Local News

The Service to Celebrate the Life of STEPHEN HOUNSELL of Hollybush Lane was held at Much Birch Church on Monday, 21st January and was conducted by Prebendary Kay Garlick.

'Steve' was the youngest of eight children born to Ellen and William Hounsell in Swansea. At school, he excelled in most subjects and enjoyed playing rugby and attending the local boxing club. He also learned to play the piano and clarinet and he kept this love of music throughout his life. Despite his achievements at school, he decided not to go on to further education but to seek employment and support the family. This took on a further sense of urgency as his father died suddenly in 1958 just before Steve's 16th birthday.

Steve joined the prestigious, family-run store of David Evans in Swansea as a Trainee Buyer. He took a 2 year day-release course in Retail Distribution and followed that with a further 2 year Retail Management Course. This he passed with flying colours and was rewarded by being appointed the company's youngest ever Buyer aged just 20 and was given a new position in the Boyswear Dept. at the Port Talbot branch.

His wife-to-be Jenny, had joined David Evans in 1960 and Steve soon noticed her and asked her out.... and the rest is history. They were engaged after a 3 year courtship and married in October, 1964. By this time, David Evans had opened a store in the 'new town' of Cwmbran and so they moved there in 1965, with Steve promoted to Hardware Buyer. Their first born, Mark, arrived in Nov. 1965 and Karen followed in 1967. Sadly, Mark was diagnosed with leukaemia aged 3 ½ years and there followed almost 2 years of hospital stays and treatments at Cardiff hospital. He was a brave fighter but sadly died at the age of 5 ½ years. Meanwhile, Michelle had been born and was just 6 months old at this time. After Mark's untimely death, Jenny and Steve decide it was the right time to move on and Steve was appointed to the post of Hardware Buyer for the Gloucester and Severnside Co-operative Society and thus began a 21 year successful association with the company. They moved to Gloucester in Feb 1972 and another son, Bryan, was born in the July.

Steve was appointed the Cheltenham Store Manager in 1974 and to the same position at the flag-ship store in Gloucester in 1975. In 1991, the Company became the subject of a take-over bid and Steve was appointed Acting Chief Executive but decided after 21 years service to take

voluntary redundancy. He was offered a post in Wrexham which he took and spent 5 happy years there before taking early retirement at the age of 55.

During his career, Steve served on various Chamber of Trade Committees and in 1984, took a 2 year Teacher Training Course enabling him to lecture on Retailing in order to help others achieve success in this field - such was his passion for his job. Jenny has received numerous letters from erstwhile colleagues and employees saying how much they appreciated working for Steve and how much he had helped them in their careers and also sometimes in personal matters.

Shortly after moving to Gloucester in 1972, Jenny and Steve spotted an advert in the local press seeking volunteers to raise funds for Leukaemia research. They got in touch and Steve organised the first meeting and with a handful of people created the first Gloucester branch of the Leukaemia research Fund. Steve became their Hon. Secretary and between them, Jenny and Steve spent the next 20 years raising thousands of pounds for the Fund by helping to organise events at fetes, schools, raft races, dances and house to house collections, not just in Gloucester but around the whole county. Even the children could be seen in red sashes drumming up support on most week-ends throughout the summer months.

Aside from his career and fund raising, Steve's pride and joy was his family and he loved and supported them in any way possible. He loved his music and most sports but particularly rugby and as a proud Welshman supported his native Ospreys and of course, the national team. He most loved to go out fishing and with Jenny, bought a cabin cruiser and spent many years with family and friends enjoying the delights of the rivers and canals while fishing up and down the local counties.

Steve also had a passion for DIY and has left his mark in each of the homes he and the family have made. His biggest project was a loft conversion in Gloucester and even during his illness, he made new 'tongue and grooved' doors for all the kitchen units and cupboards – a sparkling make-over.

Following retirement, Steve and Jenny decided to move from Wrexham and settled into Much Birch where they quickly made new friends, particularly after joining the Indoor Bowling Club at Wormelow, where they both became accomplished bowlers.

The last 7 years for Steve have been dogged by ill health, first being diagnosed with chronic lung disease and then 4 years ago with cancer. He has fought these

illnesses involving several operations, numerous courses of chemotherapy and infections with great courage and humour and barely a complaint. Last October, Steve told Jenny that he would have loved to renew their wedding vows. Jenny mentioned this to the family and without a word, they made all the arrangements and on November 3rd and at the church where they were married in Swansea, they were able to make Steve's wish come true. It turned out to be a most wonderful and memorable day for Steve and Jenny and the whole family. Everyone who has been in touch with Jenny and the family have said that "Steve was a most modest and wonderful man with a wicked sense of humour" and that is how he will be remembered by his family and many, many friends. Donations in memory of Steve were shared between the Leukaemia Research Fund, Cancer Research and Much Birch Church.

hospital since 29th December. His funeral service took place in Little Birch Church on 7th. February. The congregation filled the church such was the respect in which Ivor was held and the service was conducted by Prebendary Kay Garlick.

Ivor was born at Sutton St. Nicholas but the family moved to Hill Farm, Much Dewchurch, which was then a small dairy farm but which we now see from the road from the Kings Thorn bus shelter going towards Hereford as the fruit farm on the west side of the A 49. Ivor was very young at this time, his father was an agricultural contractor and there were two sisters, Mary and Irene, and a brother, Desmond. The family then moved to Holly Cottage, Little Birch. Ivor was a true countryman and this passion probably stemmed from the family keeping chickens and other animals and the necessity of trapping a rabbit or two, particularly during World War II. He will be remembered by many friends and acquaintances for his love of the woods particularly on Aconbury Hill where he worked for 45 years, first for the Trustees of the Guy's Hospital, then for Charles Clore and subsequently for the Prudential when they bought the estate after managing it for Charles Clore.

The various managers for the estate always said that whereas newcomers had to have everything documented about each plot and plantation, Ivor kept it all in his head and they would check their documentation against his memory. Ivor married Mona and they lived at Holly

Cottage, Castle Pool Cottage and for a few years at Merrivale Farm. Ivor claimed that they were one of the first to have a TV set in the area as he watched the 1953 Cup Final which Blackpool won, often dubbed the 'Stanley Matthews Final', a month or so before the Oueen's Coronation in June, for which many bought their first set. Due to the fact that most of the area did not have electricity at the time, these TV sets were powered by batteries which were recharged by Mr Taylor at the Kings Thorn garage. Ivor and Mona had four children, Cynthia and Shirley and a little later, Andrew and Valerie. Andrew remembers that his dad was always working, either in the wood, or in the garden or looking after animals. Cynthia echoed these thoughts and said that in her young days there were chickens and a calf in the garden and a lamb living in the house. She also remembers the happy times when the four children would sit outside the Pendant (Castle Inn) under the tree with a packet of crisps while Ivor went in to have his pint. Andrew recalls that during his school holidays he would go up to the woods for 'bait' or at dinner time to see his dad and would find him with John Lewis. Fred Turner and Jack Cross sat around a wood fire with Ivor pouring his cup of tea out of a cider bottle wrapped in newspaper. After the demise of Jack Cross, John Evans joined Ivor's team in the woods.

Sadly, the marriage failed but Ivor had 23 very happy years of marriage with Rita and his family grew to include Kerry and subsequently, her two children, Alex and Sadie. Ivor and Rita lived at Warren Farm where Ivor kept Jacob Sheep, ducks, goslings, guinea fowl and chickens as well as adopting two peacocks - George and Mildred. It was here that Ivor also found part of a Bronze Age spear head, dated between 900 - 700 BC, a photograph of which is shown in the History Group book, 'Little Birch on Aconbury Hill'. For many years, Ivor and Rita kept a good eve on Fred Turner in nearby Warren Cottage and many a meal found its way across the paddock. Fred was a very laid-back character and Ivor recalled that when Fred wanted to move from 'The Ark' at Dewsall, arrangements were made to the effect that Fred would be ready packed for Ivor to move all his belongings with a tractor and trailer at 9am. on the Saturday morning. On arrival, Ivor found Fred drinking a cup of tea in the kitchen and nothing packed. A few choice words were exchanged and the move was completed sometime later.

When the Prudential wanted to sell Warren Farm, Millie Sykes offered Ivor and Rita the bungalow behind her own cottage, saying she would love to have them as her close neighbours. In his retirement, Ivor looked after a number of folk in the neighbourhood and gardened for Jill and Gwyn Richards and Polly Perkins as well as Millie Sykes. Meanwhile Rita continued her work at the Barrs Court School. Jan and Colin Armstrong became good friends and Ivor would look after their animals while they were away.

Ivor and his dogs were inseparable and many will remember the welcome given by 'Nesbit' as they walked up the Warren Lane, he could nip a bit!. Over the last five years, 'Benji' has been his constant companion and every day they walked the woods.

Football and cricket were Ivor's great sporting interests and Andrew recalled how they followed Hereford United both at home and to away matches and were joined by Percy Verry, Donny and others. They travelled to Cardiff, Bristol, Merthyr and of course to the 'big one' at Newcastle. When Little Birch football team started in 1978, Ivor marked the pitch and carried on doing so for five years. It had to be right and Ivor would not let anyone else do it. Ivor of course loved his pint of beer and at that time, there was a smoke room and a public bar at the Casle Inn. Ivor would be in the smoke room playing cards with Percy and all his other friends – no women in there. He was a good crib player and was cribbage captain for a number of years. In 1976, he and Percy Verry won the local crib pairs championship which he won again with Lou Tilling a couple of years later.

Rita and Ivor have enjoyed some wonderful holidays together and although reluctant to go abroad at first, he became 'hooked' and went to Minorca, Tenerife and Benidorm whenever possible. Ivor was always struck with the local way of life and the scenery, especially the volcanoes. It was on the way to a holiday that Ivor first became ill and with Rita's expert attention, they managed the problem for a number of years. From the window or sat outside the bungalow, Ivor would so admire the view over the Golden Valley in all its splendour and then reflect about how crazy people had become in selfishly wanting everything, with the result that they missed the most precious thing that creation had provided free of charge. He also loved the view over Hill Farm where he was brought up and said since that time, 'I have always lived within a mile or two of this place' and I would not want to live anywhere else.

Ivor occasionally did some strimming in Little Birch churchyard and said that if possible, when the time came he would like his body to be buried next to that of his sister, Irene, who sadly died at the age of 14 in 1943. So after his service in Church, Ivor was laid to rest in the desired spot where a double depth grave was prepared.

Ivor had suffered over a number of years with Parkinsons and cancer but with the unstinting care of Rita had managed to stay in his own home and in hospital where both Rita and Kerry gave their utmost care and devotion to make Ivor as comfortable as possible. He was visited by all the family but unfortunately, his brother, Desmond, had already booked a holiday in South Africa before Ivor died. It was thought that Ivor would not like to see Desmond cancel this trip and so Desmond arranged that everyone should go to the Castle Inn afterwards to share their memories of Ivor. He sent a letter of tribute to Ivor and this was read out at the funeral service.

Rita and the family would like to express their thanks to our local doctors and nurses, the medical team in Monnow ward at the County Hospital, to Jean and Colin Quinsey for the funeral arrangements and to everyone who sent letters and cards and came to the funeral service. Donations in memory of Ivor were made in aid of the Barrs Court Hydrosense Appeal Fund and to date these have totalled £400.

We send our deepest sympathies to Rita and Kerry, to Cynthia, Shirley, Andrew and Valerie and all their families.

Several friends in the community have been in hospital recently including JOHN ROBERTS who is now very glad to be home after more than three weeks away and every good wish is sent for continued progress. FRANK SHORT, after an operation in Hereford, is waiting to hear when he will be going to Cheltenham for further treatment. It is hoped that he does not have to travel every day to and fro to that hospital. Coincidentally, John, Frank and the late Ivor Crum were all in Monnow ward which helped each of them to pass the time between family visits. Several other residents are quite poorly at the present time and we ask that you remember them and their carers in your prayers.

A belated but none-the-less warm welcome is given to AVERIL and MAURICE CLOTHER and their young daughter, BEATRICE, who have come to 'Evendine', Kings Thorn and to the BIRCHES who have moved into Withycombe, Little Birch and we trust that they will be happy in their new homes and in this community.

Sadly, we have had to say good bye to LIZ MILLER who left Little Birch recently and we wish her well for the future.

A number of residents have taken up the offer of buying the new 'Smartwater' kit to mark all valuable items in the home or outside. This really is a big forensic advance and should give peace of mind knowing that any criminal caught with marked objects will have no defence and the items can, through the unique code, be returned to their rightful owner. Neighbourhood Watch

There are a few items to bring to your attention

An elderly lady from Green Crize was the victim of rogue traders recently, it was reported to us last week.
