# Au Revoir and Thanks to Kay

On Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> May Much Birch Church had the honour of hosting the last Benefice Service that Kay officiated at as our Rector. The church was full, representing all age groups from the seven parishes. Despite the sadness of Kay leaving us, the service was a happy one and as you might expect a musical one. After the service a benefice photograph was taken to

mark the special occasion and this was followed by an excellent and enjoyable Bring and Share lunch during which speeches presentations were made to Kay. First of all the PUFF group had made their own presentation and the Choir sang a tribute to their Choirmaster. Patrick Darling then delivered a thank you speech on behalf of the seven parishes comprising the Wormelow Hundred Benefice. He thanked Kay for her ministry, for her caring and support to us all and for the diplomatic way in which she brought the seven parishes together when the boundaries were realigned. She is leaving behind a group of seven parishes who are working well together and it is a testament to her thoughtfulness, caring and sheer hard work in pulling the parishes together. Kay was presented with designer jewellery of a matching necklace and bracelet by John McKellar, a red laptop computer, an album of photographic memories, celebration cake, flowers and a cheque of the remainder of the collection for Kay to spend as she wished (a little bird tells me that a new cassock is high on the list of choices). The choir held their own special lunch on the following Tuesday at the home of Lesley Gare when they presented Kay with their own vocal tribute and their own gift.

Kay and Peter came to live in Much Birch in 1976, and after a year went to live in Llanwarne for 10 years before moving to Birch Kay directed the Much Birch Church Choir from 1981 and of course in recent years has had much to do with the combined choir. She was Deaconed in 1990 and there is a lovely photograph in the album of one of her first tasks, which was sweeping the floor of the Community Hall in her robes (and a somewhat different hair style from today!). She was Priested in 1994 and was one of the group of the first woman priests in the area. She then

worked in the Birch Group of parishes for six years as a nonstipendiary minister and continued these duties for a further six years during which time she was also the music teacher and Chaplain at Hereford Sixth Form College. In 2003 she became the Priest-in-Charge of the new Wormelow Hundred Group and became Rector when the Archenfield Group was formed. Kay also became involved with some national work when she was elected to the General Synod in 1995 and when in 2005 she was elected to the Archbishop's Council, from which she was also appointed as Chair of the Business Committee of General Synod. She will continue this national work alongside that of her new appointment at the Cathedral.

Peter retired in April 2008 and increasingly since then they felt they wanted to spend more time together than the ministering to seven parishes would allow and to have time to spend with the grandchildren. Kay therefore decided to take up the offer of a new non-stipendiary appointment as Cathedral Chaplain at Hereford Cathedral. This means generally working on Sundays plus three days a week for most of the year but for five fortnights she will be full time "Canon in Residence"

gives This appointment Kay particular responsibility for working volunteers the Cathedral and for the Pastoral team which cares for the sick and housebound (i.e. Home Communions etc.) and she will also have responsibility for the team of summer Chaplains. As part of the role Kay has been asked to begin a new monthly Sunday Evening Service to be conducted in a less formal style than other worship at the Cathedral, using perhaps the Taizé and Iona forms of liturgy and music. There will be also be an opportunity to accommodate some experimental forms of worship and another area of responsibility will be to chair meetings of the Cathedral's pastoral group. She is going to be quite busy!! Family members and many friends from the Benefice were present in the Cathedral on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> June for the Licensing of Kay by the Bishop of Hereford to this new appointment.

We hope that Kay and Peter are able to enjoy their semi-retirement but above all we thank Kay for all that she has done for us in this Benefice over the years particularly for her work with the children and young people. must not forget too that Peter has quietly supported Kay in background and we thank him for that and look forward to his continued presence amongst us. We shall miss Kay hugely but we her well in her appointment and pray for her as she sets out on this new form of ministry.

# The Wye Valley Walk & Talk

We were pleased to have Heather Hurley back to talk to us about the study she took part in of the Wye Valley from Home Lacy Bridstow and about Hentland and Pengethley in particular. As before, she gave us a fascinating well-illustrated account. and Firstly she explained about the project which involved all the parishes lying alongside the Wye in the project area and about how communities were invited to take part in various activities, learning new skills and researching the area. They were helped in their task by experts in the various fields and with grants from various sources. This culminated in the production of a book - Landscape Origins of the Wye Valley.

The group studied the geology, archaeology, old documents and old maps. From these, together with investigations on the ground, they were able to study landscape and agricultural change, woodlands, buildings, industries and mills, old tracks, river and rail transport and river crossings. From this enormous range, dealt with in the book, Heather picked out a few

items of particular interest including a forge at Carey island in the seventeenth century, using wood for charcoal from Athelstan's Wood. She told us about their investigation of a possible Roman crossing of the river at Red Rail (a continuation of Caple Street in Kings Caple) where they found evidence of a much later crossing but did not excavate deeply enough to find Roman remains. She also told us about a dig in fields on Gillow lands where interesting markings on aerial photos were spotted. The dig revealed Romano-British finds and evidence of a ring ditch also slag suggesting possible iron-working. A canoe trip down the Wye revealed the remains of many wharves used in the past for loading and unloading goods and animals. The Wye was used for navigation from 1680 to 1855. Barges, using sails where possible, moved up and down, usually needing to be towed upstream, by men and, later, River traffic stopped horses. abruptly with the opening of the Hereford to Ross railway in 1855. (It closed in 1964.)

Heather then told us about the history of the Hentland/Pengethley area which we later visited and walked around. Hentland church sits in a most attractive and now almost forgotten valley but would have been on or near an important route in Roman times or earlier. The remains of several old hollow ways are to be found radiating from here and it is thought that a Roman road passed nearby linking two main north/south routes. Dubricius/Dyfrig, to whom Hentland (from henllan - old church) church is dedicated, was probably active here in the  $5^{th}/6^{th}$  century and maybe founded a monastery at Llanfrother, about a mile from the The site of the church church. possibly preceded that, Heather showed us a spring or well rising just below the church on an area known as Parson's Common. Many churches were established near holy wells thought to have healing

properties. The present Hentland church dates from the 14th century but has been much altered later. Still visible on the south side is the filled in remains of the old main doorway giving access to the church from a medieval settlement on the south side of the church. Unevenness of the ground still indicates the house platforms beneath. We then walked into Pengethley park alongside a hollow way which led from Hentland to Gillow (a medieval manor). The park, now in National Trust ownership (left to it by the last owner), contains a number of fine trees and was a deer park in the 1600s. By 1819, the then owner, Col Symonds, felled a large number of the trees to pay for his election expenses! The house originally a Tudor fortified manor house with a fine hall. At the end of the 1500s it was lived in by the Powell family who married into the Symonds family. They lived there until the last member of the family, a Miss Caroline Symonds died in 1940 leaving the park to the National Trust. The house then became a hotel. The original Tudor house was burnt down in 1820 and replaced with Regency house we see today. All that remains of the old house is part of the cellars visible in the garden.

After visiting the vineyard (established 1993) Heather took us past Upper Pengethley Farm, once part of the estate and possibly the dower house, with its splendid range of newly converted barns. We then turned downhill and, surprisingly quickly, found ourselves back at Hentland church.

# L.B.P.C. Annual Meeting

Report of the Little Birch Parish Council Annual Meeting and Parish Council Meeting held on Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> May 2009.

No interests were declared.

Mr. J. Dillon was duly re-elected as chairman. Mr. J. Dillon gave a summary of the Council's activities for the past year including a summary of the latest Village Hall refurbishment projects. He thanked Cllr. Richard Smith and CSO Fiona Witcher for their continued support.

Minutes of the AM held on 7th May 2008 and Parish Council Meeting held on 4th March 2009 were read and signed as true records.

Annual Financial Report - The Council's books were available for inspection and the Clerk issued details of the 2008/2009 accounts. There have been Lengthsman's costs of £1394.68 in this financial year, £606.76 has been received from Herefordshire Council and balance of £982.26 was carried forward from the previous financial year. This leaves a balance of £194.34 for the Lengthsman scheme for the 2009/2010 financial year. The balance available to the Parish Council for the 2009/2010 financial year is £1187.74. The 2008/2009 figures were agreed by the Parish Council.

Update on Village Hall - It was reported that the Village Hall has had a very good year with fund raising activities and completing several projects to refurbish the hall. With the huge of the Christmas success pantomime, further plans are to stage a summer pantomime to raise more funds. The Chairman expressed special thanks to the members of the Village Hall Management Committee for their continued hard work. Little Birch Parish Council nominated Sue Jones and Alison Clarke to continue representing the Parish Council on Village Hall Management Committee. Further refurbishment plans include replacing the current

guttering and facia boards and installing an outside light.

Matters Arising from previous minutes – Mr. Morley and the Clerk attended an informal meeting with Little Dewchurch Parish Council and other invited neighbouring Parish Councils. The outcome of which to be discussed during the next Parish Council meeting together with the Affordable Housing Survey results.

Village Hall - Clerk to contact Much Birch Parish Council concerning the Communications Group and newsletter.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme — Invoice received for completed work. Mr. Clarke, Mr. Morley and Mr. Powell to complete a walk around the parish to identify possible future work for the Lengthsman and/or Parish Initiative.

**Parish Initiative** – Parish Councillors assigned to identify possible defects. Clerk to chase progress of existing reported defects.

**Parish Field** – A quote has been received to cut the bordering hedge and trees of the parish field, further quotes to be obtained.

*Financial Report* - 2 cheques received, 5 cheques written

Correspondence - A detailed list of all correspondence was given to the Parish Council and noted with any responses detailed under 'Any Other Business'.

**Planning** - Planning refused for The Crickets Croft no. DCCE2009/0309/F - Retrospective application for ancillary accommodation for elderly parents.

#### Any Other Business

A resident reported several areas of concern in regards to culverts and ditches. All areas to be examined further when the Parish Councillors complete their annual inspection.

It was reported that Little Birch Church vestry had been broken into although nothing seems to have been stolen.

Correspondence received from two parishioners concerning the sizes

of HGV lorries delivering goods to Crows Nest Lane residents.

A couple of sheep worrying incidents have occurred within the Parish. Dog owners have been contacted directly.

A report was read by the Clerk, on behalf of Councillor Richard Smith, summarising his and Hereford Council's achievements.

# Speed Enforcement

The role of the local police officer is to address issues raised by the public. One of the main concerns mentioned in many villages is speeding traffic. To address this problem it has been decided that will conduct rolling а programme of speed enforcement in all the villages which are subject to 30, 40 and 50mph limits. The community support officers are also going to be trained in the use of the speed devices.

Whilst we are in the villages and if you are out and about, come and have a chat and we can show you what we do.

# Policing The Priorities

We all need to make priorities in life - it helps us to deal with the things that are most important. West Mercia Police is no different in this respect. There are certain things that get immediate attention – murders, rapes, road crashes and missing children, for example.

We also have issues that we believe should have a very high priority, not just in our eyes but for all the communities we serve. Readers of previous issues will know that this year the force's main thrust in relation to crime is towards house burglaries because of the huge impact it can have on victims. In addition to crime, all staff will be focused on improving satisfaction and confidence in the services we provide.

At a day-to-day level, people may not be too concerned about serious crimes because they know that the police are sighted on these and will deal with them professionally. But there can be local issues needing a greater focus to reduce the impact on communities.

This is where the Partners & Communities Together (PACT) process comes in. The PACT gets local agencies system (police, housing, health, transport together with local communities to find out what concerns need addressing. Such issues may include anti-social behaviour, parking, speeding, nuisance dogs or litter.

Every three months, PACT meetings decide what are the priorities for a given area. All these are published amongst other places on the Local Policing pages of the West Mercia Police website (www.westmercia.police.uk) and detail the priority and who is dealing with it.

Our Local Policing Teams take these priorities very seriously because these are the things that really concern their local communities. On top of our main priorities, these are the issues the public want to see us deal with. To outsiders, some may seem trivial but they do affect the

quality of life of local people so they are dealt with.

In Wigmore, PC Andy Varden and CSO Zoe Brown (Leominster Rural) are being asked to deal with the problem of youths congregating outside Wigmore Church and causing a nuisance. Regular visits and engagement with those youths will hopefully resolve the problem.

In Hereford City Centre, Sgt Dave Evans and his team are targeting drivers using East as a rat run and contravening the No-Vehicles as residents have sign. complained about the high number of vehicles using the narrow road, contrary to the regulations. Public education and Warnings and prosecutions will sort this issue out for them. the Peterchurch villagers complain of speeding cars in Much Birch, Callow, Peterchurch Clehonger and breaking the 30mph and 40mph limits. So PC Andy Bundy from Peterchurch regularly takes out his speed gun to detect errant motorists at those locations and gives warnings and tickets where appropriate.
