

Report from Much Birch Parish Council Meeting of 1st December 2011

All parish councillors were present at the meeting as were Ward Councillor Mr. Russell Hamilton, and three members of the public.

Apologies were received from CSO Witcher and Mr. Dick Brimacombe.

An interest was declared on agenda item 18.1 by Cllr. Glen Sims.

A report was given by the Ward Councillor which included the following topics:-

The LDF Consultation closed on 28th November. Over 2000 responses have been submitted and will now be analysed. The outcome of which will inform the full Council when it takes a decision on the way forward next summer.

Youth services are being reviewed with the aim of targeting the most vulnerable.

Community Libraries being developed at Orcop, and Garway. Important, if interested, to let the Local Councillor (me) know and to put parish names forward soon. County library service is being responsive, will supply books and shelving if needed.

Bus services, Garway Bus 412, an example of how it is hoped to support rural services by linking them to tourism with local bus routes that were previously heavily subsidised. It is hope to not only make bus services more viable and hopefully self sufficient but to encourage those who use them, to support local businesses.

A review of brown and white signs is being carried out by one of the Council's Task & Finish Groups. It is hoped that the emergent policy will be more flexible and to help to support local businesses.

There is an ongoing review by one of the Council's Task & Finish Groups who are looking at the planning process.

The Ward Councillor is working with Chamber of Commerce, who are willing to put on events to help people, and support businesses, hope of some (free) seminars. Anyone who is interested should let him know.

The Chairman opened the meeting to allow for public participation. A member of the public raised two issues, the importance of the Parish Boundary Review, and Beacons for the Queen's Jubilee Celebrations. Another member of the public reported that works required to parish footpath MB24 had now been carried out.

The financial report was noted and all payments listed were approved for payment. It was resolved that Cllr. Mike Smith should be added to the signatories on the Parish Council's bank accounts.



It was resolved to purchase a lockable filing cabinet. There was some discussion concerning the upkeep of the Memorial Clock at Much Birch Church. It was decided to defer this matter to the next Ordinary Meeting whilst further thought was given to the matter. Progress on the Winter Self–Help Gritting Scheme was noted, and it was resolved to delegate powers to the Chair and Vice-Chair to purchase a towable gritspreading machine. A working group was formed to progress the project, five of the six parish councillors volunteered. It was resolved to delegate powers to this working group to finalise the gritting route, draw up a specification for the gritting contractor, to seek quotes from interested parties and to appoint a contractor.

Defects to be reported to AMEY included numerous potholes at the top end of Hollybush Lane, with a request that the top end of the lane be included in re-surfacing works and damaged grit/salt bins.

Thank you letters to be sent to The Ramblers, and the parishioners who helped the Parish Council by cutting their hedges along The Thorn.

The Lengthsman was to be asked to clear debris from hedge cutting from some ditches along Barrack Hill.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday 2nd February, starting at 7.30p.m. in the Much Birch Community Hall.

Please note that this is not the official record of the meeting. The minutes of a Parish Council meeting are the official record, and these only, once signed at the next meeting as a true record.

Words on Birds

(From a Little Birch resident A.V.N. Matters)

The autumn skies seemed strangely empty following the departure of our summer visitors; the swallows, martins and warblers are now hopefully enjoying the benefits of warmer climes. It was anticipated that the onset of autumn would bring its usual influx of winter thrushes, however this year the numbers of redwings with their distinctive eye-stripe and fieldfares, slightly larger with pale grey back, are surprisingly low. One result of this is that the fallen apples and other fruits are still lying uneaten on the ground in January! Our resident thrushes, the song thrush and the mistle thrush are making a regular appearance; the mistle thrush is the larger, with a song containing brief phrases followed by long pauses often produced in wet or windy weather. Both of these birds have already started to sing - a foretaste of the Dawn Chorus?



Corvids are fairly common, **jackdaws** with their blue eyes and grey heads are to be seen in small flocks almost everywhere. The **carrion crows** are larger and tend to appear singly or in pairs. **Ravens** are often seen in our area; they are larger than crows and can be distinguished by their massive bill or wedgeshaped tail when in flight. **Rooks**, allegedly a common farmland bird, are rarely to be seen locally. Magpies are all too common - more and more appear each year, posing a threat to eggs and nestlings in the coming breeding season. Jays are much in evidence at this time of the year; these colourful birds are pinkish/buff above, with white underparts and a black tail. They feed mainly on acorns in winter, but may take eggs and young from nesting birds in spring and summer. With luck, in early spring, you may see large numbers of carrion crows congregating in a tree top, making a great deal of noise and creating a general commotion before dispersing in pairs or small groups to a seemingly pre-arranged destination. Also in early spring, ravens may be seen indulging in their courtship display which can include some spectacular aerobatics - even inverted flight! often harassing the local buzzards while emitting an unmistakeable "cronking" call.



Our regular garden birds have been well represented this winter. One particular delight is the sight of small flocks of **long-tailed tits** feeding together. This often "entails" a group with their heads at a central point with tails radiating outwards, seemingly like the feathered spokes of a rimless wheel - surely one of the prettiest garden birds.

Should you wish to bring more birds into your garden in a cost effective way, try embedding some mild cheddar cheese into the bark or crevices of a tree. This should attract numerous species including **tree-creepers**, small brown birds with a down-turned curved bill; nuthatches, blue/grey upper parts and a strong chisel shaped bill, often feeding in a head down position. Other cheese lovers include **blue**, **great and long-tailed tits** and inevitably **starlings**. Church Crawling (From a Much Birch resident)

One of the best areas for Church Crawling - visiting churches in the country- is Herefordshire and the Marches of South Shropshire. All you need is a good map, a guide book which hopefully tells you where to find a key if necessary, a torch (often light switches are locked away in the vestry) and a notebook and pencil.

Church guidebooks are found in the Cathedral bookshop or in Pilgrim's Progress bookshop in West Street, Hereford. I recommend John Leonard's "Churches of Herefordshire & their treasures" (Logaston Press), "Discovering the smallest churches in England" (History Press) and a new book with small sketches of the churches and A4 size so rather heavy to take about, "A Hundred or more churches in and around Herefordshire" by Ralph Fennell, a Methodist minister recently retired now living in Chester. He includes several over the border, including the Quaker Pales Meeting House (on the road to Llandrindod Wells) which we visited recently and were shown around by a dog. Then we sat outside in the November sun and enjoyed the view, feeding some of the sandwiches to our watchful guide.

Don't forget that Hereford has some interesting chapels and churches which you can get into without much trouble. For example Rotherwas chapel key is kept in the local garage and is so close to the Council tip that you can combine a visit to it with one to the tip. Then there is the delightful chapel at Conningsby hospital, with glass from the redundant chapel at Harewood End, that has its own skeleton under the floorboards and is open regularly during the summer months. The Longworth chapel is slowly being repaired after vandals tried to burn it down., and the key is kept at St Michael's Hospice. For details of the chapels open in our county, Shropshire, Worcestershire, Staffordshire and Warwickshire see "Chapels with Houses in the Heart of England" due in March from Fineleaf Publications and to be given a special promotion by Rossiter Books of Ross-on-Wye and Monmouth. Finally if you want a human guide to take you round 6 churches in a day, then join the Hereford HistoricChurches Trust and they run annual crawls in the spring, not by coach but in private cars as so many of our best churches are hidden away sometimes in fields.

Perhaps those of you who have lived in this area longer than me will write in and describe their favourite churches.

No interests were declared. Minutes of the Parish

Council Meeting held on 2nd November 2011 were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

Police Update – Sgt. D. Boote was introduced by CSO. F. Witcher and reported no crimes for this area although neighbouring area crime was highlighted with a brief discussion on SmartWater.

County Councillor's Update - Cllr. R. Hamilton was unable to attend.

Village Hall – A volunteer has offered to take over the editing of the newsletter. Various activities planned in the near future including Pantomime, Whist Evening, Pancake Night and a Quiz.




Council who has ordered a towable spreader. A further meeting to be arranged.

Community Led Plan - Representatives from the Steering Group informed the Parish Council that the Questionnaires have been collated and passed onto the Research Department at Herefordshire Council.

Parish Field – Tugwell Trees have almost completed the clearance work.



Parish Precept – Mrs. A. Clarke kindly offered to clean the Notice Board adjacent to the Castle Inn and Clerk to decorate. Site meeting to be arranged to discuss the possible installation of signs to show the way to the Ancient Camp. Clerk to contact Herefordshire Council for advice/costs on completing such a project.

Prize Draw Winner

Little Birch Community Led Plan Steering Group are pleased to announce that the winner of the questionnaire's prize draw is Mrs Joyce Allsebrook of Wyndrussell, Little Birch. A cheque for £50 will be given to Joyce in the next few weeks. The questionnaires are currently being analysed by the Research Department in Herefordshire Council and residents will be informed of the next process as soon as any results are known.



Winter Road Gritting

Little and Much Birch parish councils are close to making an agreement for spreading salt/grit on some local roads to reduce the dangers in case of ice and snow. The work will be done by a contractor expected to be appointed in the next few days using a spreader purchased by Much Birch parish council. The salt/grit has already been supplied free by Herefordshire Council/Amey and is stored in Little Birch. Spreading costs will be shared. It is anticipated that gritting works will be carried out typically between the hours of 1.p.m. and 4.p.m. The scheme is not intended for, and indeed it will not be possible, to deal with *all* minor roads and tracks in the two parishes. It has been decided that top priority must always be given to Barrack Hill and The Thorn, as all will be aware, this is the area that has given so much difficulty in the past. The intention is to grit from just above the Methodist Chapel, all the way down Barrack Hill and up The Thorn; and from Barrack Hill, past Castle Nibole, The Castle Inn, down Pendant Pitch, and along New Town Road, past Sunnybank, and around passing Crossways; then along Little Birch Road to its junction with Barrack Hill and from Crossways to Much Birch church. There is a limited amount of salt/grit supplied, and we shall need to see how far that supply will stretch, once this is known, we will then decide whether it is possible to consider any further areas for gritting. Salt/grit bins will continue to be filled by AMEY

Salt/grit bins will continue to be filled by AMEY, and if one near you needs re-stocking please contact either of the parish Clerks as they can report directly to AMEY, enabling a faster response. Both parish councils would like to take this opportunity to remind people of two important things. Firstly, the salt/ grit is supplied for use on the roads, it is **not** for personal use on residents' paths or driveways! Bags of salt/grit for domestic use can be purchased from Asda, Rockfields, B & Q and the like, relatively inexpensively. Secondly, that only a small amount of grit is needed in order for it to be effective.

This is an experimental project, and everyone is on a learning curve. This is the first time that the two parish councils have worked closely together, and we are pleased with the levels of co-operation we have experienced so far. The costs incurred in this first year will be found from existing budgets. If the scheme is successful and the decision is taken to run it next year, an increase in the parish precepts might be necessary.


