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Parish Walk Round Treberva Fruit Farm Ponds

What a treat! On Sunday 1st June Andrew Nixon, wildlife expert, together with Sarah and George Snell led us through the orchards to visit their four ponds. The ponds are a vital part of the farm and are used for much needed irrigation and at the same time full of wildlife that we were on our way to investigate. Along the walk George showed us 'pollinators' - cherry trees used to cross pollinate the apple and some pear trees. We saw relatively newly planted Jazz and Pink Lady/Cripps Pink apple trees all correctly positioned ready for when robotic machinery is available in the UK. Phenome traps were put out to catch coddling moth and one other - over- night large numbers were caught, far more than usual, without these the whole crop would be damaged.

Once we had reached the first pond, which had been restored from an older pond only about four years ago, Andrew commented on the bull rushes and other mainly native plants. He then dipped his net in the water to show us a bowl full of pond life - amongst he identified sticklebacks, newt tadpoles, toad/frog tadpoles, a water boatman and explained to us about the caddisfly larvae. On the water we saw Canada geese, a swan and some ducks.

Walking through the orchards and passing the ponds was a delight, with care for conservation and ecology. Swathes of ox eye daisies and red campion were happily growing next to the apples, there were also bee hives and we came across a 'bug hotel'!

Thank you for all those who organised this walk - Andrew Nixon who explained everything so well, Sarah and George Snell for allowing us to walk in the orchards, Wendy Fowler and Cathy Ellis- Braithwaite for baking the cakes and organising refreshments and finally Chris Fowler who put it all together. Much Birch Parish Council Meeting held in Much Birch Community Hall on the 5th June 2025 from 7.30 pm. The parish council had received two planning consultations for discussion at the meeting.

The first was Planning Consultation 251148 - Land at Ladywell Cottage, Ladywell Lane, Wrigglebrook, Kingsthorne, Herefordshire, HR2 8AW. This was for a proposed new detached dwelling. The Parish Council discussed application 251148 and decided that there were no objections from the parish council.

The second application was - Planning Consultation - 251221 - The Maples, Barrack Hill, Little Birch, Hereford, Herefordshire HR2 8AX. This was for a Full Householder application for a proposed single storey extension which also extends beyond the side elevation of the existing house. The Parish Council discussed the application 251221 and decided that there were no objections, to the proposals, from the parish council.

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Jobs for the garden in July and August

The lawns look a bit scorched at the moment but flowers and vegetables are looking good, helped along by fertiliser and watering. It is a pleasure to see blue and great tits, sparrows and great spotted woodpeckers bringing their young to the bird feeders in our garden. We have not seen any young Robins or Blackbirds yet. Hopefully this is not a general trend. Certainly the adult birds have been observed struggling to find worms and other grubs in our garden. I am starting to have cursory glances at the progress of vegetables and flowers with the horticultural shows in mind - we can but hope. Enjoy your summer holidays and enjoy your garden. Take some time to look in detail at the many plants and animals that we have around us. They are far more interesting than what is on that little screen on the mobile phone.

Jobs that can be done in the Summer

Keep dead heading flowers - it can seem a boring task but will pay dividends.

Water any newly planted plants regularly to get them established.

Prune magnolias.

Feed hanging baskets and tubs every couple of weeks with high potash fertiliser (tomato feed).

Grow on biennials.

Clean foliage and remove dead leaves from house plants.
They will benefit from some time outside in shade.
Harvest courgettes regularly when 4-5 inches long.

Feed tomatoes, chillies, peppers and melons with high potash fertiliser and cucumbers with a nitrogen fertiliser.

Make new strawberry beds.

Lift garlic, shallots and onions when foliage turns yellow. Cover brassicas with fine mesh to prevent butterflies laying their eggs on them.

Take semi-ripe cuttings of herbs.

Sow spring cabbage seed.

Early potatoes should be ready in early July if you haven't already had some in June.

Ensure frogs, toads, newts and hedgehogs can exit ponds.

Don't destroy wasps nests unless their location is

dangerous.

Don't water lawns even if they are brown, they will recover with just a shower of rain.

Feed birds, keeping bird tables clean, top up bird baths with water and put out a little meat (not fish) based dog or cat food for hedgehogs if any visit your garden.

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What is the Future for Newspapers?

Over the last 40 years, the number of physical newspapers sold in the UK has been declining. The decline has been marked since the turn of the millennium, with a paper like The Sun going from 3.557 million in Jan 2000 to 700,000 (approx.) today. They are on their last legs, so it seems. Yet they still often set the agenda for discussion and arguments on TV and radio. But this cannot be sustainable. In the old days, newspapers relied on two things: advertisers and readers.

Advertisers have chosen to spend their pounds elsewhere – especially the internet and social media and a lot of readers have moved from buying a whole paper to reading single articles on-line, which cannot carry as much advertising. Revenue had fallen, reporters have been made redundant and a seeming spiral of doom entered! And yet, somehow, newspapers are surviving!

They are still very important for breaking stories, for giving background and for keeping people informed. But we don't want paper, we want digital and, although digital is cheaper to produce, it can't command the same advertising spend! It looks like digital subscription is the way forward. Do people want the news? Yes. Are they prepared to pay for it? Maybe! So here is the rub – what new model are newspapers going for? Are they filling their digital screens with adverts (here is looking at you Mirror and Sun) or asking people to support them (The Guardian) or putting up a paywall (Telegraph and Times). All have merits and problems.

Who knows how they will be resolved. But if we want to know the full story, then newspapers still have a great legacy and a long tradition of making us think. The future is uncertain but it is going to be challenging to keep the newspaper industry alive, relevant and breaking stories into the rest of this decade and beyond. **Revd Mark**
