A Note from Miss Rosemary Rigby MBE

On Nov 6th in spite of cold and wet weather, children from Much Birch School laid a wreath at the World War One commemorative tree planted on the Rosemary Rigby Millennium Green. Rev. Mark Johnson conducted the ceremony and the year six pupils were accompanied by Head Teacher Mrs Bernie Davies and Mrs Sasha Davidson. Before laying the wreath, four pupils recited poems they had written to mark the occasion.

Mr. Keith James of Tump Lane told the scholars his great uncle's story. Scots Guard Company Sergeant Major Charles Lilley had married in September 1914 and within three weeks had been posted to France. He was killed in action just before Christmas 1914. His body and those of four fellow soldiers were found in a ditch some 43 years later and reburied in the London Military Cemetery in France.

After an early morning start and a long trip, Mr. Frederick Pearson, Drum Major of the Epping Forest Pipe Band, laid a wreath to the memory of Violette Szabo GC and former serviceman, Mr Trevor Forrester laid a wreath on behalf of the Pilgrim Hotel.

Veteran of the Normandy landings in World War 2, Mr Peter Davies gave the 'Remembrance exhortation' and told the pupils of his hopes that they would never know war but would live always in peace.

The ceremony concluded when Miss Rigby gave each child a bookmark from the museum and Trevor Forrester handed out hot chocolate and home-made biscuits from the kitchens on the Pilgrim Hotel.

LOCAL NEWS

Congratulations go to Cathy Sadler and her son,
John, on completing a sponsored cycle ride around many
of the churches in South Herefordshire. The generous
sponsorship amounted to £430, of which half goes to Little
Birch Church and half to the Hereford Historic Churches
Fund.

Well done Cathy and John for that marathon effort and to all sponsors.

As reported last month, the funeral of John Evans of Castle Pool Cottage took place on 20th. October at Hereford Crematorium and was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson. Steve Turner gave the eulogy from which these notes are taken

John was born in June 1930 in Wormelow to Dolly and Ted Evans. He was the youngest of 8 children, having 4 brothers and 3 sisters. His father was head kennel man for the South Herefordshire Hunt but when John was about 2 years of age, his parents left to take up a new post with the College Valley Hunt in Northumberland. John, Mary and Donald stayed here and went to live with their Aunty Beattie at Cherry Orchard, Wrigglebrook.

John attended Little Birch School somewhat sporadically. The teacher was Mrs Nellie Pritchard who took the register first thing and usually at the first break, John and his mates scarpered and spent the rest of the day playing fox and hounds, climbing trees and smoking fags in Hastings Wood. John left school at the age of fourteen and went as an apprentice bricklayer but the 'tug of the woods', his real passion, led him to a job on the Guy's Estate working in the woods with Ivor Crum, Jack Cross, Eddie Hancocks and Ernie Thomas.

WW2 was over and much of the country's timber had been used in the war effort. John and his colleagues planted various conifers in Warren Wood and Holloways Bank. Other areas of mature trees had to be cleared the hard way, using a cross cut saw or by axe. This was very hard work but John was young, agile and strong.

A new club opened at the King's Thorn Memorial Hall, now often referred to as the 'Scout Hut'. At one end was a boxing ring and John quickly mastered the art in which he matured and disciplined himself to the Queensbury rules. A boxing booth was always set up when the May Fair came to town. The ringmaster would ask anyone who was brave enough to take on the travelling champion.

John's hand would go up and he entered the ring with no chance of winning but that didn't matter.

It was the buzz and adrenalin rush that he wanted and got. After all, if John was willing to fight a champion in public, was there anyone to challenge him!

John and his gang usually went to Mrs. Howes' cafe in Bridge Street and often got into a punch up with other lads. The police got wise to them and didn't want them in High Town so they stopped the gang at the top of Bridge Street with the instruction 'Evans be on your way' so the

last port of call on the way home would be the Black Lion pub.

Tragedy hit the family and the whole community on Easter Monday 1950 when 5 local lads were in collision with a car carrying policemen returning to Hereford from a cricket match in Ross on Wye.

They were on 2 motorbikes and brother, Donald, (Bunny) and another of the party were killed and the others suffered life changing injuries. John and his mates were walking home from Hereford that night and were unaware of what had happened when they passed the scene. One of John's friends was Michael Bond of Monkton, near St Weonards and he had a sister called Phyllis. Eventually John plucked up courage to ask Phyllis out and the spark was lit. They were married at Llanwarne Church in July 1964 and made their home at a cottage in Garway. Gillian was born in Jan 1966 and Andrew in July 1967. John was now working at the Sentex plant at Tram Inn from where he would often come home covered in white dust, which turned out to be asbestos. He then went to Painter Bros. in Hereford but industry was working a 3 day week at the time. There were frequent power cuts and on one occasion when the factory was left in total darkness, the supervisor made a roll call and all were present except John Evans. He was eventually found in the cab of the overhead crane half way along the gantry. A very cross John Evans was cussing and fretting as he had been up there for about half an hour. A ladder was found and John

From Painters, John worked for a short time at Sun Valley. He finally got back to his first love working in the woods on the Guy's Estate which was then owned by the Prudential. The family moved to Castle Pool Cottage in 1978 where John and Phyllis were to remain for the rest of their

time together. John was reunited with Ivor Crum and John Lewis, Ivor Price and Ray Harris making up the team He found himself felling the very trees he had planted in 1948 and then helped plant the next generation. He loved it. His other passion was grass track racing and he would be found at events all over the country. Later, son Andrew would drive John to these events and they would often meet up with John Lewis, his ex-workmate.

One was always made welcome to the Evans household and the usual banter would take place. Phyl make a cup of tea, there's folk here could die of thirst! Will you have a piece of cake? knowing full well there wasn't any. If there was, the whole routine would be ruined. He loved mother in law jokes courtesy of Les Dawson, which would send John into guffaws of laughter and when he laughed the whole world laughed with him.

John loved his garden which was always immaculate with flowers and vegetables which he was very keen to share. He loved his children and 4 grandsons, which he thought the world of.

In 2013, John was diagnosed with cancer which led to a

steady decline in his health but it was only in the last few months that he gave up the fight. Phyllis proved to be a fantastic carer and totally dedicated wife, administering medication on a daily basis and looking after all John's needs. Andrew took over the running of the garden and taking John to hospital appointments. John died on Oct. 7th in the County Hospital We send to Phyllis and her whole family our sincere sympathy.

It is sad to report the passing of Mrs. Peggy Newman of Much Birch at the age of 98 years. She was an aunt to Kay Garlick and Margaret Blackburn and brother in law to the late Arthur Harris. Her funeral service and internment of ashes takes place on Sat. 12th Dec. at 2pm at Much Birch Church. A full tribute will be given in the next issue of the News Letter.

Good Dog!

Kathy Williams' Beauceron Dido proved he wasn't just a pretty boy (he got 1st Post-Graduate Dog, Ist Good Citizens Dog, and Reserve Best of Sex in Breed at this year's Crufts) by coming 2nd in his first Open Companion Dog Stake with a qualifying score in Working Trials at the beginning of June, then Qualifying in his next trial at the end of June – which was a Championship Trial- to achieve his CD Ex title. Since then he has been working hard at improving his Tracking skills as all the Stakes in Working Trials after the Companion Dog Stake include tracking in the Nosework section, and he gained his Novice (Level 1) UK Tracking Dog Association award on 11th October, which should stand him in good stead for his next Trial, which will be an Open Utility Dog Stake at the end of November.

Meanwhile his litter sister Rubi has been pursuing a career in Competitive Obedience, and at Hatchford Brook DTC Open Show on 2nd August, which held one of the 32 heats (with the highest placed BC/WS and BC from each heat qualifying), she qualified for the semi-finals of The Kennel Club Good Citizen Dog Scheme Special Pre-Beginner Obedience Stakes, held at Discover Dogs in London on 18th October. I am absolutely over the moon to say that she was one of the 20 dogs who qualified for the Grand Final to be held at Crufts 2016! Rubi, who has conformation issues due to being VERY big for a female Beauceron, also took up training for Agility as a form of physiotherapy, and she enjoys it so much that she is currently aiming for a place on the Starters League team for Golden Valley – although she has a VERY full diary with her Competitive Obedience matches in the South West Obedience League, so it's paws crossed that the match dates don't clash. (It's worse than having kids - I just chauffeur these dogs around to their various activities!) Both Beaucerons are also in "Les Bas Rouges" Obedience team – a Kennel Club initiative to show owners of breeds other than Border Collies, Working Sheepdogs and GSDs that EVERY dog can do obedience. Don't think that Les Bas Rouges are going to make it to the final at Crufts this time – 2 of the 4 dogs on the team are little more than puppies, one 8 months old and one 12 months old, but the dogs (and handlers!) are having fun training the (not so!) synchronised heelwork!

We have also sought to enlarge the lobby area and to provide a canopy over the entrance door. A Contractor has been selected and we are actively fundraising in the anticipation that work can commence in summer 2016. The 100 Club proceeds will contribute towards the cost of the project.
