NHS Digital Data Collection

Data sharing with NHS Digital will start on 1 September 2021.

The NHS needs data about the patients it treats to plan and deliver its services and to ensure that care and treatment provided is safe and effective. The General Practice Data for Planning and Research data collection will help the NHS to improve health and care services for everyone by collecting patient data that can be used to do this.

NHS Digital has engaged with the British Medical Association (BMA), Royal College of GPs (RCGP) and the National Data Guardian (NDG) to ensure relevant safeguards are in place for patients and GP practices.

NHS Digital purposes for processing patient data

NHS Digital will collect, analyse, publish and share this patient data to improve health and care services for everyone. This includes:

- informing and developing health and social care policy
- planning and commissioning health and care services
- taking steps to protect public health (including managing and monitoring the coronavirus pandemic)
- in exceptional circumstances, providing you with individual care

enabling healthcare and scientific research

Any data that NHS Digital collects will only be used for health and care purposes. It is never shared with marketing or insurance companies.

What patient data NHS Digital Collect?

Patient data will be collected from GP medical records about:

• any living patient registered at a GP practice in England when the collection starts - this includes children and adults any patient who died after the data collection starts, and was previously registered at a GP practice in England when the data collection started

NHS Digital will not collect your name or where you live. Any other data that could directly identify you, for example NHS number, General Practice Local Patient Number, full postcode and date of birth, is replaced with unique codes which are produced by de-identification software before the data is shared with NHS Digital.

This process is called pseudoymisation and means that no one will be able to directly identify you in the data.

Opting out of NHS Digital collecting your data (Type 1 Opt-out)

If you do not want your patient data to be shared outside of your GP practice for purposes except for your own care, you can register an opt-out with your GP practice. This is known as a Type 1 Opt-out.

Data sharing with NHS Digital will start on 1 September 2021.

If you wish to register an opt-out you have until **25 August 2021** to allow time for processing it. Please go to the practice website www.muchbirchsurgery.co.uk and navigate to the Privacy Notice page using the tab on the right hand side and follow the links to take you to a web form https://www.nhs.uk/your-nhs-data-matters/manage-your-choice/ Alternatively, you can print a paper form to return to the practice.

If you do not have access to the internet please ask for a Type 1 opt-out form at the practice.



Jobs for the garden in July and August

From Derek Scrivens

Plant Autumn flowering bulbs – Colchicum, Sternbergia, Nerine.

Raise the blades on the mower now when cutting the lawn.

Clean foliage and remove any dead leaves from house plants.

Regularly dead head flowers to promote new flowers. Camellias and rhododendrons should be well watered with rain water, particularly those in tubs, to produce next year's flower buds.

Keep the hoe going.

Early potatoes should be ready now.

Harvest courgettes and beans regularly and also make the most of all young vegetables; lift onions and garlic when foliage starts to turn yellow.

Feed tomatoes, peppers and melons with high potash fertilizer and cucumbers with nitrogen feed.

Cover brassicas with a fine mesh to protect them from caterpillars.

Take semi-ripe cuttings from herbs such as rosemary, sage and thyme.

Cut canes of summer fruiting raspberries to the ground. Select 6 to 8 strong, new green canes at each root and tie them to the wire supports 10cm apart, then cut out all the others.

Ensure frogs, toads, newts and other animals can exit ponds.

Allow some seed heads and berries to develop for wildlife. Do not destroy wasp nests unless their location is dangerous to you.

Sow biennial plant seed now – foxgloves, teasels, wallflowers – these will flower early next year and will help feed pollinators.

Sit back and enjoy your garden—when weather permits!




A "cwtch" was an old term for a hug between people.

Also terms used for scythes—the "haft" is a sned, the pole ring holds the sned, the lower ring holds the grass-nail which controls the angle of the blade.

There are many other terms particularly regarding farm machinery which is not very surprising in this area.



The future role of the church!

Hi Everyone,

With the extension of the lockdown until mid-July, the churches in the Benefice have continued to operate on a restricted basis – although we have returned to some Sunday worship (see the list in the newsletter for details) we are still social distancing and not singing (well loudly, I am happy for people to ,mumble behind their masks!).

We have maintained worship – sung the praises of God even in difficult times but we have had to make some changes. We have hand sanitiser and attendance lists, the keeping clear every other pew, disposable service booklets and such like.

We have been able to help some folks get married – usually with a restricted number and keeping to our social distancing regulations, and similarly for those who have asked for baptism, we have done services for them as well. Funerals have, as you might expect, been more tricky but with broadcast technology, having to restrict the number in church has meant that all those who wanted to attend have done so, even if they have been out in the churchyard.

The future of our churches is also something we are looking at. With the drop in services, we have had less income. Fortunately the Parish Giving Scheme has stepped into the breach. If you want to support your local church with a donation, simply go to www.parishgiving.org.uk.

People sometimes say, but you have loads of money and property – and we do, but that has to pay for clergy pensions and housing (we don't own our own home), support innumerable Grade 1 and 2* listed buildings etc. We get no government support or grants.

Finally, the roles of churches have always changed through history. In mediaeval times they were places of markets and entertainment as well as sacred worship. The installation of pews put a stop to that! May be, for some of our churches, it is time to take out some of the pews and remake them to be community hubs. As we go through the changes and challenges of COVID 19, some deep thinking and praying is needed for the future of the buildings and the worshipping communities.


