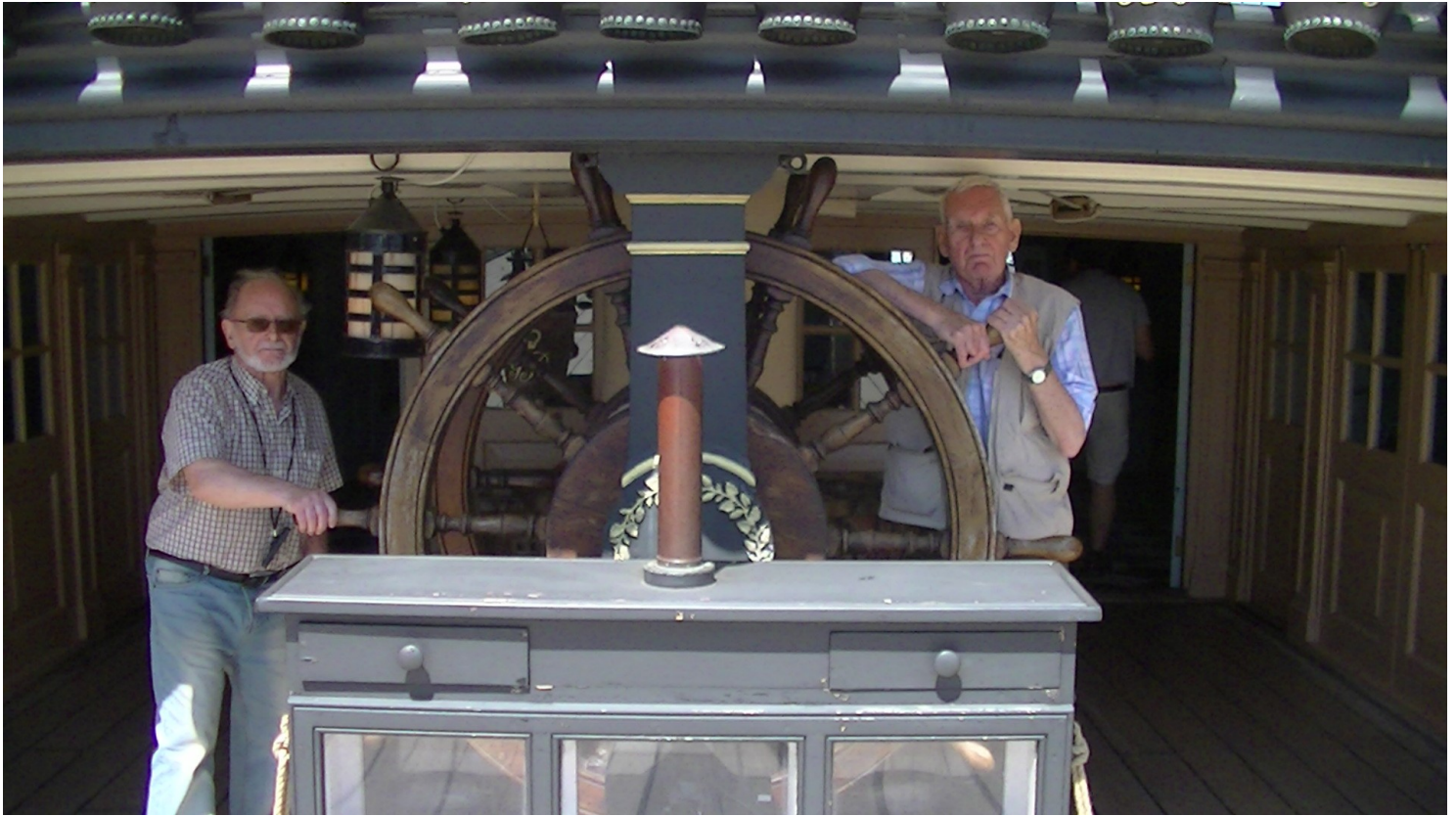

Onward to Victory

or Three Men on a Mission or a new series of “*Last of the Summer Wine*”?

It started when Alison Clarke safely delivered three local men, combined age of 251 years, to Hereford railway station for a journey to Portsmouth harbour via Newport. After a short walk to the Premier hotel, a meal of fish and chips and a nights sleep they were ready to begin their two day mission. Just across the road was the entrance to their objective-the renowned Portsmouth historic dockyard. The extensive dockyard is still in use by the Royal Navy and the modern, enormous Queen Elizabeth aircraft carrier was in port. Three large historic ships, smaller vessels and several museums are open to visitors.

1. The Mary Rose

The remains of the oldest ship, the Mary Rose is housed in a specially constructed, airconditioned building. The Mary Rose was built in 1510 for King Henry VIII when he was just 19 years old. She served for 34 years before being sunk in 1545 whilst defending England from a French invasion fleet. Of the 500 men on board, not more than 35 survived. Lying in the depths of the Solent and raised from the seabed in 1982, she was moved to Portsmouth dockyard and as much as possible of the wreck was preserved on dry land. The Mary Rose and her contents have been meticulously restored, the work being funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. The museum tells the stories of the battles with the French and of the 500 men who lived, worked and died on board. Some 19,000 items on display, from the huge cannon to small personal possessions of the crew, recovered in one of the most challenging archaeological recoveries of all time. You can listen to the sounds of the past, smell recreated Tudor smells and see the ship brought to life with cutting edge technology, telling the emotionally compelling stories of what life was like on-board before she sank.

2. HMS Victory

The ship is perhaps the most celebrated warship in Britain's naval history. Vice-Admiral Lord Nelson's flagship is presented as she was in her Georgian heyday. You can imagine the atmosphere as the ship and her crew get ready for the Battle of Trafalgar, which took place on 21st October 1805, and picture the sailors and officers working, eating and sleeping and feel the drama and impact of a day that is still very important in British naval history. It is possible to explore every nook and cranny of the ship from the Great Cabin, where battle plans were drawn up, right through to the lower gun deck. This provides a glimpse of what it was like to live and fight in this great ship. Victory has aboard various RN personnel in period costume, also volunteers, taking the part of the Captain and different crew members, who try to answer visitors' questions. HMS Victory is maintained as she was at the time; you cannot fail to be impressed by the sheer size of what was built mainly from oak. With over 260 years of history and participating in six major battles over an unusually long service, the National Museum of the Royal Navy is committed to preserving Vice-Admiral Lord Nelson's flagship. She is currently undergoing the biggest restoration programme in her history, work which started on 24th May this year.

3. HMS Warrior

HMS Warrior was built in 1860-61 in just 18 months - and was Britain's first iron-clad battleship at a time of Britain's dominance in international trade and industry. The ship was powered by steam and/or sail and was the pride of Queen Victoria's fleet. Warrior never fired a gun in anger, she did not need to - it was enough for any potential enemy to know she existed. It is huge-418 feet long and weighs 9210 tons. The ship was so far ahead of any other warship, in design, speed and armaments, that taking her on in battle was out of the question. Painstakingly restored in Hartlepool and back home in Portsmouth since 1987, Warrior is a unique survivor of the once formidable Victorian Black Battle Fleet and now serves as a museum ship, visitor attraction, popular private hire venue and more.

As with the Victory, it is possible to explore all parts of the ship. There are muzzle-loading guns, and breech loading guns. On the upper deck the guns can be moved around to fire at any target. There are four decks; below the upper deck there is the main deck - for officers quarters and the galley, also for the fixed guns. On lower decks there are seamen and marines quarters, eating and bathing facilities, washing machines, and the coal bunkers, twin cylinder steam engine together with the boilers. Similar to the Mary Rose and the Victory, there were RN officers and volunteers on hand to explain what was what. The outstanding character here was the Chief Stoker who would only give his 'stage' name.

Having walked several miles around the dockyard during the two days, the aged trio were glad to sit in the train for the return journey. This provided an opportunity to discuss the eye opening visit and consider future adventures. Several objectives are in mind that hopefully will be completed and described in later reports. However, it will be impossible to equal the exploits portrayed in 295 episodes by the Last of the Summer Wine stalwarts!

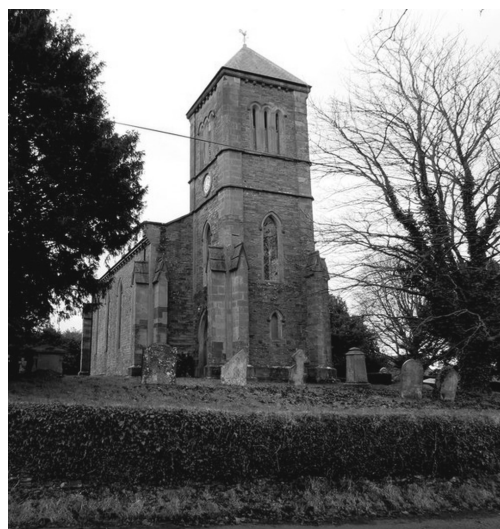

Jobs for the garden in September Derek Scrivens

What a couple of months! July and August have seen records broken in all ways. The England Women had to dig deep (gardening connection) twice to become European Champions, record temperatures, record drought and then in the Commonwealth Games a record haul of medals with the irony that every time England won a gold medal the anthem was Jerusalem, the last line of which is "in England's green and pleasant land". Just take a look at our gardens and the fields at present. I am old enough to remember 1976, when, after the baking temperatures of that year, it took 2-3 years to get soil structures back to some sort of normality and for some trees and shrubs to recover.

Clean greenhouse and cold frame glass.
Plant new perennials towards the end of the month.
Water greenhouse plants in the morning now so plants don't spend all night sitting in cold water.
Move house plants to a lighter position and reduce watering.
Bulbs – Daffodil, Scilla, Crocus and Hyacinths can be planted in borders and pots.


Harvest Apples and Pears – store unblemished fruits, with stalk intact in single layers, not touching, in a cool, dark, frost free and well ventilated location.
Plant Onion sets.
Sow small quantities of salad leaves and Radishes.

If you are lucky enough to have visits from hedgehogs, put out a little dog or cat food.
Clean nesting boxes, line with straw or wood shavings and rehang them.
Put a net over ponds to prevent leaves falling in.

Much Birch Surgery – Seasonal Flu and Covid Vaccinations

This Autumn, Much Birch will be holding our usual Flu vaccination clinics for patients over 50 and those under 50, with underlying health conditions.
