

Turkish knight and Beelzebub turned up to complete the proceedings. Then, we had our food, hot dogs and crumble, but not on the same plates, before we launched into some singing.

The purpose of this year's Wassail was to raise money for the Heart and Lung Transplant Unit at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham. Our friend, Phil, had two new lungs fitted there two years ago, and it was our pleasure that he was able to sing and play at the Wassail, receiving a standing ovation after finishing with a full rendition of 'American Pie'.

## **Local News**

A very warm welcome is given to **Jo and Nick Pinfield** who have renovated 'Wayside' in King's Thorn, to **Maz and Alex Richmond** from London who have moved into 'Brambles' and **Pauline Hastie and partner, Steve Litley**, who moved into Rose Cottage about a month ago. We trust that they will all be happy in their new homes and in this community.

Hereford Crematorium was full of family and friends on 8th. January for the funeral of **Fred Turner** who died just before Christmas at the age of 76. He was the second eldest of the 13 Turner children and was born at Llanigon, near Hay on Wye. His father was a farm worker and his mother, Dorothy, was a real worker doing her fair share of land work as well as bringing up a large family.

Farm workers had no security of tenure at that time and so the family moved in turn to Harewood End, The Ark at Pencoyd and Poolsnatch Cottage at Much Birch, the two latter farms were owned by the Snell family. When the council houses were built in Tump Lane, it gave the family the opportunity to get out of tied cottages and they first moved to No.11 and then to No. 35 by which time the family was complete.

Fred attended schools at Hentland, Pencoyd and Llanwarne and aged 15 went to work at the mushroom farm at Much Birch. The chance came

a few years later to work on the construction of the Wiggins factory at Holmer in lagging pipes on site. He was called up for National Service but must have had the shortest service record in the Army as conscription soon ceased and soldiers became full time professionals. He came back to the mushroom farm for a while before heading off to Bromyard for a spell of making 'spoilers' for the backs of racing cars. His love of growing vegetables drew him back to gardening and with brother, Richard, they helped out Acton Billing at 'Cedar Villa' for a few years before Mr. Billing died. Fred and Richard then purchased the smallholding and diversified from strawberries and potatoes into a wider range of vegetables. This was hard work with limited machinery and Fred often took on hedge trimming, and tree felling to bolster the income.

They grew prize winning vegetables and won many cups and awards at local and county shows, sweeping the board at the Little Birch Show for many years. Fred also loved motorbike scrambling and would go off to local and national events most weekends. In the early days, he and Richard would go off on bikes but when a car was purchased, several family members would also accompany them. Fred also did some 'beating' for local shoots with his numerous dogs over the years. Eventually, Fred had to take things a little quieter as his 'chest' had been getting gradually worse and he helped out Richard when it wasn't too cold in the garden in winter or too warm in the polytunnels in summer. He always liked to chat to customers who stopped to buy eggs or veg or wooden tubs or compost or garden benches which were made on site. He also became interested in making walking sticks until his eyesight began to fail.

The last few months of his life were very difficult and he had several spells in hospital with breathing problems but throughout all this illness, Richard gave him the utmost care but a bad chest infection eventually caught up with him and he passed away in hospital.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson from whose address these notes have been taken. Donations in memory of Fred were made to the Asthma UK. We extend to Richard and all sisters and brothers our deepest sympathy.

It is also sad to report the death of **Peter Blandford Thomas** of Tump Lane at the age of 89. His well attended funeral service took place at Hereford Crematorium and was conducted by Rev.

Mark Johnson from whose address these notes are given.

Peter was born in St. Briavels in the Forest of Dean where his father was a forester. When Peter was some 5 years of age, the family moved to Worcester and then to Turvey Hall Cottage on the Monmouth road. He went to the old school at Much Birch and I guess walked across the fields in Tump Lane to get there. The family now 5 in number with parents and Peter, Marion and Ivor moved to Wallspool Cottage in Little Birch. At 14 years of age, Peter also went into forestry since WW11 broke out and timber was in great demand. At 18, he was 'called up' and went into the Royal Navy, which is why the Service commenced with the hymn 'Eternal Father strong to save'. He served on ships in the Indian Ocean and after the celebrations of VJ Day which ended the war in 1945, he went on to serve in Japan before coming back for 'demob' to Scotland in 1947. That year the snow lasted for almost 3 months from mid Jan to the end of March and it was bitterly cold. When he arrived back at Hereford Railway station, there was no transport running and so Peter had to walk back to Little Birch through deep snow.

Peter then went back into the timber trade working for Mr. Sid Watkins at King's Thorn. Peter was trying to court 'Fluff' but she was less than impressed with him and rebuffed all his advances. However, his persistence paid off and not long after, they were courting and married in 1951 with the reception in the newly opened Little Birch Hall. They lived with Fluff's parents at Cherry Orchard Cottage and then to Eden Cottage, Barrack Hill, where in due time, Peter, Veronica, Diane and Elaine were born.

With a large family, a move to Tump Lane gave them larger accomodation and Peter went to work for Sankeys in Hereford until it closed and then did a stint at Pontrilas Sawmill. He later joined Painter Bros. and worked there until he retired. Peter never really retired as he helped Tony Shaw and his great friend, Ossie Hughes in various building projects mainly to keep him in 'beer money'. He had developed a taste for rum while in the Navy and so would often frequent the Black Swan at Much Dewchurch. Fluff and Peter celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary with a party in the Black Swan in 2001. Meanwhile, the family had grown up and son Peter, after a partnership with Robin Berkeley and Dave Davies in the building trade, emigrated to Australia but now lives in New

Guinea while the daughters have stayed locally. When Fluff wasn't too well, Ronnie (Veronica) took Peter to the Black Swan. Fluff died in 2012 and soon after, Peter was diagnosed with terminal cancer which was a double blow as he missed Fluff greatly after their 60 years together. Peter refused any treatment and Ronnie who had worked at ASDA gave up her job and looked after her father with help from Diane and Elaine. Peter had to have a bed downstairs and Ronnie gave him the utmost nursing and care. He was determined to remain at home to the end and he passed away peacefully just before Christmas with his family around him

Donations in memory of Peter were given to the Midlands Air Ambulance and we send our sincere sympathies to son, Peter, Ronnie, Diane and Elaine and grandchildren, Adam and Joanne.

One of the oldest Sisters at Much Birch Monastery has passed on at the age of 88. **Sister Veronica Pye** joined the Order of Poor Clare in Lower Bullingham some 60 years ago and was Mother Superior at the time of the move to Much Birch. She welcomed local residents to tea and major events at the Monastery and acknowledged everyone's denomination in an ecumenical way. She was just a lovely lady and will be greatly missed. A Requiem Mass for the repose of her soul was celebrated by the Archdeacon of Cardiff on Monday, 19th. January and her body was laid to rest in the small cemetery behind the Monastery.

We extend to her family, the Poor Clare Sisters and her many friends our deepest sympathy.

### **Little Birch Parish Council**

The most recent meeting on Wednesday 7th January four Councillors were present, Cllrs Clarke, Wissler, Godding and the Chair Cllr Morley.

The PC had a short presentation from David Atkinson, the Localities Steward for Balfour Beatty. He explained that he is the first point of contact for Parish Councils if they need to talk to Balfour Beatty. He has a team of 7 people covering South Hereford and Ross Rural area. He confirmed that whilst Barrack Hill is on a bus route, it would not be routinely gritted, so please can parishioners be aware that the PC has arranged for this to be gritted in severe weather, but when it is really cold, careful driving is vital, particularly on this hill.

The PC would remind parishioners that they had been notified that the BT phone box near the village hall has been used only 3 times in the last year, and thus BT are looking to disconnect it. However, this might be reconsidered if it were used more often, so, don't forget, use it or lose it and perhaps each house hold could make one phone call from the box in the coming months, and that might encourage BT to keep it going? Also, the Parish Council has been given the opportunity to purchase the box for a very modest sum, if they did so, they would welcome any suggestions as to what uses could be made of it. **Parish Meeting** - at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 8th January at the Much Birch Community Hall. The Parish Council heard further updates on local road and highways issues from the Balfour Beatty (BBLP) Locality Steward. There was a reminder that the "self help" gritting scheme is in place to help keep the roads clear in the event of icy weather but that this will only be operational on certain routes and only during periods of severe icy conditions. It is therefore reminded that extreme care should be taken when driving, in all conditions, to try to ensure maximum safety for all on the village's roads. There are grit bins available for highway use, but not personal property (e.g. driveways etc.). It is advised that a light sprinkle of grit should be all that is required to maintain traction. Thank you all for your co-operation in this regard.

### Message from Balfour Beatty

We have received some queries concerning the  
most appropriate method for clerks to report  
service requests and enquiries – please see the  
information below:

When BBLP took over the contract in September  
2013, we set up a parish mailbox to receive service  
requests and queries from parish clerks. This was  
[herefordshireparishes@bblivingplaces.com](mailto:herefordshireparishes@bblivingplaces.com)

Once we had locality stewards in post across the  
county (recruiting over a period of time from June  
– August 2014) they were keen to understand  
what was important to the parishes and developed  
closer working relationships with clerks. Clerks  
were encouraged to contact them rather than use  
the parish mailbox (although this is still in operation  
and being monitored).

Over a period of time, Herefordshire Council have  
worked hard to further develop their website for  
online reporting and are keen we encourage this as  
a primary reporting tool as it reduces double  
handling of requests, gives customers the  
opportunity to report once, with the opportunity to  
clearly identify the accurate location of a defect,  
and include any local knowledge which helps add  
detail to the request. As web reporting provides a  
direct interface with our database, the locality  
stewards receive these requests directly to their  
tablets, which enables them to spend more time  
inspecting and less time tied to the office logging

routine requests received via email. All our locality  
stewards will communicate with the clerks  
whenever they need and are always open to  
discussing concerns locally – but they do have a  
limited timescale to complete a wide range of  
duties and where possible, we would like them to  
have the most opportunity to be out working and  
inspecting in their areas. Obviously, if a clerk has  
a complicated or particularly concerning enquiry,  
our stewards are very happy to deal with the  
matter directly, but routine requests such as  
pothole reporting, gully cleansing, street light  
faults and more can easily be logged via the web.

An additional bonus with the web reporting is that  
so long as individuals (members of the  
public, clerks etc) provide an email address when  
they log the request this allows automated updates  
to be sent back. There will be updates when the  
status of an enquiry changes, which in turn also  
helps reduce chasing and double handling. See

We hope this helps explain the changes to the  
systems over the last 18 months – we are keen to  
develop and improve the reporting systems where  
we can but appreciate it may have caused  
confusion and apologise for any uncertainty. We  
also believe Herefordshire Council are working to  
provide a simpler dedicated reporting tool for ward  
members and clerks, but this is currently a work in  
progress.

### **MLS (Minibus Link Scheme) Solving transport needs for not-for-profit organisations**

hvoos (Herefordshire Voluntary Organisations Support Service) MLS throughout Herefordshire; linking groups wishing to use minibuses at low cost for one-stop journeys with minibus owners who will benefit from a contribution towards their vehicle's running costs.

MLS is available to all properly constituted not-for-profit organisations such as community and voluntary organisations, uniformed youth groups and youth clubs, schools and colleges. Upon joining the scheme all groups have access to a list of vehicles appropriate to their needs - passenger numbers, ramp and lift requirements, a list of volunteer drivers - all at affordable rates. Minibus owners submit details of their vehicles, indicating when they are available for loan. ### **John Kinross continues his series on local castles.**

**Treago Castle** at St. Weonards, is the home of the Mynors family and is a fourteenth century fortified house built in 1470 by Richard Mynors, a close ally of the Earl of Pembroke, owner of Raglan Castle. It has turrets in each corner, that on the south front being much larger than the other three. The courtyard was filled in in 1844 with a new staircase and the large tower room has been used as a bedroom, meeting room or card room over the years. The family supported the Yorkists in the Wars of the Roses and the King in the Civil War. There is a picture of the lady of the house armed only with a dagger keeping out some Scots

marauders in 1645. The house however was never attacked so remains little altered over the years.

The family has hatchments and monuments in the nearby St. Weonards church. There is a large seventeenth century barn and a walled garden and for many years, the house was used as a farmhouse. The present family had a vineyard and their wine was well valued by local connoisseurs. The castle is open occasionally in the summer months. Apply to Sir Richard Mynors on 01981 580 206. Recently, the Church of England has been using the castle for meetings.

**Pembridge Castle** is situated in Welsh Newton and is an exception to all Hereford castles. It is not a ruin and is a private house now but alas, no longer open on Thursday afternoons. It is 45m long and 30m wide with a gatehouse, strong wall, a round keep in the south west corner and a chapel in the north west corner. It is surrounded by a dry ditch. It dates from the 13th century and was built by Matilda de Valery but passed to the Pembridge family. Richard de Pembridge was a Knight of the Garter and Warden of the Cinque Ports. It passed to the Burleys, the Tudors and during the Civil War to Sir Walter Pye, who made it a Royalist outpost. It changed hands in 1644 and was garrisoned by Parliament when ordered for slighting. This was not carried out and George Kemble purchased it after the war and made it habitable. His relation, John Kemble had an oratory here. It was inhabited by the Scudamores in 1715 and the Townleys, a Jacobite family before being sold to the Bartletts in 1913, who rebuilt the gatehouse. There are some stone buildings behind and in the chapel a brass to Dr. Hedley Bartlett who was a Bishop of Siluria in the lesser Eastern Church.
