Several adults and babies in our community have been into hospital recently with breathing difficulties but happily they are now back at home and we wish them a speedy recovery.

It is sad to report the death of **Des Clarke** teacher, sportsman and well regarded member of our community. He was born in 1938 in a village near Aylesbury and, after passing his eleven plus went on to Aylesbury grammar school. It soon became evident that he had an aptitude for mathematics and prowess in sporting activities. He achieved high standards at cricket and cross country running.

After graduation from London University he had a choice National of Service or teaching mathematics and physics. He decided to become a teacher and gained a post at Dr Challoners grammar school in Amersham where he taught mathematics in the mornings and sport in the afternoons. In 1970 Des moved to Moreton on Lugg and become head of mathematics at Leominster grammar school (later Minster Comprehensive) where he obviously gained popularity and respect as shown by recent entries on the school Facebook page.

"Have just seen in the Hereford Times that Knobby Clarke the old maths teacher has died. He was my favourite teacher. He was a great bloke."

"Such sad news. The best teacher ever."

"Wasn't he the teacher who used to create maths problems relating to Newcastle Brown Ale?"

Des gave up cricket but regularly played hockey for Hereford. In 1984 his wife died and he was left to bring up two children Tim and Sal. Later he met and married Alison, who had three children of her own, and they all lived in the old School Little Birch. He continued teaching including a short spell at Monmouth school and then 12 years parttime at Hereford Sixth Form College. He continued with his keen interests in beer, and especially beer labels, hill walking, dogs, travel, crosswords and Sodoku. He was an active member of CAMRA and also took an interest in local affairs including officiating at village quizzes and dog shows.

Des was recognised as a highly intelligent, well educated man with an excellent sense of humour. He had a positive approach to life with a very wide range of interests but he did not hesitate to talk about some strong dislikes including pasta, curry, garlic, loud music, smoking, Christmas, keg beer and lager!

We are sad to report the death of Leon (Tate) Slater of King's Thorn at the age of 66 years. Leon was born in Cornwall but the family moved to Ross soon afterwards and he was educated at 2 schools in Hereford. He loved popular music and in his teens had a transistor radio which he took to bed to listen to Radio Caroline. He became an avid Beatles fan and one of their numbers was played on exit from the Crematorium. His first jobs were as a labourer in several spheres including the building trade. He met and married Sandra Johns of King's Thorn in 1966 and their son, Lee, was born in 1968. Sandra did not have to move very far as they moved into the wooden bungalow next door, 'Wood Corner'. Leon loved his football and was a skilful midfielder. He played for Little Birch in the Hereford Sunday League in the early 1980's. The team progressed from Div.4 to Div. 1 over 5 years or so and then the team disbanded. He frequently went to see Hereford United play. He loved surfing and father and son took a holiday in California travelling down the coast from San Francisco to Los Angeles. Leon was also keen on quizzing and played regularly at the Axe and Cleaver winning many prizes. He trained as a bricklayer and eventually took down the wooden bungalow and rebuilt it with a new layout in brick with a tiled roof, of which he and the family were very proud. Lee married Vanessa and in due time India and Zac were born making Sandra and Leon very proud grandparents. Lee and Vanessa have lived in London for many years but made frequent visits to King's Thorn.

Leon had not enjoyed good health for several years but Sandra was his 'rock' and looked after him with the utmost care.

Leon's funeral service took place on Dec. 19th at Hereford Crematorium which was crowded with family and many friends and neighbours supporting Sandra and Lee, who gave a moving tribute to his father and we extend to Sandra, Lee and the family our deepest sympathy.. Donations in memory of Leon will be sent to St. Michael's Hospice.

It is with great regret that the death of **Fred Turner** is announced. Fred and brother, Richard, ran the vegetable smallholding on the A49 in Much Birch. A full tribute will be given in the next Newsletter.

The Three Castles

John Kinross continues his contrubutions on local castles

Skenfrith, White Castle and Grosmont are all about five miles from each other in a large triangle. They were brought into one ownership by King Stephen in 1138. They were administered by the Sheriff of Herefordshire so that the area between the river Wye and the Black Mountains could be kept under Crown control. The Welsh raiders were a constant menace and one sheriff was killed at Dingestow (a few miles south of Skenfrith) in 1182. Ralph of Grosmont was а military engineer who strengthened all 3 castles at this time. King John granted all 3 castles to Hubert de Burgh and later, Hugh acquired Montgomery, Cardigan and Carmarthen castles.

Skenfrith lies close to the river Monnow as the river filled the moat. It is a polygonal shape with corner round towers and a circular keep. Waleran, the German who was Constable of the three, built a chapel at Skenfrith. In 1241, a receipt survives showing that crossbows and quarrels were purchased from St. Briavels castle where they were made as well as wax for the chapel candles and pans for the three kitchens. In 1254, Prince

Edward was given the castles but he passed them to the Earl of Lancaster and they remained crown property. Grosmont is a much securer castle than Skenfrith with a strong gatehouse, large Hall area, strong corner towers, a deep moat and bank beyond. There is evidence that like Goodrich, this castle was adapted for more luxurious living in less troubled times.

White Castle, isolated on a hill off the Skenfrith to Abergavenny road, is built with soldiers in mind. It has a huge 13th. century outer ward with large walls where an army could camp and a further bailey on the other side or hornwork also surrounded by the moat. Pevesner suggests that the Sheriff of Herefordshire paid £128.16s on this 1184 and 1186. The other castle between improvements took place in the 13th. century when Llewelyn ap Gruffudd was threatening the area. The last Governor of the three castles was John Morgan, whose tomb is in Skenfrith Church, dated 1557. After a brief period of private ownership, the three castles are in the hands of CADW and for anyone reading this who speaks Welsh. I will send them a copy of the last two pages of my Skenfrith Guidebook (dated 1970) which are in Welsh.
