Police Briefing from Kevin Powell Community CSO

As you are all aware, I have now taken over the Rural South Local Policing Area. It is now part of the Southside and Rural Safer Neighbourhood Team and we are based at South Wye Police Station. I know the area very well due to working from Peterchurch for 5 years with Fiona. Please contact me with any Local Policing issues and any events/meetings you would like me to attend where possible.

Didley

Around 17:30 on the 30th of September 2 males were seen acting suspiciously around a forklift truck in Didley. The two males were disturbed and ran off in the direction of Kilpeck. It is believed the offenders were attempting to gain access to the batteries and in doing so they caused damage to the panels on the machine.

Pencoyd

Between 18:00 on the 3rd of October and 07:30 on the 4th 2 sheds near a property in Pencoyd were broken into and tools were stolen. 2 dewalt drills, 1 dewalt hammer drill and a makita heavy duty drill were stolen with boxes. If anyone attempts to sell you items such as these please contact Police right away via 101.

Bolstone

Sometime between 20:00 on the 2nd and 07:30 on the 4th a water pump and a self standing industrial power washer were taken from outside a farm in Bolstone.

Green Crize

Between Tuesday the 1st and Saturday the 5th a box trailer has been forced open at the rear of a premises in Green Crize. A strimmer and a saw were taken.

Around the same time a farm building at the same location was also entered via a workshop door and a Husqvarna chainsaw was stolen.

Grafton

Between 17:00 on Monday and 07:30 on Tuesday

a outbuilding was broken into on Grafton Lane, Hereford. A chainsaw and a battery charger were stolen. The building was secured by a padlock which was also stolen.

Positive Policing:

On September 26th Operation Wingspan took place throughout Herefordshire. This was part of the YOU SAID, WE DID campaign. This was an operation to target organised criminals such drug users/dealers and to act upon any intelligence that we have received regarding drugs/weapons and other crime. 32 warrants were executed and 20 arrests were made. It was an excellent operation based on information from members of the public.

Overnight on the 13th of October approx 600 litres of heating oil was stolen from a tank in Scudamore Close. It would appear the offenders may have accessed the tank from a country lane at the rear of the premises and siphoned the oil.

Overnight on the 13th diesel was siphoned from a tractor at a premises in Didley. Offenders got away with approx 600 litres of diesel.

We are getting calls regarding items been thrown or placed onto the railway lines on the Local Policing area. I am sure I do not need to explain the dangers of this. If you see any persons acting suspiciously around railway lines please report this to Police asap via 101. If you see anyone on the line or throwing or placing items onto the line please call 999 immediately!

Throughout Herefordshire we are receiving numerous calls regarding large amounts of mud being left on roads. This can become very dangerous for motorists and appropriate measures need to be taken to prevent accidents. Farmers please ensure you do everything possible to ensure you are doing all you can to ensure you leave roads in a safe condition for other road users.

Calls have also been made to Police regarding possible scams. Firstly an elderly resident in the St Weonards area was contacted by phone and the caller stated they were entitled to a cheque for a large sum of money. The caller went on to question whether the resident would be at home for the rest of the day so that they could deliver this cheque. Needless to say no person or cheque arrived. Similarly a resident in Ballingham also had a similar call regarding installing a new electric meter. Again the caller asked as to whether the occupant would be in that day. Checks made with the occupant's electricity provider revealed no

meter was due to be fitted. Please be aware of these scams and do not give out any personal information over the phone and always check with companies as to whether the calls are genuine.

A warning to businesses in the area. Today I received a phone call from " Hertfordshire Crime Prevention team" (yes Hertfordshire – they couldn't even get the right area). The caller said that I had agreed in January to advertise in their crime prevention booklet that was to be distributed to schools and businesses. He tried to pass me on to their financial team who would take credit card details from me for the advert.

Fortunately, I do not advertise and realised that this was a scam. In a bigger organisation it might be easy to assume that someone else has agreed to such advertising and go ahead with payment.

The caller had a Merseyside accent and of course a 1471 revealed that the caller's number was withheld. I have reported this to the police, and although sympathetic they say there is nothing that can be done about such calls **AnitaWilliams**, Anitabooks. Kingsthor.

Broadband

Residents in the Kingsthorpe and Little Birch area have suffered very poor broadband speeds. Airband Community Internet, a Worcester based company, operate land based radio wave technology units and currently provide broadband as far as Lock's Garage.

To get this service in the local area, Airband would like users to register an interest (without obligation) at www.airband.co and put in your postcode. If some 50 users register an interest, they would arrange a community meeting to explain further information on the service they can provide.

As I understand it, the cost is about £17 per month for 17MB's and £22 per month for 22MB's. There would be a one off cost of £140 to erect a small transmitter/receiver on your property and to install

the cabling down to the computer.
