Local News A warm welcome is given to Dr. Elizabeth Bulivant and Mr. Bartholomew Nelson who have moved into 'Kesterdene' Little Birch and we trust they will be happy in their new home and in

this community. Mr. Bob Read erstwhile of Llanwarne, passed away on 15th. March and his funeral service took place at Hereford Crematorium on 28th. March conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson. Bob was for many years an agricultural contractor and was well known in local farming circles. He was someone who would help anyone wherever possible. He was particularly friendly with Mr. Percy Verry and fetched Percy for lunch every Friday until Bob's wife Connie, became ill several years ago and then Bob had to be her full time carer. There were some 90 mourners at the Crematorium, some having travelled as far as from Sussex. Bob and Connie were not blessed with a family and so we send our condolences to Connie who has been recently in care at Withington.

Two other members of our community have also recently died, **Mr Bill Andrews** at the age of 86 and **Mr. Cliff Farmer**, a few days before his 96th. birthday. Bill was born at the top of Parish Lane, with 3 sisters and a brother, Tony, as the family unit. He attended Little Birch School until the age of 14, then worked for 2 years with his father on the Guy's Estate and then worked as a timber feller for Mr. Sid Watkins at King's Thorn. At 18 years of age, he was called up for National Service and spent almost 3 years in Austria where he learned to drive. He became a bit of a fitness fanatic and learned to box. He was good at Boxing and the Army wanted him to stay on but he felt the family needed him back at home. On his return, he

had short spells of work with Sid Watkins and the Guy's Estate but really wanted a driving job. He became a tanker driver in Hereford and then went to work for the Highways Dept. of the County Council as a driver of a Road Roller, a job which he thoroughly enjoyed. He then went as a ' lengsthman' for the Council and worked all over South Herefordshire. Bill and his father, George, had a large garden and field at Eden House where they grew vegetables and had chickens, pigs and a few cows so that they were more or less self sufficient. When George died, Bill lived alone and was fiercely independent. He loved his cats and was a true countryman. He loved driving and in his earlier days, grasstrack racing. He could strip down car and tractor engines and do all the necessary maintenance and servicing. On Whit Monday 1950, on returning from a day out in Hereford on 2 motorcycles, 4 of our local lads with another from Leominster, were involved in a crash near the Grafton Inn with a carload of policemen returning from a cricket match in Ross. Sadly, 3 were killed and Bill and Roy Gwynne suffered serious injuries. Roy lost a leg and one of Bill's legs was broken and had to be pinned. Due to his physical fitness, Bill recovered after a few months in hospital and was able to resume work. Then in Feb. this year, Bill had been sitting in the glazed lean-to built on the side of his home but went indoors for a few minutes when there was an almighty crash and a chimney had been blown over by the wind and crashed through the glazing where Bill had been previously sitting. Obviously, he was very shocked by this incident. Bill was always willing to help others and often took George Holley and Hilda (his eldest sister) to do their shopping and for drives around the countryside.

Over the last year or so Tony and the family have been very supportive and made sure that Bill was taking good care of himself. He did not respond to a phone call on April 5th, and his niece, Angela, went to investigate and found him collapsed by the bedroom door. He had suffered a massive stroke and had passed away.

His funeral service was held at the Crematorium on Tuesday 22nd April and was attended by family and friends. We send our sincere condolences to sisters, Happy and Joan and brother, Tony, and their families.

Stapleton Castle

Mr John Kinross of Much Birch continues his

series of local castles and writes -: Close to Presteigne, Stapleton Castle stands on high ground but the ruins there today are those of an early 17th. century house which was built with the stone of an earlier castle. The site has never been properly examined by archaeologists and is very unsafe for viewers. The Stapleton family were Parliamentarians in the Civil War and Sir Philip Stapleton commanded a cavalry detachment at the Battle of Edgehill. Severe damage was on the Royalists but the inflicted main parliamentary cavalry was swept away by Prince Rupert's horsemen. The 12th. century castle belonged to the Lords of Richard's Castle with a large motte with a ditch on both east and west sides. The Cornewall family obtained it at the start of the fifteenth century and up to the Civil War, when Sir Michael Woodhouse advised the Cornewalls to pull down the walls so that it did not become a Parliamentary stronghold- rather like Lingen did with the owners of Wilton Castle at Ross. At the end of the war, the remains of Stapleton were passed to the Harleys at Brampton Bryan. Although the house must have needed extensive repairs, it was inhabited until the 19th. century as there is a drawing of it in 1850. For those who like gardens, Mr and Mrs. Griffiths open their garden at Stapleton Court 4 times each year (see Yellow Book published by the National Garden Scheme) on 21-22nd June and 24-25th. August 2014. and there are guided tours of the ruins at 2.30 and 3.30 pm each day. This is only suitable for good walkers. However, Mrs. Griffith's teas are magnificent and worth the £4 admission.

Kings Thorn and Little Birch Gardening Club

Policing News

Grafton

Harewood End

Two vehicles were broken into in Harewood end. Police were called to the area at 21:20 after an offender was spotted trying to gain entry to a vehicle. Subsequently another resident called Police this morning stating their vehicle had also been broken into.

Positive Policing

Thirty two offenders have been arrested and have visited Hereford Custody in the past 72 hours.

This week is "Rogue Traders week". The police are working alongside Trading Standards and targeting specific offences. Literature is/has also been handed out across the County to help raise the awareness of these types of crime.

In short Rogue Traders are people who travel around the county offering services for extortionate prices. They have been known to target the elderly and vulnerable.

If you are targeted, or know someone who you believe to be being targeted please call the Police right away. We can only act if we are made aware.

There are legal requirements for traders such as a 7 day cooling off period before work commences and the standard of their work can be assessed by Trading Standards which could lead to prosecutions if found to be substandard.
