## **Police** Notice

On Thursday 14th August 2008 police were called to an address in Wormelow following discovery of the body of a local man. The identity of the man was confirmed as David Langdon, aged 40 years, who is a well known character in and around the village.

The cause of death remains unexplained so it is vital that all opportunities are identified to obtain information that will assist the Police and H.M. Coroner.

Since the start of the investigation police have conducted a large number of enquiries in and around Wormelow and Much Dewchurch, which has resulted in superb co-operation, communication and flexibility from residents and businesses alike. The support of the local community has been excellent over the past week and we would like to take this opportunity to say thank you.

However, the enquiry is ongoing so you will continue to see Police Officers in and around the villages over the coming days. We will endeavour to minimise the impact of police activity on the village but please understand that we have an important job to do. Your continued support will be greatly appreciated.

The funeral service for MRS. VALERIE HOWORTH, erstwhile of Hill House, Kings Thorn, took place at St. David's, Much Dewchurch and was conducted by Rev. Kay Garlick and the following is based mainly on her address. Val's father was an Army Officer and was serving abroad during WW1 when she was born. Val attended St. Helen's School in Northwood, Middlesex together with her sister, Silva and was very happy and successful particularly in music and won the Henry Wood prize at that school. She went on to become a very accomplished pianist and performer. Between the wars, the family moved around quite a lot as her father had many overseas postings, including China. It was through army contacts that Val met Peter Howorth and they were married in 1951. When Peter and his brother bought Court Farm, Much Birch, Peter and Val moved into Bryn Garth. The farm produced chickens, blackcurrants and apples and gave seasonal employment to many local mothers during the picking season. Val provided tea for everyone and lemonade for the children who came along with their mothers. Although Val had no children of her own, she loved all the young ones and her nieces, Heather and Clare, spent many happy holidays at the farm. Val won a TV set in 1953 just before the Coronation and with the co-operation of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Williams set it up in a barn at Ash farm and invited everyone in the community to watch the Coronation of our present Queen.

When Geoff Perry took over the farm, Peter and Val moved into Hill House, where she remained until some 2 years ago. She was a woman of real faith - a committed member of the congregation and a great supporter of St. David's. She was very much involved with the Perpetual Trust, Cathedral worked tirelessly as a volunteer at the Three Choirs Festival, was a member of the Historic Churches Trust and of the Conservative Club. Val helped with the Red Cross "Over Sixties Club" when it met at the Park Hall for many years and continued when it became the Pop in Club, meeting in Much Dewchurch Village Hall. She was in every sense a real lady - always considerate, always welcoming, always smiling and although she was born to a fairly privileged lifestyle, she never held herself apart, but sought and won the true friendship of so many people from every possible walk of life.

Over the last few years, Val's health began to deteriorate and with the help of many friends and neighbours, particularly Margaret Blythe and Ruth Owen, remained at Hill House until the time came when she needed full-time nursing care and she moved first to Hentland and then on to Brockhampton Court Nursing Home. Visitors were always welcomed with "How nice to see you" and sent away with "Thank you so much for coming", even if she wasn't quite sure who you were. She will be sadly missed by her nieces and their families and many friends. Our condolences are also sent to John Caton and his family following the passing of his father, JACK CATON, the well known upholsterer in Hereford. Jack and his late wife always supported events at Little Birch Hall and he was brought to the Church Fete two weeks before he died. He was a real character and the respect in which he was held was reflected in a full and overflowing congregation at the Thanksgiving Service for his life, which was held at Putson Baptist Church.

## Speeding

Many residents have expressed their concerns over speeding vehicles in the parish. A lot of our lanes are single track and cars are still travelling at great speed risking a collision with another car or, worse still, with a pedestrian. Recently, a car was hit as it was reversing out of a driveway by a speeding vehicle up Forge Lane, Wrigglebrook. This particular lane is often used as a 'short cut' and some drivers appear to disregard the fact that pedestrians use the lane and there is very little room to jump out of the way of speeding vehicles. ## A Housing Need Survey IS COMING SOON THROUGH YOUR LETTERBOX!

The Local Authority has a statutory duty to assess housing needs under the Housing Act 1985. The results of the survey will assist in identifying the size and mix of property required.

## Don't put your survey in the bin!

A good response will ensure an accurate evaluation of the need for affordable housing in your parish.

Names and addresses of respondents will not be required.

Graham and Betty Philpott of Waterloo House, Kings Thorn have had a solar heating system installed. This is supplementary to the existing water and heating system in producing hot water, particularly in the warmer months, although there should be a benefit throughout the year. ## What is Affordable Housing?

Affordable housing is housing provided for rent or sale, at a price level which can be afforded by local people in housing need, where households are unable to access existing markets.

Herefordshire Council works in partnership with preferred partner Housing Associations (RSL) and private developers to deliver affordable homes in the county. The purpose of Housing Need Surveys is to ascertain if there is a housing need in a particular parish and the Herefordshire Council will, in partnership with RSLs deliver affordable homes to meet that need.

If any affordable housing is built in Little Dewchurch/ Little Birch it will be subject to a Section 106 planning agreement which states that any affordable housing built must be allocated to people with a local connection.

The criteria for Local Connection are:

- Is or in The Past was Normally Resident There and That Residence is or was of His Own Choice – normally resident shall be established by twelve months prior residence in one of the parishes specified in the Section 106
- Is Employed There employed shall mean in the employment of another not being of a casual nature but shall not exclude part time hours of 16 hours or more
- Family Association family association shall mean where a person of his household has parents, adult children, brothers, sisters currently residing in one of the parishes specified in the Section 106
- A Proven Need To Give Support Or To Receive Support From Family Members – support shall mean a proven need to provide or receive personal and physical care.
- Because of Special Circumstances special circumstances shall not normally apply but amount to circumstances which in the view of the council may give rise to local connection.

It is proposed that the Housing Need Study will be posted out to all households within the Parish within the next two months. The more responses received enables the Research Department to determine a better reflection of the need within the Parish.

**Please do not enter any information into this page under any circumstances** - it is definitely a hoax and the tax office has been informed.

Please continue to forward any emails you suspect of being a scam to IT for verification and many thanks to those who alerted us to this problem.

On the crime news front, it has been fairly quiet lately, but thefts of scrap continue.

The theft of two sets of rollers were reported to us from a farm in Kilpeck, and three sets from a farm in Didley - the suspects must have used a lorry with a Hiab crane on the back to lift them. Have you noticed any such vehicles in your area?

Farmers - check that machinery is as secure as you can make it, don't offer these thieves easy pickings!

A large strimmer was stolen from a farm in Much Dewchurch over the past two weeks, however the thieves left the straps behind.

Eight motor vehicles parked on a garage forecourt in Callow had their catalytic converters stolen overnight last night, the total value has been estimated at  $\pounds 12,000$ .

On 12<sup>th</sup> August a car and trailer were stolen from just off our patch in Eaton Bishop. A green Mitsubishi L200 4 wheel drive pick-up M282RVJ and an Ifor Williams 12ft trailer were taken from farm buildings between 10.30am and 4.30pm.

A garage adjoining a property in Much Birch was broken into during the past week, a quantity of alcohol was taken -108 bottles in all! Amongst them were 8 bottles of Jamieson whiskey, and bottles of 'Speckled Hen, Old Peculiar, and Corona' beer. There were also several bottles of wine and champagne, so if you hear of anyone selling off cheap booze, let us know!

### Results

You may remember reading about a group of unscrupulous males that did some 'drainage work' at a premises in Green Crize several months ago. The occupant of the premises is an elderly lady who is almost housebound, and the work they carried out can only be described as appalling. They charged the lady £24,000 for the work, and took four blank, signed cheques.

The cheques were cancelled in time, they have all been recovered and as a result of painstaking enquiries, four males have been questioned and a decision regarding prosecution is awaited.

Also, a few weeks ago we reported the theft of some scrap radiators from Wormbridge, where an alert member of the public had taken the registration of the vehicle concerned. As a result of enquiries in a neighbouring force, a male and a female have been questioned and again, a decision regarding prosecution will be made shortly.

There are a few extra incidents to report and although they are not in our immediate area you may be able to help.

A lorry parked in a lay-by in Allensmore had about 200 litres of diesel stolen whilst the driver was asleep in the cab.

An office in Wormbridge was broken into between 1700 last night and 0800 this morning, an untidy search was made but it is unclear at this stage if anything has been taken.

The yard of an industrial premises in Pontrilas was entered and aquantity of red diesel was taken from a tank. The lock on the gates to the yard was cut off.

Two motorcross bikes were stolen from a shed of a house in Pontrilas, both were blue Yamaha WR450F off road bikes, one was registered - CF55UMB, the other was not registered. Also taken was a pair of white off-road motorcycle boots, and a black and red off road motorcycle suit.

Finally, a catalytic converter was stolen from a van parked in the Grafton area between 3 and 5am.

Our colleagues in Wales have recently arrested two males who were responsible for some drive offs from garages in our area, they were stealing number plates from parked vehicles and displaying them on their vehicle prior to the thefts, but only covered their rear plate - they were traced from the front plate! A decision rests with the CPS regarding charges.

## Less Than One A Day

Herefordshire is a safe place - but particularly so in respect of house burglaries. West Mercia Police crime figures show that burglaries of homes in Herefordshire have more than halved over the past four years. In the last year, officers of Herefordshire Division dealt with under 300 such crimes, that is less than one a day - across the whole county! Chief Superintendent Mark Turner, the Divisional Commander, said, "I am delighted that the efforts of the police in Herefordshire, supported by the community, have most importantly led to a reduction in these serious offences. Where they have occurred, victims can be reassured that we place great emphasis on finding the offender, allocating specialists to each and every offence and employing a wide variety of methods to detect them. Herefordshire IS a safe place - with the help of the people in the county and other partner agencies we aim to keep it that way".

Summer is now upon us and one of the ways that you can help us "keep it that way" is to be aware of the opportunities that the warm weather might present to the potential burglar. When it gets hot, it's natural to open all the windows in the house. An unattended open window can be an open door to the opportunist thief. So be careful which windows you do open. Consider the following:

- Don't leave windows open at the front if you are in the back garden (and vice versa).
- Consider getting window stay locks that allow you to open the window a little but lock it in place.
- Don't leave windows open above flat roofs that you cannot keep an eye on.
- Don't leave valuables on window sills or near an open window.
- Report all suspicious activity to the police as soon as possible.

Is house burglary a big problem? Not in **Herefordshire!** Please help us to keep it that way.

### Results

Due to the new format of our Newsbeat, we will no longer be giving lists of crimes committed or all the results as before.

One positive result is the arrest of a male in connection with the theft of several 'scrap' cars on our patch, including those in Little Birch and Wormelow. This was as a result of information received from several witnesses who were able to give good descriptions and supply statements. Thanks to everyone who helped with that one! The male has been bailed while enquiries continue.

## ANPR - The New Police Weapon

For several years, police forces across the UK have been developing and investing in ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) technology. Now Herefordshire Division has acquired its own two ANPR vehicles. The equipment on board can scan numbers in seconds and tell the police crew whether that vehicle is untaxed, uninsured, unregistered or being used by travelling criminals.

The software checks the scanned number against over 100 databases, including those of DVLA, Police National Computer, MIDAS (motor insurers system) and police force throughout the UK - and all within seconds - to identify illegal vehicles or those used by known burglars, drug dealers, disqualified drivers and drink/drivers.

The ANPR team, based at Hereford, has been in operation for just 14 days and the team have already stopped 31 cars for no insurance and seized 22 of those, as well as arrested several for drugs, burglary and 4 for fraud. They have also searched numerous vehicles used by travelling criminals who come into the county to commit crime. At present the team is regularly patrolling the arterial roads into the county (A49, A40, A465 and A438) to send a strong message to travelling criminals that they are not welcome. Such is the effectiveness of ANPR, crews have been kept extremely busy trying to cope with all the work the system generates.

Supt Kevin Purcell, spearheading the ANPR initiative, said, "ANPR is an incredible tool and will make as big an

impact on the police service as fingerprints and DNA have done. I can envisage the time when most, if not all, police vehicles will carry ANPR equipment."

## Cash Machine Warning

Be vigilant when using ATM cash machines. At the end of July, Hereford Police recovered card reading devices from three ATM's in the city. The devices, which cover existing panels, read your card as it is put in the slot and a concealed camera records your PIN. The fraudsters remove the panels later and use the info to access your account. To stop them check the ATM before use for unusual panels and cover your hand with your free hand when entering your PIN. Report any suspicions to the police

Did you know that in the past 5 years, burglary is down 60%, Car crime is down 30%, Total crime is down 15%. Herefordshire is safe, let's keep it that way,

Finally, colleagues at Leominster have brought to our attention a device which has been launched by Business Watch which may help prevent theft of fuel from tanks. It is a wireless transmitter placed inside the screw cap of an oil or petrol tank, and an alarm is triggered if the cap is unscrewed or tampered with.
