Local Parish Councils received a copy of a letter from British Telecom to the Herefordshire Council,dated 29th. May, that included the following:

REMOVAL OF PUBLIC PAYPHONE: KINGSTHORNE HEREFORD HR2 8AL

We have been informed that a planning application will shortly be submitted to redevelop the farmland at the rear of this kiosk. The Highway Authority has asked for the kiosk to be removed/relocated to improve visibility.

Our records indicate that the service is not used and therefore we are proposing to remove the kiosk.

Before we can permanently remove a kiosk we have a responsibility to consult with relevant public bodies on the proposed removal. As part of the consultation process it is a requirement that the council reply in writing to BT within 90 days giving their comments or objections received from the local community. If you do not reply it will be taken that the council and interested parties have no objection to the permanent removal of the kiosk.

A notice of our proposal is being displayed in the kiosk.

We say a big 'Thank You' to **Sid Hitching** for over 20 years of delivering the Newsletter to houses in his area. Coming up to 88 years of age, Sid has been our oldest deliverer and takes a very well deserved rest. His 'round' has kindly been taken over by Mrs. **Margaret Scrivens**.

It is very sad to report the death of **Gordon 'John' Wilden** at the age of 77 years after a long illness bravely borne. John was the eldest of 9 children and the family lived in a small cottage near Mayhill. His mother worked extremely hard to keep the family together and she picked snowdrops, violets and wild daffodils and later in the season, hedgerow fruits, which John had to take to Gloucester market at 6am and be back in time for school. John had a very difficult relationship with his step father and when the family had to leave their cottage, he went to live with an aunt.

When John finished school he found employment in one of the coal pits in the Forest of Dean. Part of his pay was the delivery of one ton of coal each month. This was shared with neighbours who in turn gave eggs, butter or meat when they killed a pig.

He was able to travel to work by motorcycle alternating each week on his own and then on his cousin's motorcycle. One day, they were riding to work on his cousin's machine and met a lorry travelling on the wrong side of the road on a bend. With buildings on either side of the narrow road, there was no way of avoiding a collision and both finished under the lorry. The cousin was killed and virtually all John's limbs were broken and his skull fractured. He was in hospital for 6 months. As neither of them had passed a driving test there was no insurance and hence no compensation.

As soon as he could, John got an HGV licence and spent over 40 years driving buses and heavy

goods vehicles. Joyce and John were married in 1959 at Weston under Penyard Church and in due time, Michael and Christopher were born. They moved into Little Birch Road in 1964 and Heather's arrival completed the family.

John helped for a number of years with the mini Agricultural Shows behind Little Birch Village Hall both setting up and clearing afterwards and also put up and ran a 'tin can shy' stall. The family also supported the scouts and brownies in King's Thorn and took part in the first Pantomimes in LB Village Hall.

John loved his cars and bought an Austin 7 as soon as he could afford it and had many cars over the years but his pride and joy was the Mercedes with a personalised number plate which he had in recent years.

After retiring from lorry driving, John took on a 'driver's truck stop' on the A465 Abergavenny Road below Lock's garage. He was always there by 6am each morning and made many lasting friendships with drivers. He later converted a caravan so that customers could shelter in all winds and weather to enjoy their breakfasts and burgers. John had a very dry sense of humour and when asked by a customer " What are you doing this week end"? As quick as a flash and without a hint of a smile, John replied "I'm taking my granny hang gliding"

When John finally retired he was always busy at home and in a gale one night went out to secure the roof of the conservatory. Sadly, he fell backwards from the ladder landed on his back on the railings and finished unconscious in the garden below breaking his back and damaging his skull. He had to spend many months in hospital at Oswestry and then at home before making a full recovery.

John and Joyce greatly enjoyed visits from the grandchildren and took them for walks in the surrounding fields and woods.

In recent years, John underwent two major operations in Birmingham and was determined to get back to full health. He walked for miles each day and was a familiar sight in his fluorescent jacket. He talked to many local folk who he had not met before and enjoyed conversation with them.

In the last months, John's health deteriorated again but with the dedication of Dr. England and the Much Birch Surgery staff his pain was well controlled. Joyce stayed with him day and night and gave him the best possible care.

His funeral service was held at the Crematorium on 4th. June conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson.

The presence of so many erstwhile customers and friends showed the high regard in which he was held. We send to Joyce, Michael, Chris and Heather and their families our deepest sympathies. John will be greatly missed.

Donations in memory of John were made to Much Birch Surgery.

John Kinross of Much Birch continues his series on local castles with Brampton Bryan Castle.

One of the more spectacular castles in the county, Brampton Bryan's ruined castle stands in the front garden of the Georgian home of the Harley family and can be seen over the back wall of the churchyard and on the occasions when the garden is open. It dates from the reign of Henry 1 and may well have been strong enough to defend against bows and arrows but was not easily defended against artillery. During the Civil War, Sir Robert Harley, a puritan and Cromwell supporter, was in London as a member of Parliament leaving his young wife, Lady Brilliana with three of their seven children to defend the castle. She had a garrison of some 70 men under an experienced soldier, Sergeant Hackluyt, who did his best to keep the attacking Royalists under Colonel Lingen at bay. At first, all went well and the Sergeant's men shot many of the attackers. A poisoned bullet killed the garrison's cook, but after burning the village and church, Lingen withdrew to Gloucester where the siege was turning against the Royalists.

It was alas too late for Lady Brilliana who suffered a bad cold and died, but the siege was resumed in 1644 by a new force under Sir Michael Woodhouse. His guns destroyed the castle walls and Dr. Wright and the Sergeant had to surrender. The prisoners were sent to gaol in Shrewsbury.

The castle has an impressive cellar where the family would have been safe and the gatehouse is nearly intact. The church roof is supposed to have been repaired with the castle banqueting house roof which would also have needed repairing as Lady Brilliana had reported to her son that "the roof was so bayttered that there was not one dry room in it".

Sir Robert Harley drew up a statement of losses amounting to £12,990 after the war and was advised to get the money from the estate of Col. Lingen. His son, Sir Edward, was eventually able to get enough money to build the present house in which there is a picture of Lady Brilliana and some Civil War relics.
