Bus services in the area were changed on September 1st. Full details can be found on the Herefordshire Council website.

Two new services that will be of interest to local people. were introduced. Timetables are attached to this newsletter and also displayed on village noticeboards

Service 444

Includes Little Birch, Wormelow and Much Dewchurch and operates on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. It is scheduled to connect with Hereford-Ross service 33 at King's Thorn bus shelter.

Service 44

This route operates four times a day Ross-Hoarwithy-Little Dewchurch-King's Thorn bus shelter. It includes Caldicot crossroads, goes past Little Birch Village Hall and is scheduled to connect with Hereford-Ross service 33 at King's Thorn bus shelter.

Beryl Townsend of King's Thorn suffered a broken hip following a fall at home on Sat. 6th. Sep. after the Open Gardening Show and we don't know what was put into the cups of tea on the day. Currently, she is in Ross Community Hospital and we send our best wishes for a speedy recovery.

It is sad to report the death of Olivet Lewis at the age of 85 years in Brockhampton Nursing Home where she received excellent care during the last 18 months. She was born in March 1929 when the 'great depression' was at its worst and times were hard, at Tooting, South London. Her father and mother ran a family shop and Olivet helped them in the business when she left school. She also had a brother, Peter.

Olivet met husband to be, Derek, in the early 1950's, they married in Sep. 1952 and had over 50 years together before Derek's death in 2003. They thoroughly enjoyed playing tennis and often played 'doubles' together. Derek worked for the White Star Line and later P&O on cruise ships. He travelled the world and sometimes there was space for Olivet to travel with him. She got to meet some of the famous people of the time who were then taking cruises. Indeed, she must have been one of the world's best secret travellers but she never boasted where she had been or who she had met.

Derek and Olivet had one son, David, who was a great delight to them and when David moved to South Wales and they had retired, they moved to King's Thorn in a bungalow in Wrigglebrook.

They joined the Gardening Club and distributed Meals on Wheels throughout adjoining parishes for about 7 years until Derek's health deteriorated and they had to give up. Derek had also been Hon. Treasurer of Little Birch Hall Management Committee for some 5 years when Joan Ingram was Chairperson. Derek's death in 2003 was devastating for Olivet but she bravely battled on and with great stoicism even drove to Oxford and other venues to meet up with relations and

Derek's brother 'Jim' and his wife, Inga.

She joined the WI, Evergreen Club, Pop in Club and the Village Monthly Market at Much Birch hall. She attended both Little Birch Church and the Methodist Chapel with her friends, Edith Davies and Christine and Peter Dowsett. She was also well supported by her neighbours and friends for many years.

Olivet's life was not without other tragedies, as David and his first wife had a baby, Ellinor, who sadly died of 'sudden infant death syndrome' at the age of 8 months. Olivet said that was one of the saddest days of her life. Several years later, David met Anne and both were extremely keen cyclists. Olivet was able to attend their wedding and all was going well until David was diagnosed with cancer and despite the best treatment and care in Swansea, he too died just over a year ago. Nephew, Roger, with his specially adapted people carrier for his tetraplegic son, was able to transport Olivet to the hospice to visit David and later to David's funeral.

At the time, Olivet had been in Brockhampton Nursing Home for about 5 months and her 'quality of life' was not great as she could not stand and had to be hoisted in and out of bed in to her chair. The staff there could not have been more caring, patient and pleasant. She moved to a much more pleasant room with good views and bird feeders attached to and just outside the window. She became much more settled but earlier this year, she suffered several 'mini strokes' which affected her speech making conversation quite difficult at times.

She was a very private person but loved to have visitors who were greeted with an enigmatic smile and Leona and Roger, niece and nephew, gradually got to know Olivet better over the last few years in a way that they hadn't had chance to many years ago. She never complained about her illness and we shall miss her steadfastness in the face of all that life threw at her. She will be greatly missed. We send to the nieces and nephew and Brother in law, Jim and Inga and daughter in law, Anne, our deepest sympathies.

It was a shock to many in the community to hear of the passing of **Jean Mason** of King's Thorn at the age of 88 years. She was well known to many parents with children at Much Birch School in the 1970's and later saw those children grow up and have children of their own who came to the school and benefited from Jean's care during the lunch

time breaks. Her funeral takes place on Thursday, 3rd. October at Much Birch Church where she was a regular attender. A fuller tribute will be given in the next Newsletter.

John Kinross of Much Birch continues his series on local castles:Huntington Castle, near Kington

This was a large Norman Castle, mostly included in Wales until 1535 when Henry VIII made sure that it was placed on the English side of the border. In King Henry III's time, it belonged to William de Braose, Lord of Brecknock. On his death, his wife held it until 1248 when her daughter married Humphrey de Bohum, son of the earl of Hereford. Humphrey sided with Simon de Montfort in spite of his father fighting for the King. Prince Edward, with help from the 2 sons of the earl of Leicester, captured Huntington with Hay and Brecon. De Bohum was captured at Evesham where Simon was killed and sent to Beeston Castle, Cheshire as a prisoner. Here he died but his family continued to hold Huntington and Humphrey, third Earl, married Edward 1st's daughter, Elizabeth Plantagenet. Humphrey died at the battle of Boroughbridge (1322) where the Barons tried to put down the de Spencers, favourites of Edward II

The castle now passed to the sixth Earl and when he died, his younger daughter married the Earl of Derby who became King Henry IV. The King passed it to the Earl of Buckingham who, in 1403, died fighting for the King at Shrewsbury. His widow, the Countess (the castle had a Countess Tower) asked one Captain Smart, her Constable, to fortify the castle. It was re-roofed with shingles and Smart got in a quantity of arrows. The great gate was re-hung and today the two bits of stonework that remain on the curtain wall, one a lump of wall and the other a chamber with a stair going up and one down to a dungeon, are all that is left of the Countess's works.

The second Duke (chased by Richard III took refuge here without luck as he was caught and put to death) had it valued and it was worth nothing at all. In the 16th. century, one tower was still a prison and there was a Constable but it was all too ruinous to take part in the Civil War.

Ownership passed to Caves, Garnons, Townsends and Holmans and in 1818, it was the property of Edmund Cheese,

Today it belongs to a local farmer who has cleared

the undergrowth. Those wanting to see what is left should park at the village hall and take a short walk into the site where there is still much work to be done.

And Finally
