John was a member of the team that started this Newsletter in 1977 and has managed its preparation and production for many years as well as writing the regular local news and gardening columns.

There are many other community activities that John involved himself in during more than 30 years. A notable achievement was his part in the re-opening of Little Birch village hall after several years of closure and its registration as a charity. In recent years he has chaired the village hall committee and was an enthusiastic supporter of the refurbishments.

John previously delivered meals on wheels, is a member of the Little Birch Parochial Church Council, ex-Churchwarden and now chairman of the gardening club and the local history group. Some readers will also have noticed the unassuming and invaluable help that he regularly gives to local people during periods of sickness, hospitalisation and bereavement.

The community is therefore delighted by the well deserved honour to be bestowed on John. Special thanks are also due for the contribution of his wife Betty without whose support none of these things would have been possible.

At this time of the year, it is good to remember and thank the team who give their time freely to produce this Newsletter. Each month, 'club' secretaries and others send in their copy which is then assembled by the editor, Antje Preston, who then passes it to Mike Morley who mails it to the Much Birch Parish website and then inserts the adverts. Mike Leigh and John Bryant print 700 copies, 500 of which go to Rose and Des Wathen for collating and stapling while the remainder are put together by Dick Brimacombe.

The 500 copies are then taken in batches to some 16 'postmen and women' who deliver to all the properties in King's Thorn and Little Birch whilst Dick Brimacombe has some 8 deliverers for Much Birch and The Surgery and Axe and Cleaver also kindly have copies available on their premises. All in all, 30 people are involved in the production and distribution each month, a fine community

effort!

Betty Bryant would again like to thank all those who kindly filled shoe boxes with what many would consider quite 'ordinary' items, but to the children in poorer countries who receive them, their eyes light up as this may be the only present they have ever received. 30 boxes were taken to a warehouse on the Rotherwas Estate, where volunteers check the contents and seal the boxes. Boxes were kindly donated by Surgery staff and friends in the community both here and in Ross. The school and Much Birch WI also have their own schemes for this 'shoebox' appeal.

The community's thanks are also extended to Mrs. Kath Watts who has worked tirelessly for 6 years, to organise the monthly 'Village Market' held at Much Birch hall.

Mr. Brian Pickering of Hollybush Lane passed away on 19th. December and his funeral took place on January 2nd. at Much Birch Church. The service was conducted by Rev. Elaine Goddard . Refresher Day for Older Drivers

'Most drivers over 60 are reasonably satisfied with their competence behind the wheel' says an expert on older drivers: 'Except when they hear that death and serious injury is more likely in this age group, if you have a crash'. Following the very successful workshop in Leominster last year, another refresher day for Older Drivers will be held this time in Hereford at the Hereford Musical Theatre, Whitecross Road on Friday 8 March on behalf of Herefordshire Advanced Motorists. If you have problems with roundabouts or understanding the Highway Code, then this is the course for you. As well as a slowing of reaction times, ageing also causes a loss of peripheral vision, with the size of our visual field decreasing by approximately one to three degrees per decade of life. By the time you reach your 70s or 80s, you may have lost peripheral vision by as much as 20 to 30 degrees. As you get older you may rely more on your car for the basics of living - like food shopping - especially in the many rural districts of Herefordshire. In Japan the ageing population forced the Tokyo Motor Show to display a huge array of gadgets and

converted vehicles to keep elders on the road. But the answer for most older people is not vehicle adaptation but appropriate training. The Hereford course will impart useful strategies and tailor advice to individual drivers. Each participant will also have the opportunity to be accompanied in their own car by a qualified advanced driver and given friendly help and advice on their performance.

The day runs from 10am to 4pm and begins with a talk and concluding with opportunity to ask questions and seek advice from experts.

DEAL SIGNED TO BRING FASTER BROADBAND TO RURAL AREAS

Herefordshire Council, Gloucestershire County Council and BT have signed a £56.6m deal which should enable 90 per cent of homes and businesses in the two counties to have access to fibre broadband by the end of 2016, with the ultimate aim to provide access to broadband speeds of 24 megabits per second (Mbps) or above for all who want it by 2018.

The aim of the councils' partnership is to have a majority of homes and businesses covered by this project able to enjoy speeds of 30 Mbps or more, and all areas will receive a minimum of 2Mbps. The project is a joint initiative between national government and the two authorities to address the challenge of bringing broadband to rural areas to support local businesses and enable households to access services.

Homes and businesses that are harder to reach with a fixed fibre line will be connected using alternative new broadband technologies. Also, Herefordshire Council has allocated additional financial support for businesses and homes that can demonstrate a need for faster speeds. There will now be a period of planning carried out by BT, with work expected to start on the ground during the second half of next year and being completed by the end of 2016.

Cold Mornings - Don't Give Car Thieves An Easy Ride

Although vehicle crime is low across West Mercia, every winter the force receives a number of reports from drivers who have had their cars stolen after leaving the engine running, while they wait in the warmth of their home for it to heat up

and defrost the windscreen.

Some vehicle owners nip inside for just a few seconds to collect a bag or finish the last mouthful of their breakfast coffee - but that's all the time an opportunist thief needs.

To 'freeze out' the thieves, West Mercia Police advises motorists to:

- Clear windscreens with de-icer and a scraper
- Sit in vehicles while the heater de-mists the windscreen

Drivers who ignore this advice are taking big risks. Thieves will drive around residential areas looking for likely targets - when they spot a vehicle with its engine left running on a drive or outside a home, it's there for the taking.

One person will be dropped off, gets into the target vehicle and simply drives away.

Many of the vehicles are never recovered, and some - especially high value models such as Mercedes, BMW and Audi - may be shipped overseas.

It is also worth remembering if your car is stolen when keys have been left in it, you may find your insurance will not cover you. If your house keys are stolen along with your car, your home is then vulnerable too.

So, this winter, don't give criminals an easy ride by leaving your car running unattended.

Get Warm, Stay Warm - Herefordshire

The Department of Health, under the Warm Homes Healthy People Fund, has again awarded the Private Sector Housing Team at Herefordshire Council, in partnership with 14 voluntary and community groups, funding for a project called Get Warm Stay Warm, whose aim is to provide assistance to reduce the effects of cold weather on vulnerable Herefordshire residents this winter.
