HEREFORDSHIRE SCHOOLS RE-ORGANISATION

M.B. CE Primary School

You will have heard on the local news or, if you are a parent whose child attends Much Birch CE School, have received a from Mr Colin Howard, Headteacher, advising of the proposals involving the county's schools in September. Over 50 Primary Schools will be disrupted - indeed 11 of the 13 schools in the Golden Valley are affected. A large number of schools will be amalgamated and in consequence some will be closed. proposals can be seen Herefordshire Council's website www.herefordshire.gov.uk under 'School Review'.

As far as Much Birch CE School is concerned, it currently has 183 pupils on roll with a capacity of 196. The Council's proposals are that the capacity will be reduced to 140 over the next few years, this being achieved by limiting the intake into Reception each year to 20 instead of the current 28. The School will also no longer be designated to feed Kingstone High School and in 2009 will be required to feed Wyebridge Sports College. Parents will still have the right to choose which school their child will attend. reduction of pupil numbers will mean that, at some time in the future, Much Birch will no longer have single age range classes and mixed age range classes will be re-established. Council officers will, in the next few weeks, visit schools to discuss the proposals. The consultation period will be complete by the end of March, after which a revised set of proposals will be taken to the Council's Cabinet in April for approval in July.

The current Much Birch CE School site has been part of our village since 1961 and indeed it is an important centre. It has seen many changes over time, but its educational record and achievements in every way have been excellent. Last year, they were 2nd in the county's STATS league tables for academic success! It is well established in its current form, staff are very dedicated and indeed the school is highly regarded for its educational standards and sporting activities.

To disturb this excellent establishment at this stage is surely a retrograde step. These proposed changes will cause much disruption to pupils and staff, involving uncertainty over some years to come. The change in pupil numbers will mean finance reductions, staff restrictions and, inevitably, reduction in the excellent educational standards for the children in our Parish. Much Birch Parish Council members wholeheartedly support the school and consider that it should not be disrupted in this way. To all residents, particularly those parents who have children at school, and indeed those who will have others starting in the future, please ensure your views are heard.

The Parish Council will be discussing this at their meeting on THURSDAY 7TH FEBRUARY at 7.30pm. Please attend if you can. If you wish further information, contact:

Sadly, a number in or erstwhile from, this community have died recently. MRS. They returned to England at the end of 1961, briefly staying with her sister Peggy and the Helme family at Wormelow, before buying a grocery and provisions store in Holme Lacy Road, Hereford. Although working long hours, Ethel made sure that her

growing boys were well looked after in a loving environment. Tom and Ethel retired from the shop in 1984 and they moved to live in Ross-on-Wye. Tom died some 11 years ago and, after about a year, Ethel moved into a flat in Guardian Court, Hereford. She was very happy there and was able to take up painting classes which were held in Much Birch Hall. She kept up with her car driving and was able to visit all of her sons and their families and returned to worship at Little Birch Church. She was able to continue in this way until a year or so ago when she gave up driving. Her illness started about 3 months ago and she spent one day in St. Michaels Hospice died. He was a leader who always led from the front and organised many fundraising events for local clubs and the church. He also served as a district Councillor and recently on Ross Town Council.

Philip was brought up in Allensmore and moved to Much Dewchurch after his marriage to Jenny. They had 2 daughters, Joanne and Alison. Alison has Downs Syndrome but the family encouraged her to take part in all village activities and to enjoy a normal life as far as possible. Alison attended Barrs Court School and Widemarsh Workshop and Philip was actively engaged as chairman of the committee which ran these two organisations. He was also a governor of Kingstone High School.

In his 'spare time', he worked for Wiggins Special Metals for 27 years and then moved to be chief treasurer at Hereford Town Hall. In his younger days, he was a very keen sportsman and in his few years of retirement liked nothing more than walking in the Black Mountains. It was a severe blow to the whole family when he was diagnosed with a brain tumour some 15 months ago and it is merciful that he is now free from the pain and stress of his illness. He will be very sadly missed by his family and a very great number of friends from many walks of life and we send our very deepest sympathies to Jenny, Joanne and her family and to Alison.

Our Woodlands

Those of you who walk in either Athelstan's or Aconbury Woods cannot fail to have noticed much activity recently in both of them. For those of you who may wonder what's going on or those who haven't even realised there is a lot going on - a short summary.

There has been a lot of clear-felling of conifers in Athelstan's Wood over the earlier months of 2007, particularly alongside the stream and on the bank on the far side from Little Birch. Considering the Wood's history dating back to Saxon times, there was much concern that an ancient woodland should not be planted again with conifers after the decimation of the 1960s/70s. Thankfully, there has been some concession to modern thinking and about 40% of the felled area has been replanted with broadleaves - in groups on the bank and alongside the stream. The remainder will be Douglas Fir. However, the rides will be kept much more open so much pleasanter for walking and not nearly so depressing.

Apart from the Wye Woods Project, which has moved recently, there are two other major activities in Aconbury Wood. There has been some selective felling of oaks, forming 'glades' where, it is hoped, regeneration of oak seedlings will take place. It will be interesting to see what happens to the ground flora and insects in the meantime. Wintertime being the only feasible time to do the felling, there has been the inevitable churning up of the paths but, to the delight of those walking there, haulage of the timber has been carried out by horses, English cobs and Percherons, complete with bells — very

photogenic! Work has almost finished there for this year.

Also in progress is an archaeological survey of the area to be disturbed by Welsh Water laying a new water main. This will run just outside the south edge of the wood from the reservoir to Greenwood Cottage where it enters the wood and will travel down the old sunken lane to the far side of the wood from where it will travel the fields to Ridge over Archaeological study of the sunken lane so far seems to confirm that it is old but may replace one which ran just to the uphill side of it. The study will finish at the end of January and, hopefully, Border Archaeology will give a presentation to us along with Welsh Water in the not-toodistant future. You may have seen notices about the temporary closure of footpaths for the construction works. The sunken lane will be closed for about 3 months when they start work there.

Lottery Grant

Unfortunately, Little Birch Village Hall were unsuccessful with their application to gain funding from the Big Lottery Grant towards the extensive hall refurbishment. Some local organisations were successful due to possibly having more imaginative schemes. Among these were Peterstow and Bridge Sollars who are proposing to create a village hall in their local Churches. The management committee will be seeking ideas and suggestions for ways forward following this disappointing news at the AGM in April.

Neighbourhood Watch

Older Drivers

Older motorists bring a wealth of experience, confidence and tolerance to their driving, all of which contributes to making them safer on the road than other age groups. However, as you grow older, your ability to react to some situations gradually changes. Sight, hearing and judgement of speed may not be quite as sharp as they were when you were younger. Stiffening joints may make it difficult to turn your head to check blind spots or keep a check on vehicles either side of you. These changes occur so gradually that you may not realise they're

happening. Experienced drivers can easily slip into bad habits, and it is worth investing in the latest edition of the Highway Code, where you will find everything you need to know, including recent changes in the law.

The law and the older driver - the law requires a driver to renew his or her licence on reaching the age of 70 and every three years thereafter. All drivers, whatever their age, are required by law to notify the DVLA of the onset or worsening of a medical condition which may affect their ability to drive safely. These conditions include any heart condition, epilepsy, diabetes, glaucoma or other eye disease and difficulty in the use of limbs affecting a driver's ability to control a vehicle. If you have a medical condition, contact the Drivers Medical Group, DVLA, Swansea, SA99 1TU (tel 0870 6000301). You will normally be sent a confidential medical form for describing your condition in greater detail and a medical report may be required from your consultant or GP. You should ask your doctor about the possible effects that any medication you are taking may have on your driving. Some over-the-counter medications, such as cough and cold medicines can also make you feel drowsy and you should avoid driving while taking

It is an offence to drive any vehicle if you cannot read a standard number plate in good daylight from 67 feet away (the length of a cricket pitch).

Stopping Driving - this is not an easy decision to make, particularly if you have relied on your vehicle most of your life. Currently there is no legal cut-off age, so it is your responsibility to decide when is the right time to stop driving. Don't wait for an accident to convince you it's time to stop. You may feel the time has come if your reactions are becoming noticeably slower, or you are finding traffic conditions increasingly stressful. If you are concerned, consult your GP or an approved driving instructor for advice. Friends and relatives can also give you their honest opinion. Giving up driving doesn't mean the end of independence. The amount you spend on insurance, tax and maintaining and fuelling your car could pay for lots of taxi journeys. Don't forget your free bus pass
