructed to place an advert in the newsletter for a new officer and volunteers to walk footpaths. Also to contact The Ramblers to ask them to walk the paths and help report any defects.

The Clerk gave a **report on the current status of the Parish Paths Partnership scheme** (P3) and the Council **resolved** to return the £ 350 grant for 2011/12, and withdraw from the scheme as per the advice of the Public Rights of Way Warden Manager.

It was **resolved** to purchase a replacement for the damaged

grit/salt bin on Barrack Hill outside Anfield House.

Parishioner's report regarding complete obstruction of footpath MB24 at junction with B4348 to be given to AMEY to action.

**Further** defects to be reported to AMEY included, blocked drains at bottom of Ticklewithy Hill Pitch. Ridge in tarmac at junction of C1263 and A49 (travelling in Hereford direction). Potholes on C1263, and crumbling of road edging at one point near Waterloo Lane. Request to raise the Birch Little sign outside Anfield House Barrack Hill.

The Parish Council has accepted Mr. Brimacombe's kind offer to come to the next meeting to give an update on The Poor's Acre, and explain the constitution of Much Birch Old Charities.

Planning Matters, the Planning Sheet was noted and the Council resolved to comment 'no objections' to a new application DMS/112600/F Land South of Crossways, Proposed Erection of Agricultural Barn.

The **correspondence** sheet was noted. The Clerk was instructed to research the possibility of applying to **The Woodland Trust** for some free trees.

The dates of Parish Council Meetings in 2012 were agreed and the Clerk instructed to place bookings with Secretary of Much Birch Community Hall.

Due to the **confidential** nature of **employment matters**, the **Clerk's contract** was discussed after the public had left the meeting, and a

confidential minute was made to be kept on record.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> December, starting at 7.3op.m. in the Much Birch Community Hall. Please note that this is not the official record of the meeting. The minutes of a Parish Council meeting are the official record, and these only, once signed at the next meeting as a true record.

#### HISTORY GROUP IRON AGE HILL FORTS – RUTH RICHARDSON

Ruth Richardson came to talk in Little Birch Village hall on September 15<sup>th</sup>. She spoke to over 30 people and gave us a fascinating and greatly enjoyed account of the Iron Age. She told us that Iron Age type settlements began to appear about 600BC and lasted during the Roman invasion. The lasting structures are hill forts, built to look down over the fertile land they farmed. They probably were defensive but weren't built to withstand siege. They had one or more banks surrounding them, the Aconbury ramparts are half the height they used to be. These would have had palisades on They had defended entrances which would have had gates. Probably up to 2000 people depended on each though would not all live inside. There would have been many huts inside, both round and square, with support poles, hurdles and overhanging thatched roofs. Some were made of wood. Curiously very few had access to water inside the fort.

Herefordshire probably has the largest number of hill forts and it is likely that more remain to be discovered. Aconbury is quite large but Credenhill is the biggest. However one on Clee Hill is twice the size of this.

Ruth explained that almost all information comes from the interpretation of excavation and finds. It was obvious from some hill forts that changes had taken place over time, to the banks and internal arrangements. It was also obvious that trading took place, for example, weaponry from France had been found.

Ruth then described something of the life of the people as interpreted from the artefacts found. They had a range of iron weaponry, pottery, spindle whorls and querns so they fought, killed for food, stored food, wove cloth and ground cereals. They cultivated many small fields often enclosed by wattle fencing. They grew an early type of wheat called emmer and later spelt. These had twice the protein of modern wheat but were of variable height so the heads were picked then straw scythed after and used for thatching. The cattle, nearest to our modern Dexters, were used to fertilise the fields in addition to their many products. drew carts. They also had sheep like the Soay, not easily herded. They were long-legged with wool which could be plucked then woven. Then there were pigs, chickens and ponies, like the Exmoor. They had dogs and cats and there were hares for trapping? (no rabbits!).

The Iron Age people were known to export cattle, hunting dogs and gold, silver and other metals and there is evidence that they traded with the Roman, amphorae were found in burials.

Ruth's talk was most informative giving us a good insight into the Iron Age. One wonders what Britain would have been like if it wasn't for the Romans... and all the other invaders...!

#### CITY OF HEREFORD REVEALED

Where were you all last night (November 17<sup>th</sup>) when Penny Platts came to talk to us about Hereford's history? You missed a treat, not only the talk but also the scrumptious food afterwards. It was disappointing to see such an excellent speaker rather poorly supported.

Those of us who did attend greatly enjoyed a most informative and well presented virtual tour of Hereford's past linked to what remains today. We began at Herefordshire's first 'city', Credenhill Iron Age fort, much bigger than

the others in Herefordshire. We continued to Magnis, the Roman town at Kenchester, then to Hereford where a river crossing already existed used by Romans and Saxons later. ('Here' - old German for army). The Saxons laid out the first city, we started our tour at the cross roads outside the cathedral (smaller then). Broad Street then extended on a line through the Bishop's Palace gateway down to the ford. The Great Hall of the Bishop's Palace is the oldest inhabited building in Hereford (c. 1100). Crossing this street, King Street extended past the cathedral on to Castle Street. site of the medieval market place. Our tour went down Gwynne Street,(site of Nell Gwynne's birth) to the Black Lion, one of the oldest of the numerous inns once Hereford, then to the old bridge with its replacement arch re-built after the Civil War. Our tour then took in the south bank of the river bemoaning the lack of river activity compared to late 1700s

as depicted in an early Turner watercolour, when warehouses abounded and boats were built. Over Victoria Bridge and into Castle Green, site of Guthlac's monastery and then the outer bailey of the castle, once as big as Windsor Castle was then. After the Civil War all stone was removed and used for building, only ramparts remain and part of The drawbridged the moat. entrance was over this was behind the Castle Hotel. Past Georgian Castle Street to St Owen Street (Georgian frontages to timber framed buildings) admiring the Town Hall built of terracotta in Indian Raj style, then the earlier Shire Hall and on to St Peter's church (replacement of original Norman one). marks the end of the huge new market place created by the Normans outside the old Saxon city but then enclosed with new city walls. All Saint's church was built at the other The market extended down to Byster gate (The Kerry is there now). Mention was made of the Booth Hall (late C14) with its magnificent hammer-beam roof, then of the incredible Elizabethan market hall in High Town with its 3 floors, guilds on the top, municipal offices below and market area at the bottom. It was sadly cut down in size in late 1700s and demolished totally in late The city gates were described, St Owen's, Byster's, Widemarsh, Eign and Nicholas, each with its story. All were removed to 'open up the city' in the late 1700s.

The tour finished down Broad Street passing the old City Arms Hotel (Barclay's Bank) on site of entrance to old Saxon city, then the Green Dragon made up of many timber framed buildings now showing their age but listed, making much-needed refurbishment expensive for most Then past St organisations. Francis Xavier ( have a relic hand of John Kemble reputably used to relieve a Belmont monk of his suffering) and finally the library built, with its many natural history carvings, by James Rankin in the style of his mansion at Wormelow.

This is only a flavour of the talk, there was much, much more. Sorry you missed it!

A warm welcome back is given to **ROS**, nee **ATKINSON**, who is living in the erstwhile family home, with her daughter, **CHARLOTTE** and son, **NICHOLAS.** They are all very familiar with what goes on here and will no doubt have well settled already.

Hopefully, Charlotte and Nicholas are enjoying their new schools.

As darkness in the mornings and evenings increases, it is becoming even more noticeable that pupils with dark uniforms merge into the dark hedgerows in our lanes. This makes it difficult for drivers, especially with traffic coming in the opposite direction, to see pedestrians. It is imperative therefore that pedestrians wear some fluorescent belts or jackets for everyone's safety and peace of mind. It is incumbent on all road users not to put themselves into vulnerable situations. The motto should be 'See and be seen'.

It is sad to report the death of an erstwhile resident, JOHN JENKINS, at the age of 91 years. He was born into the family in 1920, on Winnal Common, Allensmore. He had 3 older sisters and was followed by a brother. His father died when he was 3 years old and life was so hard for the mother that all the children were taken into care at Ivy House, Ledbury Road. John attended Tupsley School until he was 14 and then left to work for Bob Skerret, who farmed on the site now occupied by the **Further** Education Colleges in Folly delivered Lane. He around Hereford with a horse and cart and on completion of the round, the highlight of the day was to have a 'chariot race' around the local streets against another delivery lad with their respective horses and carts.

John then went on to work at a garage where he learned to drive and went to live with his mother and step- father in Boycott Road, St. Martins.

At the outbreak of World War 2 in 1939, John joined the RAF as a driver and remained in that service for 7 years. During this time, he was based at wartime airfields at Hunsdon and Gilston, in East Hertfordshire.

On Good Friday, 1941, John met Audrey, his wife to be and who played the major part in his life for over 70 years. He was then posted to Iceland for some 3 years and on his return, Audrey and John were married in 1944 St. Andrew's Church. Nettlewell, Harlow, Essex. Six months later, 3 months before Alan was born, he was posted to France and remained in Europe until his 'demob' in 1946.

John then brought the family to Hereford and eventually they moved into a 'pre-fab' in Westfields, where Valerie was born. He later joined British Road Services, where worked as a driver for 25 years until its closure. In 1953, the family was completed with the arrival of Raymond, the second son. The 'prefab' became too small for the family and they moved to a larger house in Link Road, Hereford, where they remained until the 3 children left home and went their own ways.

Eventually, John and Audrey moved here to 'Gilston', at the bottom of 'The Thorn' to pursue a more relaxed life in the country. On retirement, John walked his dogs, Jim and Dylan, daily in Aconbury Woods and on one occasion,

John found a man in a 'diabetic coma' in the woods. Sadly, the man died but John and the dogs featured in both local and national newspapers. Latterly, walked Audrey's John sheepdogs, 'Cindy' and 'Mitzie' all around the local area. In 2002, Audrey and John moved to Chartwell Road, Hereford, where they were very happy but still came to King's Thorn regularly to visit Alan and the family, as well as to see Valerie at Weston super Mare and Raymond at Bartestree.

John died peacefully at his home on 27<sup>th</sup>. October, after a short illness. We send our sincere condolences to Audrey, Alan Valerie and Raymond and their families, made up of 10 grandchildren/great

grandchildren. Donations in memory of John were made to the MacMillan Renton Unit, at the County Hospital.

It is also with great sadness that the death of another erstwhile resident, RODERICK STEWART , is recorded. His funeral service took place at Orcop Church, overlooking the land, which he had previously farmed. The service conducted by the Rev. Elaine Goddard and tributes were given by Charles Mayson and his grandson, William Lewis from Ash Farm, Much Birch. These notes are given from their tributes.

Roderick was born in August 1924, near Stockport in Cheshire, where his father had a cloth making factory. Roderick attended a public school but was never inclined to follow his father in business. Instead, he went to learn about farming with a local gentleman farmer and later moved to

Herefordshire and gained further experience with 2 local farmers.

In 1946, he moved into Great

Ynys Farm, Orcop and set up a dairying and sheep unit. At that time Olive worked as a Milk Marketing Board Recorder and as soon as Roderick saw her he pronounced 'That's the girl I'm going to marry'. The marriage took place sometime later and in due time, Alison and Fiona were born. Roderick was hard working, dedicated everything he did and everything had to be done properly. He hated slackers. He was also producing beef cattle later expanded chickens and turkeys. He set up a butchery business in South Wales and was always thinking of how to improve the way in which things were done. was a man of high principles and was invited to on the NFU **Poultry** sit but when Committee. travelling to London did not follow the example of others who went 1st Class on the train at public expense, but was content with 3<sup>rd</sup>. Class. He hated waste and thought there might be a market for dried poultry manure and to that end, he experimented with others in drying and mixing poultry manure. A machine produced and attempted to sell the idea to larger organisations but it never really took off. His idea was a bit before it's time as products of this nature are now sold to gardeners.

Olive and Roderick moved to 'Glen Helen' in Upper Wrigglebrook in the late 1980's and they immediately set up

Miniatures', 'King's Thorn producing Doll's Houses and Farm Scenes. These produced with great precision and attention to detail. Olive made many of the furnishings and interior decorations for the miniatures. These products were always in great demand and gave endless pleasure to many families.

Olive and Roderick improved the garden at their new home but whereas Roderick was the boss in their businesses, Olive was the dominant partner in the garden and Roderick had to do what he was told, often muttering under his breath as he did so.

They both joined in Community activities with Olive becoming a Gardening Club Committee member, where her knowledge of plants was greatly appreciated while Roderick helped the Club by painting signs and making a notice board and always helping in setting up the tables for the Annual Show and lining them, where his pin hammer was invaluable. They made many new friends in King's Thorn and one had to be careful not to rise to Roderick's wicked sense of humour. As William said, Grandad always shrouded things in secrecy as he attempted to get help with something in later years. A Laurel hedge was planted in front of the bungalow and Roderick persuaded one friend to show him how to prune them in their early years. Having pruned several bushes, Roderick said "You're not going to leave the rest to me are you? You may as well complete the job while you are here". Roderick was the first in

the area to buy a Suzuki Wagon R red in colour and with a trailer to match. He hated being taunted 'Look out! Postman Pat's about'. He was most indignant when he was caught for speeding and said didn't the PC know that I needed to get somewhere in a Roderick hurry. could sometimes be very irritating when passing in the car with a loud blast on the horn and to announce his arrival at a house or farm. The family also were not amused when they were sat down for a meal and Roderick knock would loudly underneath the table and shout 'Come in'. It was his favourite party trick. However, he was a straightforward, honest man who did everything as it should be done and expected others to do the same. He liked a laugh and a joke and was very proud of his daughters and grandchildren in all their achievements.

Olive and Roderick moved to the 'Rose Garden' in Ledbury Road when it opened some 3 years ago and they were able to enjoy a more leisurely pace of life.

Roderick will be sadly missed by a great circle of friends and acquaintances and we send our deepest sympathies to Olive, Alison and Fiona and their families. Donations in Roderick's memory were given to the Altzheimers Society and to Orcop Church.

The death has also occurred of a well known and respected former builder, **TIM DILLON.** Our sincere condolences to the family. A tribute to Tim will be given next month.

# Police Briefing Monday 7th November 2011 South Herefordshire & Golden Valley

Three vehicles were broken into whilst they were parked and unattended at a car park Hill bv the Black at Longtown, whilst the owners were off walking. This was on Sunday 30th October during the afternoon and property, including handbags, was stolen from each vehicle.

Overnight on 2nd/3rd November, a large red engineering bucket, 7'6" wide, was stolen from a farmyard at Lulham, near Madley.

About 5pm on Friday 4th November, an attempt was made to steal scrap metal from a buildings in Llandinabo, but the would be thieves were disturbed and made off.

Several trailers had wiring taken from them sometime overnight last night (6th/7th November) whilst they were parked in a farmyard in **Holme Lacy**. This may well be connected to the thefts from farm machinery in Holme Lacy last week.

Suspicious Vehicles A white car-derived van with an orange light on the top -P862AD\* - was seen in a field at Cobhall Common about 12 noon on Wednesday 2nd November, along with a black car, part registration There were JUJU. males in the van, the driver had spiky hair, it is not clear how many occupants were in the car. When approached by the farmer, the males said they were 'just chatting' and left the area. Later that day, 3 batteries were found nearby, hidden in a hedge. Enquiries are being made.

On Thursday 3rd November at about 11am, a yellow Ford transit van N112PB\* was in the Madley area, there were two male occupants in the vehicle, asking for scrap. The owner of this vehicle is known to police, keep an eye out for it please.

Also on 3rd November, in the afternoon, the occupant of a blue Ford transit tipper was found in the garden of a public house in **Craswall**, when challenged the male said they were looking for

scrap. There were two middle aged male occupants of the vehicle, and the registration number was **K85\*YUK**.

A white Ford transit van V608XX\* was seen in Garway Hill at about 11.30am today (7th), there were two male occupants, and were paying asked the owner if it was for sale, which it wasn't.

Suspicious Incidents field horse in a Marlas, near Kilpeck, had its plaited sometime mane between 3.30pm and 9.45pm on Saturday 5th November. There were two horses in the field, but only one had been interfered with. There is a theory that manes are plaited as a signal to horse thieves indicating horses are worth stealing. however, there are records of any horses having been stolen after having had their manes plaited. investigation by Dorset police discovered that it may be 'Knot Magic', a practice carried out by white witches when α spell is cast! Apparently this has happen on wet and windy nights, but I'll leave it to you to decide which, if either theory fits!


