Local News

A boyhood dream of becoming a pilot in the RAF took another step forward when JOHN GWINNETT of Ross View, Barrack Hill was presented with his officer's commission recently. Proud parents, Janet and Murray, attended the passing out parade at Cranwell recently. We send our congratulations to John and best wishes as he commences his flying training.

St. David's Church at Much Dewchurch was packed on 5th. March for the funeral of TOM HELME, who has died at the age of years. The service was conducted by the Rev. Prebendary Kay Garlick. Tom's parents farmed at the Grove Farm, Wormelow and his other brothers and sisters were Jack, Mary, Peg, Philip and Peter. Tom attended Much Dewchurch School. He worked at the Grove for a number of years and also started his contracting business, mainly travelling around the local farms threshing corn crops. In his early years, Tom was not good at getting up in the morning and his father was often rebuked in no uncertain terms when he tried to get him out of bed.

Tom married his late wife, Peggy, who was one of the three Bowen sisters from Church Farm, Little Birch. They moved into a house in Hollybush Lane, Much Birch and in due time, John and Sarah were born. Tom's contracting business was expanding and when the opportunity came along, the family moved to 'Bryngwyn Grove', on the corner of the road from Wormelow to Much Dewchurch. Here there was plenty of room to store machinery and build a good size workshop. He was now into contract ploughing and combining and hedge cutting (to which many poles would give testimony) and later, when John joined him in the business, they became specialists planting sugar beet harvesting and the business is still going strong today.

Tom had been a member and one-time chairman of Much Dewchurch Parish Council and also a governor of the school. He was a founder member of the Llanwarne and District Agricultural Society, which was formed in Oct. 1943. He was a steward in the various ploughing classes and was chairman and treasurer over several years. He

was still actively involved when the Society celebrated its 50th. anniversary. Tom thought that he would be called to serve in the forces in WW2 but was 'excused' because of his contribution to farming. He joined the Home Guard and he features in the photograph of the platoon NCO's taken outside of the Memorial Hall at King's Thorn.

This can be seen in the book, Little Birch on Aconbury Hill, and Tom said "I was much better looking in those days". He was put in charge of the Italian prisoners of war, who were housed at the hunt kennels at Wormelow. Most of them were from farming backgrounds, had never fought and were captured in Abyssinia. Tom was responsible for finding them jobs on local farms and remembers them walking to Hereford because there was no transport and with just enough money to buy a beer. It was a poor life for these chaps for some four years of their lives.

Tom was thoughtful man and did not like to be beaten if some problem or other arose concerning a piece of machinery. He would puff away on his 'trademark' pipe, relight it again and again, would never be hurried and would eventually come up with a solution. He could adapt machines to suit his own requirements and built the first reverse drive tractor out of an old Fordson Major before they ever came on the market.

Tom and Peggy retired to Ross on Wye, but Peggy sadly died in 2005 after 57 years of marriage. Tom carried on as best he could, aided by the family and when he lost the lower part of one leg through illness, he invented a facility which enabled him to get behind the wheel of his car again to carry on driving. Over the last year, he was cared for at Brockhampton Nursing Home. So the community has lost a real character, who would go out of his way to help anyone in difficulty and who was much respected by a very wide circle of friends both inside and outside farming circles.

He was very proud of his children and grandchildren and will be very sadly missed. We send our deepest sympathy to John and daughter in law, Sally, and to Sarah and her partner, Chris, to grandchildren Lawrence and his wife, Sam, to Dale and Penny and to Tom's sister, Peg, and his brother, Peter. Castle Green at Hereford

Those of you who did not make it to David Whitehead's talk missed a most interesting and lively talk. Those who were there heard a comprehensive history of the area of Castle Green from earliest times up to the present day, all well illustrated with both slides and many stories, often humorous.

We heard how the area in question was at the highest point of a gravel bed left from the Ice Age so, being beside the river, became an obvious place for settlement.

By 700/800 AD the area had become an important graveyard as indicated by the finding of ritual burials in the style of 'Celtic' culture. The body of St Guthlac was buried here and a chapel dedicated to him was built. The caretakers of this graveyard formed a small monastic settlement here. St Ethelbert was also buried here initially after he had been murdered by Offa (for seeming to offer a threat to Offa's power). It is likely that royal connections led to the building of a large timber hall alongside the monastery.

Offa planned and built the Saxon town of Hereford and a cathedral was built near its present site in 790 AD. This he dedicated to St Ethelbert to expiate his sins for murdering him and his remains were moved here. A well close by was also dedicated to him and was thought to have curative properties (people continued to visit it even up to Edwardian times). The Saxon town was surrounded by walls which were stone rather than

timber (probably the earliest in the country).

before the Shortly Norman Conquest a small castle was built in the south east corner of the graveyard on what is now known as Hogg's Mount but after the conquest a mound was constructed at the west end of the Green area and a large stone square structure with a round tower erected on it by William Fitzosbern. It and the whole of Castle Green were moated and a bridge and gate created, the remains of which lie under Castle Hotel garden. A new Norman cathedral was built slightly to the north of the old one in 1100 AD and а new graveyard established here SO the Guthlac's one ceased to be used. The monastery itself was rebuilt where the new County Hospital now is. The old chapel was burnt down in the thirteenth century. At this time the old Saxon town was extended to the east, the new town including a new market (now High Town) to compensate for the land lost by the castle and new cathedral building. The castle had gardens and orchard on opposite side of the river (now Bishop's Meadow) the boundary being the Row Ditch. At that time the river would have been much lower in summer due to very little run-off from fields and so easily fordable. The castle was used by royalty on occasions. King John spent much of his time here but after the 'taming' of the Welsh by Edward I it was no longer very useful and was ruinous by Richard II's time in the 1300s. It might have been refurbished for John o' Gaunt but he went to Kenilworth instead. It became a royal gaol in Elizabethan times and was used in the Civil War, being re-fortified by In 1660 Robert Colonel Birch. Harley bought the castle for the community, he paid £200. tower was demolished but the mound remained for people to climb for the view. However in the eighteenth century the County Council, who had taken over

management, allowed people to remove the gravel for paths and roads so the mound disappeared. The area became industrial, bark was stacked here for shipping to tanneries. Some of the old castle buildings still remained including what is now Castle Cliff. A new prison was planned for this site but was built on the site of the new St Guthlac's monastery instead. The whole area of Castle Green and the cliff were much valued in the Picturesque period. The Duke of Chandos wanted the site to build a house but the Harley's would not and in the 1750s public/private park was created by tidying, levelling and planting the area. Access was to members only but was very popular. Tea could be taken in a 'temple' building and walks taken along the terrace above the Wye. In 1805 a Nelson's column was erected by public subscription though money ran out before the statue could be placed on top so there is an urn instead. The walks in the park and beyond and the boat quay below providing boats to Ross were all part of Hereford's bid to be part of the Wye Tour.

Sheep continued to graze the green to keep down the grass up to the 1920s when lawnmowers became available. By the 1930s the green was a municipal park and plants were grown for it in a nursery at the back of Castle Pool (which is part of the old moat). The area below Hogg's mount became an area for celebrations and functions. bandstand was built and sometimes a dance floor laid. The bowling green appeared together with its pavilion. Further changes in the 1960s/70s included the loss by building in of the 'temple' on Castle Cliffe House which became part of the Art College, also the loss of the bandstand. This was replaced by a very modern one on the site of the old castle mound. A few rather loud concerts soon saw the end of that enterprise and it has now been demolished. Also in the 70s it was decided that the cliff below the green was being badly eroded so huge works constructed concrete reinforcement creating a sloping bank which was then planted. In the last few years the Green has been and is being supported by an organisation of 'Friends' who have many plans for improvement to enhance the area.. It is a sad reflection of modern society that it is not a nice place to be on a Saturday night and the Bowling Club are now so fed up with the attitude of 'onlookers' that they are moving. It is to be hoped very historic this interesting site will continue to provide pleasure to visitors in the future.

History Group

Over the past 2 years the history group has organised 7 talks given by various people but all with a When historical theme. we published our book Little Birch on Aconbury Hill (which we financed ourselves - copies still available!) we always intended to use any profit we made for the good of the community. We felt that organising a series of talks and paying the speakers out of the profits would be a good way of using the funds and, by the number of people who support the talks, it would seem that you do too. We have also purchased a large projection screen which is available for other groups to use at the hall. An entry fee is charged for the talks and this goes to Village Hall funds.

We have another talk from Heather Hurley in the pipeline about the Wye Valley from Holme Lacy to Bridstow. This will be based on the book *Landscape Origins of the Wye Valley* which she co-authored and edited. It will take place on THURSDAY 21ST MAY at 7.30 in Little Birch Village Hall. More details in the May newsletter.

Report of the Little Birch Parish Council Annual Meeting held on Wednesday 4th March.

No interests were declared.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 14th January 2009 were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

From previous minutes - The phone box adjacent to Little Birch Village Hall is now in full working order. Lynda Wilcox has agreed to attend the 1 July 2009 Parish Council Meeting to discuss the benefits of subscribing to HALC. Mr. Morley Cllr thanked R. Smith information concerning Herefordshire Council finances. The Affordable Housing Survey results have been received and distributed to all Parish Councillors. This item to be placed on the agenda for the next Parish Council meeting.

Village Hall - The toilets and external doors have been replaced together with fitting the kitchen and new hob. A request was made for the Parish Council to enter a team into the next Quiz night. The Village Hall AGM will be taking place in April, date to be confirmed and displayed in the newsletter.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme — The Lengthsman has completed work at Higgins Well and the surrounding area, a further day has been agreed. Two Parish Councillors have been assigned to walk around the Parish identifying possible Lengthsman work as well any defects for the Parish Initiative.

Parish Field - Residents and the Parish Council agreed that this land was to continue as a rural area although the undergrowth and bordering hedges and trees needed to be trimmed, cleared or maintained now and in the future. Clerk given details of a possible contractor to contact for quotes to cut and clear overhanging branches adjacent to the road.

Crime Trends in our area

Overnight 14th -15th February at Wormelow offenders threw a concrete block through the window of a vehicle parked in the centre of the village.

Overnight 25^{th} - 26^{th} February vehicles and signs were sprayed with graffiti at a garage at Callow.

And a farm at Pencoyd was visited by thieves and an outbuilding was broken into and tools were stolen. A Nissan Micra was stolen from outside an address in Wormelow overnight on the same night, and later found abandoned in Llanwarne with the windows smashed

There was a break in at a farm in Thruxton overnight 28^{th} February. a stable was broken into, and a 'Blue Giant' road racing bike was stolen, valued at £2,000. Also stolen were a 'Castor' chainsaw and a 'Shindaiwa' hedge trimmer and attachments. The thieves also stole the battery from a Ford Maverick which had been parked in the drive.

There was a theft from a field in Orcop the weekend before last, where a cement mixer and a quantity of hand tools were stolen, also taken was the battery from a JCB, possibly a link to the Thruxton incident.

A pair of wooden field gates was stolen from the entrance to a field in a lane in Hoarwithy overnight 3rd/4th March. They were in an isolated spot, and were fairly new, and although the owners had attempted to make them theft-proof, unfortunately this didn't stop the thieves.

This is the second incident recently where wooden gates have been taken, so be aware if you have any that are quite new, and make sure that they cannot be easily lifted off the posts.

At about 4.35 am on Thursday 5th March, the post office at Kingstone was broken into and an attempt was made to remove the safe, but the thieves were disturbed by the alarm activating and left the scene empty handed in a grey Ford Mondeo Estate. This is probably the same team that attempted to break in on 19th February.

Overnight 5th/6th March an attempt was made to enter a garage at a property being built in Allensmore, damage was caused but nothing taken from within. A quantity of heavy duty cable that had been nearby on the property was stolen.

Overnight last night a vehicle parked opposite a property in Hoarwithy was damaged, two tyres were slashed.

Results 4 males were arrested at Callow for burglary in the county. They have been charged with conspiracy and remanded to court.

A male was arrested on Sunday for several offences, he has admitted to breaking into sheds and garages, as well as some vehicles, in the Kingstone and Clehonger areas.

Police have recovered an amount of property which needs to be identified. If you, or someone you know, has been the victim of such a theft in the last six months in that general area. (it may not have been reported to us) please get in touch.

Arrangements can then be made to view the property at Hereford Police Station.

Bogus caller

We'd like to bring to your attention details of a male who is responsible for around 43 distraction burglaries in Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Gloucestershire, Dorset, Devon and Cornwall.

He is described as a white male, aged between 20 - 40, stocky build with a round face, clean shaven with a clear complexion. He has a bald head and often wears a woolly hat, and has been described as having a friendly face.

He has been using the name of Steve/Steven/Stevie and once used the name of Ian. He purports to know the victim previously, and claims they don't recognise him as he's shaved his head. He sometimes claims to be a relative of the victim, and will offer to go shopping or mow the lawn etc.

He has also mentioned selling cheap cigarettes and alcohol, and will sometimes ask for change banknotes

Once he has the victims trust he will steal cash, purses etc.

Please be aware of this, and warn any neighbours/relatives/friends who may be vulnerable and taken in by such a visitor.

A Senior Moment

A 98 year old woman in the UK wrote this to her bank. The bank manager thought it amusing enough to have it published in the Times.

Dear Sir,

I am writing to thank you for bouncing my cheque with which I endeavoured to pay my plumber last month. By my calculations, three nanoseconds must have elapsed between his presenting the cheque and the arrival in my account of the funds needed to honour it. I refer, of course, to the automatic monthly deposit of my Pension, an arrangement, which, I admit, has been in place for only thirty eight years. You are to be commended for seizing that brief window of opportunity, and also for debiting my account £30 by way of penalty for the inconvenience caused to your bank.

My thankfulness springs from the manner in which this incident has caused me to rethink my errant financial ways. I noticed that, whereas I personally attend to your telephone calls and letters, when I try to contact you, I am confronted by the impersonal, overcharging, pre-recorded, faceless entity which your bank has become. From now on, I, like you, choose only to deal with a flesh-and-blood person. My mortgage and loan payments will therefore and hereafter no longer be automatic, but will arrive at your by cheque, addressed personally and confidentially to an employee at your bank whom you must nominate. Be aware that it is an offence under the Postal Act for any other person to open such an envelope. Please find attached an Application Contact Status which I require your chosen employee to complete. I am sorry it runs to eight pages, but in order that I know as much about him or her as your bank knows about me, there is no alternative. Please note that all copies of his or her medical history must be countersigned by a Solicitor, and the mandatory details of his/her financial situation (income, debts, assets and liabilities) must be accompanied by documented proof.

In due course, I will issue your employee with a PIN number which he/she must quote in dealings with me.

I regret that it cannot be shorter than 28 digits but, again, I have modelled it on the number of button presses required of me to access my account balance on vour phone bank service. As they say, imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

Let me level the playing field even further. When you call me, press buttons as follows:

- 1. To make an appointment to see me.
- 2. To query a missing payment.
- 3. To transfer the call to my living room in case I am there.
- 4. To transfer the call to my bedroom in case I am sleeping.
- 5. To transfer the call to my toilet in case I am attending to nature.
- 6. To transfer the call to my mobile phone if I am not at home.
- 7. To leave a message on my computer (a password to access my computer is required. A password will be communicated to you at a later date to the Authorized Contact.)
- 8. To return to the main menu and to listen to options 1 to 8.
- 9. To make a general complaint or inquiry, the contact will then be put on hold, pending the attention of my automated answering service. While this may, on occasion, involve a lengthy wait, uplifting music will play for the duration of the call.


Regrettably, but again following your example, I must also levy establishment fee to cover the cost of setting up this new arrangement.
