Local News

As reported last month, **Cliff Farmer** passed away a few days before his 94th. birthday which he was due to celebrate on the Isle of Skye with son, Bob, where he loved walking his dog in the wild landscape and the local seafood.

Cliff was born in Birmingham in 1920 but his mother sadly died in childbirth when he was 6 years old. This affected him deeply but made him more independent and resilient. In his teen's, his metal work teacher told him to stop aiming for perfection and to get projects finished more quickly, but the kitchen utensils he made over 80 years ago are still in daily use! This quest for perfection was an enduring trait.

He met Pat in a cycling club and would think nothing of cycling 200 miles over a week end trip to the West Country or Wales. Cliff won many medals in 25 and 50 mile cycling events and was also a competitive swimmer and boxer.

His first job was a telephone engineer with the Post Office and this proved to be extremely useful when he was a Prisoner of War.

Pat and Cliff married in 1940 and Deidre was born in 1941. Cliff joined the RAF and trained as a pilot,

with the rank of Flight Lieutenant. Pat and Cliff made certain that they would think of each other at 9pm. every night. He took part in many bombing raids over Germany but the most significant took place in Sep. 1943.

605 bombers of several types took off from Lakenheath in Suffolk to bomb the factories in Mannheim and this dealt a heavy blow to the German war effort.

Unfortunately, Cliff's Stirling bomber suffered a loss of power and with 2 of its 4 engines out of action over the Ardennes in France, the decision was made reluctantly to abort the mission. All seven crew members took to their parachutes but sadly 2 died and the other 5 were all separated. Cliff hid for a few days and then came across a local policeman in nearby Sorbon who put him in touch with the 'Sparnacienne', (members of the French Resistance in the area). Cliff had the utmost respect for all the members of the 'Resistance', who risked their lives on a daily basis in sheltering members of the Allied Forces.

A plan was prepared whereby Cliff would travel on foot from Sorbon in a S.Westerly direction to Epernay, some 80km (50miles) away. This was fraught with danger as there were enemy forces constantly patrolling all the roads so that walking through woods and fields was a nightmare. On reaching Epernay, he was put in touch with other Resistance members, particularly Fernande and Paul Servagnet, who sheltered him for several weeks An escape route through SW France to Italy over the Pyrenees had been planned but was altered and it was thought safer to go by train to Spain. Unfortunately, there were guards on this train and Cliff was arrested and taken to a POW camp in Germany. This brief account does not do justice to the bravery and determination to escape, often with little food and a shortage of water.

He eventually was transferred to Stalag Luft 3 where his Post Office Telephone training was used to make makeshift radios using cocoa tins to make transformers and double filament headlamp bulbs pinched from German officers cars, to make diode valves. Food rations were scant and before the camp was liberated, there were forced marches in sub-zero temperatures and many died. Eventually, Cliff arrived at RAF Cosford in May 1945.

Fernande Servaget, mentioned above, was interned by the Germans in a concentration camp in Dec 1943 and was so emaciated when released that her own children did not recognise her. She

kept in touch with Cliff and Pat ever afterwards. Both Paul and Fernande were decorated for their work with the Resistance. Fernande was made a Commander of the Legion of Honor and recipient of the Croix de Guerre and the Resistance Medal. She died in 2007 and her obituary told of her intellect, moral conscience and courage but also her modesty.

After the war, Cliff worked at the Birmingham Accident hospital on research into 'burn injuries' and he became more aware than most of the possible grim consequences of nuclear war. He went on to work for Joseph Lucas before joining Henry Wiggin in Birmingham and in 1962 moved with Wiggins to Hereford, where he spent the rest of his career in senior management positions.

Meanwhile, Bill and Robert were born in due time in the mid 40's and the twins, John and David, arrived in 1952. Pat and Cliff decided to raise every penny they could to buy derelict cottages in Taliesin, mid Wales, as a holiday home and some sort of rural refuge in the event of a nuclear war. Making the cottages habitable led Cliff to develop a range of skills and he became very competent in all practical work.

The cottage proved invaluable for holidays and also for the twins, who had developed severe autism because it gave them more freedom and they could have their tantrums and worse with relatively less stress on those around them.

In 1984, David Enoch encouraged many in the community to form a gardening club and Cliff served as Hon Sec. for several years. The club celebrates its 30th birthday this year. Cliff also gave a fascinating talk to the Forum about his wartime experiences.

In 2000, Cliff and Pat celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary with family and friends. Sadly, one of the twins, John, passed away in1998 at Castle Farm, Bartestree where the twins were very well looked after.

Pat became ill in 2006 and in her final frail 18 months, Cliff looked after her at home, sometimes staying at her bedside day and night for weeks at a time, utterly sleep deprived, yet tending to all her needs. She passed away in 2007 at the age of 89 years.

Cliff was not only practical but had a good brain, an analytical mind and very strong views. He loved to debate and at the Probus Club in Hereford was known as 'the sage'.

In the 1970's, he developed an interest in

electronics and built Hi-fi music centres for each of the children and these are still going strong.

He had many interests including car maintenance, gardening, sailing and gliding at Shobdon until his mid-eighties.

He kept up with new technologies with music on his laptop, MP3 player and loved talking with those of his extended family who were sufficiently 'techy' on 'Skype'.

He continued to drive to Castle Farm to see David for weekend picnics even into his 90's and every Thursday night, when David came home, Cliff would prepare elaborate meals for David and his carer. David enjoyed several pursuits and one which made Cliff immensely proud was a painting of a bomber plane. He also looked forward to weekly visits to Riding for the Disabled at Holme Lacy. David died in 2011.

In 2010, the citizens of Sorbon in the Ardennes held a civic reception at which Cliff was the Guest of Honour. Deidre, Bill and Bob accompanied Cliff on this trip and were treated as honoured guests. Cliff visited the site where his Stirling bomber came down and also laid flowers on the well kept grave of the two crew who lost their lives.

It was a remarkable reunion and wonderful coloured brochures were printed to mark the occasion.

Cliff was always at his best in a crisis and always cooked Christmas Dinner for the family. Last Christmas at Bob's new home on the Isle of Skye when hurricane winds were forecast and a high chance of power cuts, there was a glint of excitement in his eyes. The power duly went off but they managed to slowly cook the meal on the log burner and Cliff pronounced it wonderful as they ate by the light of headtorches.

Cliff wanted to finish his days living in his own house and Jackie Harris looked after him and helped make this possible. Cliff really enjoyed cakes and several of the neighbours kept him well supplied. The family would like to give special thanks to Jackie and to Dr. Mike Davies and the staff at Much Birch surgery.

Cliff died on 14th. April and Bob was with him in the final few days. A Service to Celebrate his Life took place at Little Birch Church on 1st. May, conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson. The Church was full to hear tributes from sons, Bob and Bill with other members of the family giving the readings.

Cliff was buried with Pat in the churchyard. So we

say farewell and salute a very brave Man!
We also send our condolences to **Helen Fox** and her family following the recent death of her father.

Older Driver Day

Institute of Advanced Motorists Herefordshire are bringing their Older Driver Day to the Hereford

area on Tuesday 15 July at Much Birch, aimed at restoring older drivers' confidence.

Older people in rural counties like Herefordshire tend to rely more on their car for the basics of living - visiting family and friends as well as shopping. It is often the only way they are able to take advantage of Herefordshire's many leisure activities, but ageing can also cause changes in ability to enjoy driving, such as difficulty negotiating roundabouts, junctions and manoeuvring.

Tina Lawrence, an expert from Southside Driving, will lead the day and covering a wide range of topics — such as hazard awareness, speed, observation and how to stay safe on the road. Tina said "Older drivers need their confidence reassured - which is the very aim of this course". There is always plenty of opportunity throughout the day to ask questions and seek advice."

"I learnt a great deal and it was all great fun" was how Shirley Cambell summed the day.

Most people take advantage of a short assessed drive, in their own car, by a qualified Advanced Driving Observer and are given friendly help and advice on their performance. David Williams, chairman of H.A.M. sums up the need for Refresher Days for Older Drivers by saying "Driving on today's roads should be every bit as enjoyable for the older driver as for anyone else. It's about learning the skill of being in the right position, at the correct speed and choosing the appropriate gear."

Herefordshire's River Trade

Heather Hurley gave a well illustrated and clearly presented talk to about 40 people who were most interested in what she had to say and were impressed about the amount of research she must have done. She told us of the barges used, their names, owners and the types of cargoes they carried. The barges were generally pulled by a team of men and a sail was used if the wind was helpful. Barges were built at 45 sites on the Wye from Glasbury to Symonds Yat. Owners were often people involved in a particular trade such as

Pulling who transported wine up from Bristol to Hereford. Other cargoes upstream included coal, iron, bricks, rags (for paper). Cargoes down included cereals, seeds, bark, poles, lime, cheese, beer, cider and flax. Every Wyeside village had wharves, Wilton and Hoarwithy were very busy. Lime and coal were transferred to smaller barges at Mordiford for transport up the Lugg Leominster (Eaton Hall). River trade took place between about 1700 until 1865. In 1700 Hereford was beginning to expand with more demand for goods but by 1865 tramways were already taking the coal trade as was the canal and, of course, finally the railways. River trade ceased almost overnight.

Barges were very similar in design to the Wye Trow, made for the Diamond Jubilee and now moored by the Bishop's Palace.

Little Birch Parish Council

Little Birch Parish Council held their Annual Parish meeting on Monday 19th May in Little Birch Village Hall. The meeting was attended by four out of the five Parish Councillors and three members of the public.

Cllr Mike Morley was re-elected as the Chairman, and Cllr Alison Clarke was re-elected as the Vice Chair.

The Chairman gave an overview of the work of the Parish Council for the previous year, and thanked the Councillors for their time and efforts over the last 12 months. The Footpath officer remains Ms Sandra Cameron, and her work was appreciated by the Chair. He welcomed Cllr Jon Norris as the new Ward Councillor in 2013, and thanked the Clerk for her endevours.

Following the Annual Meeting, the ordinary Parish Council Meeting was held, here concerns were raised by a parishioner about maintence of the Parish Field The Parish Council moved to add this to the Annual Meeting agenda each year to ensure that its upkeep was supervised for the coming years.

The idea of Little Birch undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan (NP) was discussed again, and following the discussion, a vote was taken as to whether or not to take this further, with three Councillors against and one **for the progression** of a NP, the Parish Council decided that at this time they would not take this any further.

The Chair explained that a number of people had had problems downloading the Newsletter from the

web site, so the next one will be sent out by e mail to ensure that the Parishoners can continue to enjoy reading it. The Newsletter committee are always on the look out for (younger) volunteers to help and subsequently take charge of production of The Newsletter – interested? Then please let them know.

The next meeting is on Wednesday July 9th at 7.30 in the Village Hall, and all parishioners are warmly welcomed.

PARISH MEETING - at the Annual Parish and Annual Statutory Meetings held on the 8th May at the Much Birch Community Hall. The Parish Council elected officers, including Chair, Vice Chair and Footpath Officer for the following year and discussed various issues, including the possibility of planting daffodils in the parish. There were two planning applications considered and the Parish Council's comments to these are reproduced here: Firstly regarding Planning Application P140593/O Land at Barrack Hill: "The Parish Council object to the application on the grounds of drainage, loss of natural habitat, loss of green field land and the loss of the natural boundary between Lower and Upper Barrack Hill. This is long established agricultural land. The development is not in keeping with the surrounding area tends towards and overbearing nature. Not in line with criteria outlined by Government on "infill" sites. Secondly on Planning Application P140554/O for the Mushroom Farm: "Whilst the Council would like to encourage development of the site, there are concerns as to access to and from the A49 given that the developer does not own the land on either side of the access/exit point. The Council are minded to object to the application on the grounds of unsafe access and egress from the proposed site." The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday 5th June 2014 at 7.30pm - at The Much Birch Community Hall. Please see notice boards and website for agendas. As always the public and press are more than welcome to attend and will have the opportunity to speak directly to their representatives.

Much Birch Community Hall Goes Solar

The Management Committee are pleased to announce that Solar panels have been installed on the roof of the Community Hall to capture the sun rays which provide direct current (DC) electricity which goes through a process to convert it to alternating current(AC) electricity so that it can be utilised to provide power to the hall. Any excess electricity which is generated is fed into the National Grid with every unit attracting a payment known as the Export Tariff.

It has been determined that savings will be made on electricity bills by generating our own energy, resulting in purchasing less from our energy suppliers. In addition for each unit of electricity generated a payment will be made by the energy supplier. This is known as the Generation Tariff which is guaranteed for 20 years by Government legislation.

The installation, which is a long term investment, was carried out by Graham Dean of Dean&Sun, a local Electrical Contractor, who gave us valuable advice and direction. The project provides benefits not only in monetary terms but also in reduction of the use of fossil fuels and the subsequent carbon footprint.

Elderly residents are being warned about a phone fraud where victims are being duped out of cash by people posing as police.

West Mercia and Warwickshire Police have recorded 70 of offences these across Worcestershire. Herefordshire. Shrophire and Warwickshire since March this vear unsuspecting victims falling for the scam.

about the market, please contact Mark on 01432 The offenders are targeting older people across both Forces, as part of a national scam which is commonly known as a 'courier fraud'.

> In many cases a person claiming to be a police officer will contact an elderly or vulnerable victim by telephone and inform them that their bank card has been used fraudulently.

> The victim will then be tricked into thinking they are either calling or being put through to their bank, but in fact they are still speaking to the fraudsters.

> The victim will then disclose banking information and will be instructed to either place their bank cards in an envelope for a courier to collect or attend the local branch of their bank to withdraw a sum of money and pass it to a courier sent by Sometimes fraudsters. the fraudsters legitimate Taxi companies to make the pick up.

Often elderly victims are unwittingly defrauded of their entire life savings, being left distraught and traumatised in many cases.

Over the last couple of months, the number of offences has escalated, with West Mercia and Warwickshire Police receiving numerous reports from victims across both Force areas.

Detectives are working with local banks/buildings societies and taxi firms as part of the investigation into the fraud and are urging anyone else who may have been a victim to come forward.

They are also repeating warnings to the public, particularly older residents, not to go along with the scam and to report any attempts to police.

This is a national problem which has reached West Mercia & Warwickshire policing areas.

DCI Sean Paley said, "This is a heartless and callous fraud with the offenders targeting elderly and vulnerable people who are trusting and willing to help who they think are bona fide police officers".

"We are urging the public, particularly older people, to be aware of this fraud and not to go along with it. Genuine police would not phone members of the public in this way and certainly would never ask you for your bank details or ask you to send money.

"Because of the nature of the fraud and the vulnerable victims involved it is believed this offence is currently under-reported, therefore we would urge the public to come forward and tell us if they have been contacted by these people.

"We appeal to members of the public, banks and with taxi drivers to be on their guard and report any suspicious activity of this nature to the police

immediately."

If you receive a phone call of this nature, police advise you to:

- Do not give out any information and end the phone call immediately. Wait at least five minutes to clear the line from the scammer before making any other calls, or use another phone. Make sure you have a dialing tone.
- Report the offence as soon as possible to police by telephoning 101.

Please remember:

- Your bank will never attend your home.
- Your bank and the police will never collect your bank card or cash
- Your bank and the police will never ask for your PIN.

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Longtown Castle

Longtown has a small castle, in the care of English Heritage, which today consists of a three storey tower built about 1214 on top of a motte, entered by a wooden stair at the 1st. floor level. The spiral staircase led up to the top where there was a garderobe and a battlement walkway for sentries to keep a lookout.

The bailey was large and went over to the other side of the main road.

At one time there would have been gates allowing the road to pass through the castle.

The castle may have been built by William FitzOsborne but soon passed to the De Lacy family. Walter de Lacy was a supporter of King Henry 111 and his wife, Margaret founded the Aconbury Nunnery. Walter's younger grand-daughter married John de Verdun, who died on the Crusades. His son, Theobald, inherited Longtown and his son, governor of Ireland, married a Mortimer, Longtown passing to Bartholomew de Burghersh, a supporter of Edward 111. His son became a Knight of the Garter and fought at Crecy and Poitiers. Through

marriage Longtown passed to the Despencers - one of them lies in Tewksbury Abbey- who were invariably on the losing side in the Wars of the Roses. Later, it passed to the Nevilles of Abergavenny.

There is no record of the castle being involved in the Civil War, no doubt it was too ruinous. However, Alfred Watkins writes that the embankment near the keep, was the scene of a gibbet where William Jones, who killed his wife by arsenic poisoning in 1790 and was executed at Hereford with his girlfriend, Susannah Rugg, was strung up on the gibbet at Longtown "to be near to where the deed was committed".
