

Local News.

A very warm welcome is given to **Wendy Beynon** and **Craig Coppin** who have moved into 'Iscoed', King's Thorn together with daughter, **Rhyanna Coppin** and dog, 'Shiloh'. We trust that they will be very happy in their new home and will make new friends in this community.

It is sad to record the death of **Lillian Thomas** long time resident in Tump Lane, Much Birch. Lillian was born in 1921 in Fulham, London, the youngest of 3 sisters, her elder siblings being Florrie and Eva. In WW2 at the height of the bombing in London, the 3 sisters evacuated to Much Dewchurch to live with a family friend which must have come as a great shock as there was no mains water and no electricity. Lillian did her bit for the war effort in working at the munitions factory at Rotherwas. It is not known precisely what she did but on one occasion she was suspended for nearly blowing up the area in which she worked!

Lillian regularly attended village dances where she met husband to be, Reg, who was a drummer in one of the bands. They fell in love and after a short engagement were married in 1944. They first of all lived with Reg's parents at the Reading Room, Wormelow and Raymond was born in 1945. The family moved to 'Old Bryngwyn', where in due time Ashley and Philip (but known as Pat) were born.

Life was tough, with Reg working all hours and Lillian picking fruit at Long Orchard Farm. Ten years after Pat was born, along came their daughter, Ann, moving the family up the housing list so that in 1958, the family moved into 32, Tump Lane. Life had relatively improved but money was still short. Ray was about to leave school and start earning and a few years later, Ashley and Pat also went out into the world of work.

In 1964, tragedy struck when Ashley just 18, was caught up in a motorcycle accident outside the Broadleys Pub on the Ross Road and was killed and later buried in Much Birch churchyard.

The mid-60's were tough for Reg and Lillian but the family soldiered on with spirit and determination to overcome this tragedy. In 1980, Ann married David in Much Birch Church with Reg just managing to stand at her side. He had been suffering with cancer for some time and three months later he lost the battle and he was laid to rest in the churchyard a few spaces away from Ashley's grave.

There was some compensation for Lillian with the arrival in turn of grandchildren Simon, then Paul

and Kerry. She doted on all three of them not only as grandma but swimming instructor, tennis coach and even 'goalie' as they played on the green in Tump Lane. All the grandchildren were always close to her heart as neither Ray nor Pat were married.

Lillian played darts for many years as a member of the ladies team at the Tump Inn at Wormelow. She was the life and soul of many birthday celebrations and for her 70th went on holiday with friends to Crete. She enjoyed walks with the Hereford Rambling Association and walked most of the Offa's Dyke path both ways.

For her 80th, friends and family organised a surprise party at Wormelow Bowling Club at Park Hall, which she greatly appreciated. and there was a best present that she could imagine. a balloon trip over Herefordshire. Sadly, this was delayed for a year due to the Foot and Mouth outbreak but she certainly enjoyed every moment of it when it took place.

As part of her 90th. birthday, friends in Tump Lane arranged a barbeque in her honour and the family gave her a day out at Hereford Races - she was in a wheel chair some of the time with a large balloon attached which caused spontaneous outbursts of 'Happy Birthday to you', much to Lillian's embarrassment.

The family continued to expand with the arrival of great grandchildren. Paul one of the grandchildren, moved to Texas and married Sam and Lillian loved to see them when they came to the UK and often used Ann's iPad for 'facetime' with them in Texas.

Although there were plenty of good memories, tragedy was never far away and in 1988, Pat died very suddenly and was buried in the churchyard and in 2013, Ray also died when Lil was on holiday and his ashes are interred in the Garden of Remembrance just behind the Church.

In March 2014, Lillian had a fall at home and broke her hip spending a week in the County Hospital before moving to Ledbury Hospital to recuperate. She picked up a chest infection whilst there and everyone thought that she wouldn't pull through. However, this 'old girl' was as tough as nails and came home again for a short while. She then needed extra care and moved into Manor Rest Home in Hereford. Even though she was only there for 7 months, she made many new friends and enjoyed the activities that the home arranged.

Early in January, her health deteriorated and she was taken into the County Hospital where she

passed peacefully away on the 15th. at the age of 93 years.

A Service of Thanksgiving for her life was held at Much Birch Church on 28th January to a packed congregation of family and many, many friends. The Service was conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson from whose address these notes have been compiled.

The death of '**Margot' Curtis** of Hentland also occurred on 23rd January at the home of her nephew, Roger, at Tenby, where she had been staying for several months. Margot was born at Hentland School where her mother was the school mistress. She lived a very colourful life teaching in Rhodesia when her husband Bernard took up an appointment there and coming back to teach at Hentland for a short time following the death of her mother.

The school closed in 1961 and Margot transferred to Much Birch School and was assistant to the late Miss Lawrence in both the Old School (now a B&B establishment) and in the present (New School) from 1966 under the late Noel Lewis. She taught here for over 25 years and only gave up when her husband, Bernard, suffered a stroke and Margot stayed at home to nurse him.

They had enjoyed many holidays both in the UK and abroad. Bernard died in 1991 and Margot joined the Over 60's Club followed by the Pop In club and the Evergreen Club. She also enjoyed Old Time Dancing and joined the Club which met at Little Birch Village Hall and met at the Axe and Cleaver for lunch to celebrate members birthdays. She usually had lunch on Mondays with the late Olivet Lewis at the Axe. She is fondly remembered as a very good teacher by many ex-pupils at the school.

Her funeral service was taken by Rev. Fran Pullen at Hentland Church on 9th. February followed by Cremation. Donations in memory of Margot were sent to the British Heart Foundation.

We send our condolences to nephew Roger and his family and to niece, Sue, and her family.

It is with deep regret that the death of Joyce Baker of Much Birch is announced. Joyce was in her 90th. year having been born in 1925 at Red Rail Farm, Hoarwithy. She attended Hentland school where she met Jim in her early teens and enjoyed singing in the Choir at Hoarwithy Church. Joyce left school at 14 but continued reading and studying. She was 17 when she married Jim in 1943 and worked in the ATS as a clerk before

starting a family in 1947. Joyce worked extremely hard throughout her life bringing up five children as well as working in all weathers on farms where Jim worked.

The first family home was at 'Love Dee', Pencoyd and Carol was born there. In 1947, the deep snow lasted for over 6 weeks and the family were more or less marooned at home having to cut a path through to walk to Harewood End for basic provisions. The other five children arrived in turn with Michael, Beryl, George and Margaret.

In 1960, the family settled at Long Orchard Farm, owned by the Achesons, which is still the family home today. Here, Joyce continued to work hard on the farm and loved to spoil the grandchildren as they came along.

Later , Joyce worked as a housekeeper for Mrs. Sheila Acheson and over the years, became a firm friend and companion. Later, Mr. Geoff. Perry bought the farm and Joyce worked in the pack house only agreeing to retire at a mere eighty years young !! Geoff also became a firm family friend and often spoke of his admiration for all that Joyce did.

Joyce did have a go at driving a car but after demolishing a few blackcurrant bushes, decided not to persevere! Around this time, she decided to give up smoking but she liked to have a 'secret' cigarette now and again. She had a pinafore with very large pockets in which she concealed her cigarette in her hand if anyone turned up unexpectedly. Needless to say, there were many scorch marks in those pockets. Joyce also had a great football passion for and supported Manchester United where David Beckham was her idol. Members of the family often turned up in opposing club colours just to wind her up but she always took it in good spirit.

Joyce didn't do sewing!! Jim is sure he remembers buying new clothes rather than having the buttons replaced - his shirts were conveniently 'lost'. Joyce endorsed the terrors of sewing to all the younger ones by playfully chasing them with a needle if a sewing exercise was essential. Any new members joining the family were swiftly and gratefully indoctrinated into her theory of avoiding sewing at all costs!

Joyce was a family oriented person through and through being very proud and protective of her five children, eleven grandchildren, nineteen great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren! Jim and Joyce were extremely proud when **George**

was awarded an MBE.

After living at Worcester Cottage for nearly 55 years there are many happy memories. Everyone was welcome into their home where the 'kettle was always on' and Joyce was the most hospitable of wives! She will be remembered for her sense of humour, kindness, tact and love for all the family. Her love of classical music was outstanding and the home would often be loudly filled with Elgar's music among others. This probably developed during her time working for and living in with Mrs. Dance at the Old Mill, Hoarwithy, who had been a personal friend of Elgar years before.

A Service of Thanksgiving for Joyce's Life was held in at Much Birch Church on Friday, 13th February conducted by Rev. Mark Johnson. Such was the respect in which Joyce was held that there was standing room only for her Service. Appropriately, Motzart's Clarinet Concerto was played as the coffin entered and exited the Church. The reading of 'Death is nothing at all' was given by daughter in law, Celia Baker and a piece of Elgar's Enigma Variations was played during a Time for Reflection of memories of Joyce. Readings were also given by grandchildren, Rebecca Evans and Kevin Baker while son, George, gave the eulogy. Joyce's body was buried in the churchyard on the far side in view of Worcester Cottage.

We send our sincere sympathies to all the family and especially to Jim and children, Carol, Michael, Beryl, Jim and Margaret and their families. Joyce will be so sadly missed by the family and many, many friends.

Donations in memory of Joyce were given to St. Michael's Hospice and Much Birch Church.

Suspicious vehicles

A grey VW Toureg 4 x 4 AK14XEE was in the Tretire area on Friday 6th February at 11am with two males offering chainsaws and diesel generators for sale. One male had an Irish accent, had a stocky build and dark hair. The second male wasn't spoken to but he was thinner, they looked to be in their 40's.

Probably connected to the above; a white Peugeot partner panel van ML12HPN was seen in Ewyas Harold and Pontrilas on the same day but later in the day, with two Irishmen also offering generators and chainsaws for sale. The males were giving the name of well known businessmen saying they were recommending them - the businessmen did no such thing!

Do not buy from these type of cold-callers, or any other in fact, unless they offer you receipts and a written 7 day cooling off period. By law, anything offered for sale at the door with a value of £42 or over, must be accompanied by the relevant paperwork, with clear details of the company selling the item. With regard to the chainsaws being offered by these individuals - it is most likely that they will fail any UK safety checks; they are manufactured abroad and are very poor quality and certainly not worth the amount they are being offered for.

At the 1994 annual awards dinner given for Forensic Science, AAFS President, Doctor Don Harper Mills astounded his audience with the legal complications of a bizarre death.

Here is the story:

On March 23, 1994, the medical examiner viewed the body of Ronald Opus, and concluded that he died from a shotgun wound to the head. Mr. Opus had jumped from the top of a ten-story building intending to commit suicide.

He left a note to that effect indicating his despondency. As he fell past the ninth floor, his life was interrupted by a shotgun blast passing through a window, which killed him instantly.

Neither the shooter nor the deceased was aware that a safety net had been installed just below the eighth floor level to protect some building workers and that Ronald Opus would not have been able to complete his suicide the way he had planned.

An elderly man and his wife occupied the room on the ninth floor where the shotgun blast emanated. They were arguing vigorously and he was threatening her with a shotgun! The man was so upset that when he pulled the trigger he completely missed his wife, and the pellets went through the window, striking Mr. Opus.

When one intends to kill subject 'A', but kills subject 'B' instead, one is guilty of the murder of

subject 'B'.

When confronted with the murder charge, the old man and his wife were both adamant, and both said they thought the shotgun was not loaded. The old man said it was a long-standing habit to threaten his wife with the unloaded shotgun. He had no intention to murder her therefore the killing of Mr Opus appeared to be an accident, assuming the gun had been accidentally loaded.

The continuing investigation turned up a witness who saw the old couple's son loading the shotgun about six weeks prior to the fatal accident. It transpired that the old lady had cut off her son's financial support, and the son, knowing the propensity of his father to use the shotgun threateningly, loaded the gun with the expectation that his father would shoot his mother. Since the loader of the gun was aware of this, he was guilty of the murder even though he did not actually pull the trigger. The case now becomes one of murder on the part of the son for the death of Ronald Opus.

Now here comes the exquisite twist.

Further investigation revealed that the son was, in fact, Ronald Opus. He had become increasingly despondent over the failure of his attempt to engineer his mother's murder. This led him to jump off the ten-story building on March 23rd, only to be killed by a shotgun blast passing through the ninth story window. The son, Ronald Opus, had actually murdered himself. Therefore, the medical examiner closed the case as a suicide. A true story from Associated Press.
