Local News

On 31st. August, Much Birch Church was full and overflowing with friends for the funeral service of PETER KEITH GROOM, who died suddenly and unexpectedly at the age of 69 years. Peter lived in Much Birch for the whole of his life and his early schooling was in Ross and completed at Hereford Cathedral School. After leaving school, he worked for the Snells at Treberva and enrolled for a course at the Tech. College where he learned the art of plumbing, welding and building, all of which enabled him to build up a successful business over the years.

He drove lorry loads of apples to the Hereford Cold Store and in those days, the fruit was packed in heavy 40lb. wooden bushel boxes which had to be loaded and unloaded by hand.

Peter enjoyed cream doughnuts and Bob Willis recounted that when he and Peter drove to Andover to fetch straw, they always stopped their lorries outside the same shop in Marlborough and before Peter could get inside the shop, there was always a bag of 6 doughnuts waiting on the counter; three jam for Bob and 3 cream ones for Peter.

Sadly, his father died when Peter was only 27 but he continued living at home to look after his mother and he cared for her right up to the time that she died in the 1970's. Peter bought his own lorry in 1964 and worked by hauling sand and aggregates from local quarries for some years before buying a tractor and lime-spreader. Whilst working at Welsh Newton, he had a lucky escape when the lime-spreader overturned. For 18 years, he worked with Robin Teague in the building trade and Robin paid tribute by saying that Peter was a skilled workman and a pleasure to work with. For some reason, they always called each other 'Dad'. When they were working on cold winter days, Peter always wore a thick donkey jacket. On one such day, they both had to get through a secret trap door in the roof space at Hampton Court. Robin went through successfully, head first, Peter decided to go through feet first but as usual his jacket pockets were full of tapes, nails and small tools and he proceeded to get stuck fast! He was wedged so tight that it took another workman to push Peter while Robin tugged at his feet for some 10 minutes and amid much laughter before he was freed. Peter met Jean at the Park Hall Ballroom where all the well known Dance Bands

the bungalow in Treberva Drive which he renovated and extended and in which Jean and Peter have lived for some 28 years. As soon as he bought his 'trademark' digger, Peter gave up the building work and concentrated on digging foundation trenches, other ground work and tarmacing which he was still doing up to his untimely death and was even working late in the evening the night before he

played on Saturday evenings. From then

on, the friendship grew and Peter bought

late in the evening the night before he died. He had sold his treasured Bedford lorry earlier in the year and was supposed to be 'winding down', but Peter enjoyed his work so much and would always continue well after normal hours to get a job completed.

He loved the whole of the local area and

knew every lane in his own and surrounding parishes. Being a true countryman, he appreciated the whole of nature and in particular, small creatures such as bats, hedgehogs and birds. Many of his friends have remarked that, when thinking of Peter, the two things that came to mind were his love of machinery and a deep respect for all animals, particularly birds. Jean recalled that he was never happier than when sitting in the conservatory and watching the birds at their feeding table and hanging on to the mesh feeders.

He served as a loyal Parish Councillor for 12 years and his colleagues described him as an honourable and thoroughly decent man, who it was a pleasure to know and who would be sorely missed. This memory has been echoed by many, many friends and customers. Peter always did a good job, never cut corners and always tidied up afterwards. He will be sadly missed by so many friends. We extend to Jean and family our heartfelt sympathy.

Donations in memory of Peter will be shared between the Hereford Nature Trust, the Air Ambulance and Much Birch Church.

It is also sad to record the death of MRS NEL WORTHING, who celebrated her 100^{th} birthday earlier in the year. She and her husband, Howard, were well known teachers in the area, with Nel at Much Birch School and Howard at Whitecross. They lived for many years at Churchfield, Quarry Lane, Much Birch. In retirement, they loved their gardening and country walks. Howard died some 6 or 7 years ago and after a while, Nel went to live with Peter and his family in Hereford where she was extremely well cared for. We send to Peter and the family our sincere sympathies.

Our congratulations to Frank Short of 41 Tump Lane who recently celebrated his 95th. birthday over a period of several days. Well done Frank and keep 'taking the pills' to enjoy many more years. He wishes to express his sincere gratitude for all of the cards and presents that he has received and sends his best wishes to everybody.

Congratulations are extended to FRANK SHORT of Tump Lane, MRS. MARY JONES an erstwhile and much respected music teacher at Much Birch School also celebrated her 95th birthday recently and we send to her our heartiest congratulations. She is currently residing at Helen and Chris Atkinson's retirement home, 'West Bank' in Ross on Wye.

There is also news that TOM HELME, formerly of Wormelow, has suffered a stroke and is currently in the Community Hospital in Ross. We send our best wishes for a speedy recovery. Meanwhile, GEOFF JONES still continues to be looked after at Hampton Grange Nursing Home and recently went to Oswestry for an assessment to see if an operation was possible to improve his mobility. Sadly, this was not deemed wise but undeterred Geoff continues to be cheerful even though he still has to spend everyday in bed

Congratulations to our local Junior riders who have enjoyed much success on their ponies at various competitions this year.

Many are members of the local Pony and Riding Clubs. Both organisations run Area competitions which qualify riders through to National Finals. In the Pony Club Area Dressage, held at Gatcombe, HARRIET CHAPMAN and JOANNA DILLON were competing in the Novice Team and finished an excellent fourth. The next day Joanna went on to win her section in the Area Horse Trials and therefore qualified for the National Finals in Cheshire, where she did well but didn't come away with a placing.

At the Riding club Area Show Jumping Competition Harriet qualified in the Open Show Jumping Team, BEC CAMERON qualified in the Novice Team and Joanna in the Equitation Jumping Team. All travelled up to Lincoln in September where, unfortunately, the Novice and Open teams were unplaced. However, Joanna together with LUCY TURNER (who lives just over the border at Prothither!!) were placed second with their team. Well done girls.

LB Village Hall

Progress Report on the Refurbishment
Project - The committee made an
application for funding from the Big
Lottery Fund Community Buildings
programme for major refurbishment of the
hall. The fund received 1600 applications,
more than three times the number
expected, so decisions have been delayed.
Ours is one of 545 that have been
successful in progressing through the
initial assessment stage. A decision on the
progress of the application is now
expected in December.

Meanwhile, money has been spent on essential repairs to the septic tank drainage system and replacement of the boundary fence at the rear of the hall, in part using a grant from Herefordshire Council.

The committee will continue to arrange fund raising events to supplement and match grants that may be available from the Lottery and other organisations.

Report of the Parish Council Meeting of Little Birch Parish Council held on Wednesday 4^h July at Little Birch Village Hall.

Mr. B Powell declared interest when discussing Crows Nest Lane.

The Minutes of the meeting held on the 16^{th} May 2007 were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

Talk by David Lovelace - Mr. Lovelace spoke about the history of Athelstan's Wood including showing historical documentation to prove the original content of the wood. The Parish Council agreed to write a letter asking the current owners to replace existing conifers with native broadleaves as historically documented or at the very least a request to take part in the mandatory consultation. All will be discussed further during the next Parish Council meeting.

Village Hall – Mr. Morley reported that the septic tank work is complete.

A report has been issued discussing the newsletter which will be reviewed during the next Parish Council meeting.

Money has been received from Herefordshire Council in payment of the 1st phase of the Little Birch Village Hall refurbishment grant.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme - The Lengthsman commented on some areas which needed maintaining, including the digging out of Pendant Pitch. Clerk to contact local contractor to complete this work.

Parish Field - Central Network has once again been contacted and a revised reference number received.

Crows Nest Lane – the Chairman outlined current history of this issue for all attending. Many parishioners voiced opinions on this subject. The Parish Council agreed to oppose the kerbing of Crows Nest Lane. Herefordshire

Council has offered a site visit, a date and time to be organised.

Annual Audit – The Clerk reported that all paperwork had been completed and returned.

Parish Freighter – The Clerk reported that the only available slot for this year was Saturday 27th October from 200pm. - 4.00pm. This date was agreed with a request for the freighter to be located outside Little Birch Village Hall.

Any Other Business

PC Andrew Bundy introduced the newly appointed CSO, Kevin Powell, and informed the Parish Council of a recent crime of a burglary on the edge of Aconbury Woods where a garage was entered and tools taken. He also reported that throughout Herefordshire burglary is increasing especially with the thefts of 4x4 vehicles for parts. Bogus traders are offering gardening work at inflated prices.

PC Bundy advised not to employ people who ask for work, always invite. Some fly tipping has occurred in the area, residents are to report any sightings with as much information about car vehicles, drivers etc to Herefordshire Council or the local police. PC Andrew Bundy request that residents report any suspicious vehicles or circumstances to the police in light of the current terrorist attacks, as rural areas are ideal for terrorists to collate bomb-making equipment.

Little Dewchurch Parish Council organised the showing of a current film about global warming. The Parish Council agreed to investigate showing the film to Little Birch residents.

A parishioner has proposed to fund the insertion of a ditch adjacent to his property to prevent flooding. The Parish Council agreed to this proposal.

Cllr Richard Smith discussed his current proposal to Herefordshire Council for a Route Safety Study to take place on the A49.

L.B.P.C.

Report of Little Birch Parish Council Meeting held on Wednesday 5th September. No interests were declared.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 4th July were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

From previous minutes - The movie 'An Inconvenient Truth' is to be shown 11th

October at Little Birch Village Hall. Refreshments will be provided with topical discussions afterwards.

Mr. Morley is to represent Little Birch Parish Council during the next newsletter meeting.

Athelstan's Wood – Correspondence has been received from the current owners and the Forestry Commission say that both are meeting their obligation and are planting some hardwoods and broadleaved trees. A 20-year plan is currently being compiled and a copy should be sent to the Parish Council. A further letter is to be sent requesting that Little Birch Parish Council is consulted for future developments. David Lovelace is to deliver a talk on local woods to the whole community, details of which to be issued in the newsletter.

Village Hall – Correspondence has been received from the Lottery Fund informing of a delay in the 2rd stage of the selection process with a decision to be made in December 2007. A number of fund raising events are organised for the upcoming months including a dog show and a presentation on portable antiquity scheme.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme – The contractor has completed digging out Pendant Pitch. The Clerk will contact the Lengthsman concerning the possibility of a ditch to be dug in school lane.

Parish Field – No further progress.

Crows Nest Lane – Two site visits have taken place with a Herefordshire Council Highways representative. At the 2nd visit a sketched plan showing the location of the proposed kerbing with further details of the kerb height was made. The Parish Council agreed to this specific proposal and a letter is to be written to Herefordshire Council by the Chairman.

Financial Report - 2 cheques written

Correspondence - A detailed list of all correspondence was given to the Parish Council and noted.

Planning – A planning Application received for buildings at New Mills Farm for the Conversion of redundant buildings into two dwellings was returned with no objections.

Any Other Business

PC Andrew Bundy in formed the Parish Council that no crime had been reported in the area except for fly tipping in Chapel Pitch. A newsletter article is to be written to warn parishioners of the increased occurrences in fly tipping. CSO Fiona Witcher advised on the upcoming 'Community Safety Evening' on Tuesday 2nd October at 7:30pm in Little Dewchurch Village Hall.

A letter has been received from the adjacent landowners of the lane from Little Birch Church to New Mills Farm after correspondence was sent requesting the maintenance of overgrown hedgerows. The existing landowners are requesting that the Parish Council maintain the hedgerows. The area Footpaths Officer is to be consulted for clarification.

After the kind offer of a presentation by Planning Officer Mr. P. Yeates, a community talk is to be arranged for February/March 2008.

Neighbourhood Watch Vehicle Crime

Help yourself - Most car crime is committed by opportunists who are likely to be deterred by simple security measures. Follow these points to help ensure you don't become a victim of vehicle crime:

Do:

- Print off West Mercia's vehicle crime prevention postcard. This can be done by visiting the West Mercia website and going to the vehicle crime section. Just click on the image on the site and a printable version of the postcard is available. Or for those without Internet access contact your local policing team who will supply a laminated copy of the postcard.
- Ensure windows, sunroof and boot are all secured and doors locked when leaving your vehicle unattended – no matter how briefly.
- Take keys with you when leaving the vehicle unattended.
- Avoid parking in poorly lit areas at night.
- Fit a locking petrol cap and wheel nuts.
- Activate the steering lock whenever and wherever you park.
- Have the vehicle registration number etched on each of the windows.
- Fit an alarm or immobiliser
- Postcode your vehicle stereo.
- Consider fitting a vehicle tracking device.
- Garage the vehicle if possible.
- Keep vehicle keys in a secure place.

Don't leave:

- Valuables in your vehicle or on view.
- Vehicle documentation in the vehicle it could help a thief sell the vehicle on.
- Keys in the ignition when the vehicle is unattended.
- Keys where they can easily be stolen, e.g. on a key rack in your house that's close to a window or door.
