Much Birch Surgery

Vaccination of adult household contacts of severely immunosuppressed individuals

The government has recently updated its guidance for any adults who live with a severely immunosuppressed person in their household.

The advice applies to adult household contacts who are 16 years and above with whom you "expect to share living accommodation on most days.... and therefore, for whom continuing close contact is unavoidable."

Household contacts will need to provide valid proof of address, which should match the address of the immunosuppressed person, to provide evidence of eligibility for vaccination.

Members of 'bubbles' that do not live with an immunosuppressed person for the majority of the week (frequent visitors and other non-carers who might visit the house often but not for the majority of the week, including overnight stays) are not eligible.

Covid Vaccination Progress

Rapid progress is being made with the Covid Vaccine delivery. The NHS are now inviting patients from age 45. The practice is not vaccinating patients under the age of 50, patients should book their appointment through the online booking service <u>Book a coronavirus vaccination - NHS</u> (www.nhs.uk) or by calling 119.

Much Birch Neighbourhood Development

Plan referendum 6 May 2021

Please vote!

Following a successful Public Examination Herefordshire Council has published and listed the Much Birch Neighbourhood Development Plan for the final stage Public Referendum to take place alongside the PCC elections on 6 May 2021.

The **Much Birch NDP** has been developed over 4 years by a steering group made up of residents, along with specialist professional guidance.

The full plan and details of how it was developed, consultations that have taken place and how the vision translated into objectives can be viewed electronically through the Much Birch Parish Council web site at www.muchbirchparish.org.uk/ndp.html

The vision set out in the Much Birch NDP plan states that:

" By 2031 Much Birch will have retained its rural character, whilst incorporating additional housing, improved facilities, safer paths road and highways that local people, both young and old can afford and also enjoy"

For the plan to proceed, more than 50% of the votes cast need to be in favour which would then mean that the Plan would then be adopted by Herefordshire Council and become part of the Herefordshire Statutory Development Plan and be used to determine future planning applications.

The Referendum will ask:

'Do you want Herefordshire Council to use the Neighbourhood Development Plan for Much Birch to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?'

Hereford Computer Help

Tip 4 - May 2021 Please keep a Backup, in fact at least 2 Backups!

The first thing I say to a customer when they ask me to reinstall Windows (other operating systems are available) is: "*Have you taken a recent backup?*"

Just imagine if something happened to your computer, and you could no longer see any of your photographs, documents, home videos. If the only record of those personal items and files is on the computer that goes wrong, you may find it difficult, if not impossible, to recover them.

What should you Backup?

The data that you **really must backup**, to recover from a computer disaster, should include:

Your photographs and videos – these are often irreplaceable Your documents, letters, notes, spreadsheets that you have created on your computer Your downloads. For example, you may have a book, a file or a newsletter that is no longer available online. It might be a PDF (Portable Document Format, often used to easily distribute documents, magazines, newsletters!)

As *most* applications and programs can be downloaded again from the internet, or reinstalled using the installation media, (DVDs, CDs, USB sticks), then you may not need to back them up.

Where should you backup?

External Drive – can be purchased for around £50, widely available
Cloud Backup - a copy of your important data, as suggested above, on a reliable computer system, connected to the Internet. Some Cloud services are just storage services; if you are ONLY storing there, it is not necessarily backed up!
USB sticks – better than nothing, but can be prone to failure
Print outs – there's a lot to be said for good old paper copies!

"If it's only in one place, it's not backed-up."

Jobs for the garden in May from Derek Scrivens



Keep weeding.

Cuttings can be taken for deciduous shrubs – fuchsia, hydrangea etc.

Spring clean house plants – wipe dust of smooth leaves with a damp cloth and use a soft brush for hairy leaves. Look for scale insects, small waxy blobs, and remove with methylated spirits (or whisky, vodka) on a cotton bud.

Gradually harden off tender and young plants raised under cover.

Containers that have had bulbs growing in them can have the foliage cut off then remove the top 2 or 3 inches of old compost. Replace with fresh compost which has had slow release fertilizer added ready for planting up with begonias, lobelia, petunias etc. when all danger of frost is past.

Draw soil over emerging potatoes to protect from frost; earth them up anyway when large enough.

Sow quick maturing vegetables such as baby carrots, radish, salad leaves and spinach.

Sow runner and French beans, cucumbers, courgettes and squashes.

Thin seedlings when they have their first true leaves.

Keep bird baths clean and topped up with fresh water. Bird food should be free of whole nuts and bulky items. Plant night scented plants such as nicotiana and evening primroses to encourage moths.

When buying plants, single flowers are better than double as a food source for insects.

PARISH MEETING - at the Parish Council Meeting held on the Zoom Platform, during the Covid 19 Virus pandemic, on the 8th April 2021 from 7.30 pm.

The Parish Council heard further updates from the Ward Councillor. Further litter picking had taken place and those who had helped were given a big vote of thanks. The Parish Council said farewell to two parish councillors, these were Cllr Steve Turner and Cllr Veronica Thomas. Thank you to them both for their service to the parish community.

The Much Birch Neighbourhood Development Plan is going to be considered for adoption at a vote to be held on May 6th 2021. The vote is in relation to having the plan considered in relation to planning for the parish going forward. All votes will count.

The Parish Council heard that the planning in principle application, number 210025, for land at the South Herefordshire Hunt Kennels, Wormelow, for between 2 and 9 dwellings with package treatment plant, had been rejected by the Planning Authority.

THE MASONS AT MERRIVALE

As I sit here writing this I think how amazing it is that one beautiful spring day can help you to forget a lot of grim winter ones. It's been a fairly standard winter on the farm. Short dry spells of weather interspersed with very, very wet spells. It can't have been as bad as the winter of 2019-2020 but sometimes it felt like it.

Because we were and still are so short of winter feed and bedding, we managed to keep a bunch of heifers out on stubble turnips and hay until 18th December so it was moderately dry up to then. Amusing at times though when we brought one in for A.I. (artificial insemination) that leaving boots behind in the mud was easy to do.

The cows stayed out grazing during the day until late October which helped a little with the feed situation. Throughout the winter though we have been buying in hay, haylage and recently fodder beet to feed the cows. The cows went out to graze in the daytime on March 23rd, one day earlier than last year. They were however out day and night on 25th March last year, there is no sign of that at the moment as the cold weather is holding back grass growth.

During the frosty and dry spells in February and March Ben has been busy muck spreading and the contractors have been ploughing and irrigating silage ground with slurry. During the last month of dry weather we have drilled peas and barley for wholecrop silage. This has been undersown with grass to produce grazing and silage grass once the peas and barley have been harvested. We have also sown a more drought resistant grazing ley to see how it performs. Another new crop we are trying this year is fodder beet. Local contractors drilled 10 acres 2 weeks ago with the aim of producing more winter feed for the cows. We now, of course, ne ed rain to make all of these crops grow.

We calve cows all year round at Merrivale. If you walk through the farm on the footpath you will no doubt always see calves in the hutches. This winter we have greatly reduced the number of heifer calves born by using sexed semen. This allows us to closely control the number of heifers we have and reduce an oversupply, something that we struggle with when closed down with T.B. as we can't sell any. We can then just provide beef cross calves for sale for other farms to rear on and not produce Friesian bull calves that are not so sought after.

We have had some great news about the installation of a milk vending machine on farm, our grant application has been approved so we finally have the green light to get going. COVID and other factors meant it took the Rural Payments Agency 5 months to give a decision which would normally take 6 weeks but we got there in the end.

There are two parts to the build, the first is putting in a hut that the vending machines will be housed in, together with a parking and turning area for customers on what is currently a paddock. The second part is converting our old milking parlour into a 'white room' where the milk will be pasteurised prior to sale. Work is set to start next month and we are hoping to be up and running in June/July.

The hut won't only be offering milk, Bob and I are all set to plant a good selection of vegetables again which will be sold alongside, together with the Wagyu beef we produce on farm and the wonderful Emily's cakes and bakes.
