

Another in the Series on Local Castles by John Kinross

To the end of the lane next to the Church in Wigmore springs a surprise to any walker. Suddenly, the not inconsequential remains of Wigmore Castle appear, which was the stronghold of the Mortimers. It was built by William Fitz Osbern about 1070 - 1071 and is mentioned in Domesday as the possession of Ralph de Mortimer. The Mortimers supported Stephen so when Matilda's son, Henry II became King, the Mortimers were out of favour. In Henry III's reign, it was Roger Mortimer who had to strengthen his castle as it was the time of the Welsh wars. This Roger welcomed Prince Edward when he escaped from Simon de Montfort and the Mortimers took part in the Battle of Evesham, which was the downfall of Simon. Another Roger was friendly with Queen Isabella, wife of Edward II, and was one of those involved in the imprisonment and murder of Edward at Berkeley castle. He was eventually caught by King Edward III and hanged at Tyburn. The Mortimers continued to flourish and after his capture at Pilleth (1402), Sir Edmund Mortimer married the daughter of Owen Glyn Dower. He was rescued by King Henry V and sent to Ireland where he died in 1424. This was almost the end of the castle as it became crown property but the King preferred Ludlow. In 1601, it became Harley property and was partially dismantled during the Civil War. In 1999, English Heritage re-opened the castle but alas, they have not spent any money on it and the ruins are not all that safe. The lack of a suitable car park has meant that few visitors get to it and a much better effort at clearing the ivy and undergrowth would be welcome with sign boards as has been done with great success Montgomery Castle.

PARISH MEETING — at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 6th November at the Much Birch Community Hall. The Parish Council heard that the self help winter gritting scheme arrangements were again in place, with grit stocks full, to keep the parish roads passable in the event of icy weather. It should of course be remembered that, whilst every endeavour will be made to keep key roads ice free, drivers should still drive with extreme care.

The Parish Plan, previously produced, was to be revisited and reviewed and there will be opportunities, going forward, for residents to get involved in this process.

With wintery weather and increased rainfall on the way, further concern was raised regarding blocked ditches and the problems this can cause when surface water cannot run away freely. There was an appeal to all land, and property owners, to clean out any ditches, which are their responsibility, to safeguard the parish roads against flooding should heavy rainfall again be an issue. Everyone's co-operation to keep the roads safe is greatly appreciated.

Little Birch Parish Council

The most recent meeting was on Wednesday November 12th and three Councillors were present Cllrs Rees, Godding and the Chair Cllr Morley.

The Ward Councillor, Mr Jon Norris was also in attendance, he informed the meeting that the history of Little Birch had been put onto the website. He also asked for parishioners to consider the effects of bonfires at this time of year on their neighbours, with wet leaves smoking rather than burning cleanly and causing a smoke problem for those around them.

A generous offer has been made for the Old Chapel in Little Birch to be made available for a community enterprise, or a group who would be of benefit for the community to use (but not for storage). It would be available on a lease for 5 to 10 years potentially. Any one who might be interested please contact the Parish Clerk before

the end of December 2014.

Little Birch Parish Council will continue to work in partnership with one of our local farmers to try and get the main routes through the village gritted when necessary. However, the Parish Council would urge all drivers to continue to exercise care when driving in snowy or frosty conditions.

The Neighbourhood Plan was discussed again, and it was decided that the PC would look to secure a grant in 2015 so that the Plan **could** be developed at no (or very little) cost to the parishioners.

We were notified that the BT phone box near the village hall has been used only 3 times in the last year, and thus BT are looking to disconnect it. However, the Parish Council has been given the opportunity to purchase it for a very modest sum, which they intend to do, and they would welcome any suggestions as to what uses could be made of it. Once again suggestions to the Clerk please.

Following an account of the PC finances, it was decided that the Precept should remain the same for 2015/2016.

The next meeting is on Wednesday January 7th at 7.30 in the Village Hall, and all parishioners are warmly welcomed.

I would like to make you aware of some incidents and also some changes to the local team.

Allensmore

A bail spike was stolen from a rural premises in Allensmore. This happened between the 19th of October and the 29th of October.

Little Birch

The village Hall was broken into at Little Birch between 21:00 on Friday the 21st of October and 09:00 on Tuesday the 4th of October. Damage was caused however nothing appears to have been stolen.

Rotherwas

On the 2nd of Novemeber a lorry cab was stolen from a premises on Chapel Road, Rotherwas. Within an hour the vehicle was stopped towards Monmouth and a male was arrested.

On Wednesday the 5th of November a disc cutter saw was stolen from a building site at Rotherwas. The offender was descried as follows: White male, 5'4, a tubby build, 15-16 years old, he was wearing a green hoody, a pale blue tshirt, jeans and had a brown crew cut hair style.
