Violette Szabó Centenary Celebrations



The Violette Szabó GC Museum in Wormelow is celebrating 101 years since the birth of Violette Szabó, on 10th July - having had to postpone last year's planned centenary celebration.

With her usual determination and resourcefulness Rosemary Rigby, the Museum's founder, has arranged a splendid event beginning with a parade from the Park to the Rosemary Rigby Millenium Green led by a Highland piper and the Violette Szabo horse, a winner at Beverley races. The RAF is will be joining with a very special fly past which it is hoped will include a Hurricane. People are encouraged to join the parade and to bring picnics.

Violette Szabó was a courageous young woman who worked for SOE (Special Operations Executive) during World War II in the French Resistance, showing incredible bravery even when captured and taken to RavensbrÜck concentration camp, where she was executed just before the end of the war. She was awarded the George Cross and the Croix de Guerre.

Rosemary Rigby founded the Museum behind her house, Cartref, in Wormelow to celebrate this remarkable, courageous woman who had spent many happy childhood holidays in Cartref, where her aunt and uncle lived. A film was made about Violette's life, Carve Her Name with Pride. Violette was played by Virginia McKenna who has visited the museum on a number of occasions.

From the Editor

What glorious spring weather we have had with an abundance of bluebells. In the Birches we are fortunate in having wonderful woodland, Aconbury and Athelstan both of which are popular with walkers of all ages including dog walkers. It is a delight to see young children up to their wellies in mud, and of course horse riders are a frequent sight in the woods and lanes. I received a report recently about a pair of dogs hurtling through Aconbury at great speed in pursuit of a Muntjac deer that was in obvious distress and terrified. By the time this walker had reached the Muntjac it had been savagely killed with no sign of the owner of the dogs.

This is far from being the only incident of uncontrolled dogs. I and others have seen strong young dogs ignoring the attempts of their owners to stop them jumping up at elderly walkers and some dog owners do not even try. You might not believe it but I am a dog lover and enjoy encounters with dogs, especially as I do not have one living with me at the moment. It's sometimes the owners who need training!

It is important that everyone is freely able to walk in the countryside and this is enabled by responsible dog walkers who have trained their dogs to respond to them. It is of little comfort to a vulnerable person to be told 'the dog is friendly' if it is also jumping up and nearly knocking them down.

The other big issue is the Dog Poo Fairy. I am sorry to disillusion those who believe she exists. There is no fairy flying through the woods collecting forgotten bags of poo that are dangling from branches! Nor does she remove the poos that have been deposited in the middle of the path. I am thinking of taking up golf having had so much practice of flicking dog poo into the brambles with a stick! The green lanes are another place where the dog poo fairy is sorely missed. However I think most people behave responsibly when walking their dogs and are careful not to let them harm people or wildlife.

From Revd Mark

"Water, water, everywhere, nor any drop to drink" – Samuel Taylor Coleridge, The Rime of the Ancient Mariner If you think we have had a dry spring, which we have with recorded rainfall, about 44% of what we would normally expect for April, spare a thought for those living in the west of the USA, especially those in California, Nevada and surrounding states.

The lack of rainfall and reduced snowfall on the Rockies had meant that a water crisis is happening now. Already water levels are forcing farmers to abandon fields of cotton and alfalfa (which require a large amount of water), dig wells to tap into an already falling water table and reassess what might be economical to grow in years to come. Water use in places like Las Vegas and Southern California is causing concern with towns and cities saying you can only water your garden once a week and some are going so far as to say you can't water your lawns at all.

It reminds us that water is a precious resource. We have been rather remiss in caring for it in our own country because so much falls out of the sky. Yet, if we look at the water quality for the Wye and the streams that lead into it, we see that pollution, sewage and phosphate run-off are causing great harm to our wildlife and the local ecology. Hopefully, we won't get to the stage of being banned from watering our lawns but unless we take seriously the threat to the Wye, we will be left with a much-depleted eco-system and the loss of wildlife and biodiversity that will blight our generation and the ones that are to come.

Jobs for the Garden in June Derek Scrivens




It seems that the Cuckoo was first heard by several people, including myself, in Little Birch on the evening of 20th April, as always, a welcome sound. That same evening, whilst feeding the tops of my spent Brussels Sprouts to Dillon's cows on the other side of the hedge, I saw one solitary Swallow flying a few feet above the grass. Since then I have only seen two flying past. Of equal concern, I have yet to see any House Martins in our location. In previous years large numbers were regularly seen swirling around..

For the last few years, Spring has been very dry and this year is no exception (it does happen to be raining as I write this !!) – not the best conditions for starting flowers and vegetables. It emphasizes the need for making compost and either digging it into the soil or mulching and leaving the rest to the worms. This month the flower garden should be starting to 'light up' with plenty of colour, so as well as a number of routine jobs, spend time enjoying what you and nature have created.

A little plug for the annual Horticultural Show – don't be shy, we are not expecting flowers and vegetables like those you saw at Malvern. Get hold of a schedule and walk round your garden with it near the September date. If you find anything that meets the criteria of items in the schedule, don't worry as to whether it is good enough, just put it on the show bench. We were reminded by Janet Gwinnett at the last garden Club meeting that a local lady entered 3 carrots, in the show a few years ago, that were each a couple of inches long and won second prize.

- *Dead head roses regularly cutting to a leaf beneath the flower.
- *Feed tubs and other containers, and hanging baskets with high potash fertilizer (tomato feed is fine).
- *Spend some time dead heading all flowers as this will encourage them to provide a display for longer.
- *Support sweet peas which should be well under way now again, cut flowers for indoor use and dead head, not giving that little pea pod a chance to form.
- *Foliage from fading bulbs will be yellowing by now and if not done already it can be cut off.
- *Tomatoes grown as cordons should be tied to supports and side shoots should be pinched out. Allow 7 trusses on indoor tomatoes and 4 outside before pinching out the growing tip. Harden off and plant out tender crops such as aubergines, courgettes, sweet corn, squashes and tomatoes.
- *For succession keep sowing small quantities of radish, salad leaves, Spring onions, French beans, kohl rabi, beet and mangetout.
- *If early potatoes are growing in some form of container or in the ground wait until the flowers open and then carefully examine a root to see how the potatoes are progressing. I think for best results they should not exceed the size of a hen's egg.
- *Remove blanket weed from ponds, leave on the side for 24 hours to give creatures within it an opportunity to get back in the water. The weed can then be composted.
- *Keep the bird bath topped up with fresh water.
- *One for the children record the wildlife in the garden and note the plants that insects visit. This will help in choosing future plants.
- *Many herbs produce flowers that are particularly attractive to bees. These include oregano, thyme, chives and borage. As well as their popularity in culinary use, the flowers are attractive and they provide bees with much need supplies for the hive/nest.





THE MASONS AT MERRIVALE

Firstly, a big thank you to everyone who supported the Dawn Chorus walk from Merrivale. Donations raised £250 which we have given to two charities, The Farm Community Network and We are Farming Minds. Two charities that are the 'Samaritans' of the farming world.

Hasn't the spring weather been wonderful. Over the last month the spring field work has been completed. We have sown 90 acres of both spring barley and a mix of spring barley and peas which we under sow with grass seed. The barley will be combined for feed and the barley and peas will be cut in July to make whole crop silage that will be fed to the cows in the winter. The under sown grass is then ready to be cut for silage in September and will stay as a grass silage ley for the following 3 years. We just have 12 acres left to plant with fodder beet which provides a high energy feed for the cows during the winter.

The cows went out to grass in the daytime on March 21st which is 2 days earlier than last year. However they were out day and night by this time last year. The weather this year has been colder meaning grass growth has been slower, hopefully that's all about to change.

When the cows have grazed all the grass paddocks once, we then fertilise them. Being organic, we don't use artificial fertiliser but rely on recycling the cows slurry and manure. We have a piece of equipment called a 'slurry separator' which does exactly that, it separates the liquid slurry from the solids. We can then irrigate the dirty water over the grass paddocks and spread the solids on the silage fields after we have cut them. After being separated, the solid manure breaks down much faster than unseparated muck, removing the risk of tainting the grass. Using clover in our grass leys also produces nitrogen to help growth. As ever, we are also heavily reliant on rainfall for crop growth but that is the part we can't control.

This year we are particularly fortunate not to be reliant on artificial fertilisers. With everything that is happening in the economy at the moment, fertiliser costs have more than trebled. This has had a huge effect on the costs of production on conventional farms, together with the hike in fuel and feed costs which are affecting us all. It is providing some serious challenges for our industry this year. We intend to put most of the youngstock out soon. This will make a huge difference to the workload as they will not need to be cleaned out, fed and bedded daily. This will be a particular help this year as our daughter Lucy has just had a little girl so we're a team member down for the time being.

We have been surprised at how popular the organic vegetables have been in the milk hut. Most of the seasons veg are now over and there will be a gap in supply until June. We've just planted our first broccoli, cauliflower and cabbage and intend to plant batches every 2 weeks until July to keep a continuous supply. We are also doubling the amount we grow so we have plenty.
