

From Reverend Mark

Hi Everyone,

Now that spring has sprung – well at least the daffodils seem to think so – I was thinking about Jesus using agricultural parables. As you know, a parable is a story or example that carries a deeper meaning and Jesus often used them to help his followers and casual listeners understand a deeper truth through something that they themselves could relate to – either because they farmed fields, for example, or because they knew people who did.

The great thing about the parables that Jesus chose was that they have mostly survived the test of time. Sowing and reaping, lighting a lamp, all of these still have a relevance to us some 2000 years later. One that confuses people is the one about salt losing its saltiness.

For us, salt is an everyday product, in mills and cellars on our dining table and we can all remember the time in primary school when we dissolved salt in water and then grew salt crystals. For us, salt doesn't lose it saltiness!

But in the time of Jesus, salt came from two sources. Firstly, it could be mined and the salt crystals were fairly impure, meaning that if rain got on to it, it would dissolve out the salt and you would be left with just a tasteless pile of dirt. Secondly, people took water from the Dead Sea, just 20 odd miles from Jerusalem and let it evaporate in shallow ponds and then scrape up the resultant crystals. This was much purer and was then used not only to season food but also in offerings at the Temple in Jerusalem. That meant, of course, that it was more expensive. The salt that most people could afford was the cheaper, less pure stuff.

Once you know this then you understand why Jesus says that the salt that has lost its saltiness is good for nothing but to be thrown out and trampled on.

Jesus is reminding his listeners, and us, not to let the goodness in our lives be washed away!

Jobs for the garden in March

This year has started similar to last year, with January and the first two weeks in February virtually rain free and the ground drying well. We have had a few frosts of varying intensity but not bad enough to deter early carpets of snowdrops from flowering, with crocuses and a few daffodils appearing as well, plus catkins on hazel nut trees. At the time of writing – mid February - we have seedlings growing well in the greenhouse, cabbage, cauliflower, calabrese, leeks, broad beans, onions, tomatoes and cucumbers.

Fruit bushes and canes have been pruned and the soil around them cleaned and a good dusting of blood fish and bone has been forked in and a mulch applied. Roses have also been pruned. Our tubs have been cleared of old thatch and the top few inches refreshed with new compost with fertilizer added and the bulbs are now growing well – we are looking forward to a great display.

Here are a few ideas for March

- *Apply a general purpose granular fertilizer to hungry plants such as roses and clematis and fork in lightly. Lift and divide clumps of snowdrops as foliage yellows. *Pot up dormant dahlia tubers and canna rhizomes. Protect from cold but in good light water sparingly. *Repot house plants in pots 1 or 2 sizes larger. Plants
- benefit from repotting every few years.
 *Dead head daffodils but leave foliage to die off
- naturally.

 *Level out dips and bumps in the lawn. Cut a letter 'H'
 with a spade over the uneven area. Peel back the turf

and add or remove soil. Replace turf and firm down.

- *Sprout or 'chit' seed potatoes indoors, placing the potatoes in trays or egg boxes with the 'rose' end (small indentations from where spurts will emerge) uppermost.
- *Sow tomato seeds in pots in a propagator or on a window sill.
- *When the soil feels warm to the touch and is not saturated, parsnip seeds can be sown. (Soil is usually warm enough to sow seed when you see weed seedlings appearing)
- *When the soil has dried out sufficiently to walk on, if not already done, prepare trenches for runner beans, peas and sweet peas. Put a good layer of manure or compost plus grass cuttings and vegetable peelings in the bottom and leave open to the elements until nearer planting time.

- *If you have potted up strawberry plants grown from runners last year they can be planted this month.
- *Mixed salad leaves and beetroot can be sown in cell or seed trays, even if you do not have a dedicated vegetable patch. Plant the seedlings in the flower border to add some interesting colour and then eat them when they mature.
- *Plant onions, shallots and early potatoes at the end of March
- *This month is the start of the breeding season for our garden birds. If you have any waste wool, hair from brushes (your own or the dog), hang it on the branches of shrubs or wire fences.
- *If you have a pond, remove debris that has got in it during the winter.
- *Consider letting a small area of your garden go wild. No Mow May is now popular. Should you wish to sow wild flower seeds, it may help to get them established if you shave off the grass to expose bare soil. Mix the seed with sand or sieved soil and scatter over the desired area. Keep the area moist by misting if no rain falls. Don't spray as the seeds will be washed to where you don't want them.
- *Keep bird tables and water baths clean.







Little Birch Pantomime" The Show Must Go On"

After the enforced Covid 19 break, director Jane Bolam returned to the village hall with a traditional pantomime based on the story of Sleeping Beauty. The three performances on January 20 and 21st were greatly appreciated by the audiences, judging by their very active participation, and completely sold out. Pantomimes have been a regular feature at Little Birch since the hall opened in the 1950s. Quality improved each year and this one can be regarded as the **best ever.**

Between performances the hall heaters were declared unsafe and there was an electrical power failure. Undaunted, the cast and crew completed the shows with the usual "the show must go on" attitude. Actors in the shows were excellent and even outstanding—including newcomers, talented Sarah and Rhiannon Jenkins, who played Fairy Peaceful and Princess Aurora. Stalwarts included Bob Barnett as the irrepressible Queen Dorothy and Richard Green as Silly Billy. The use of a provocatively placed cowbell by Richard produced hoots of laughter from the audience that will long be remembered.

Millie Barnett was convincing as Prince Orlando and Frank Ryding was frightening as the baddie, Carabosse. His nasty cat, Spindleshanks, was really well played by Ellen Green. Audiences especially loved the portrayal by the young Millie Meredith as the good cat Kitty. The chorus was made up of enthusiastic young and older people who doubled up as zombies in a spectacular scene.

No show of this kind is possible without a crew behind the scenes. The scenery and smooth performances were testaments to the people involved in set design, lighting, sound, costumes, make-up, scene shifting and prompting - all done to very high standards.

Little Birch village hall is extremely fortunate to be able to frequently stage such shows. Regular performers get a lot of pleasure from socialising and rehearsing in the weeks beforehand and it is good to see how young people develop their characters as they join in. None of this would be possible without the work and enthusiasm of the director who was first attracted to take part in a pantomime more than ten years ago and then settled in the village.

The show this year will probably be remembered as the "Covid Pantomime" firstly because it came after the national epidemic but secondly because the virus seems to have spread again amongst the cast, crew and audience. Fortunately the symptoms do not appear to be as bad as they would have been earlier before the widespread vaccination programmes. Hopefully there will be no lasting effects and so we can all look forward to more performances by the Little Birch Drama Group.

Photo ID for Voting

At the local elections in May 2023 it will be necessary to have photo ID when voting. You can use a photo driving licence, passport, Blue Badge card or a free OAP bus pass. Alternatively you can apply for a free Voter ID Certificate online at Gov.uk.

Photo ID is controversial. It is expensive to set up and will probably disenfranchise the most disadvantaged and vulnerable. The argument that it will prevent fraud is implausible as voting fraud is very minimal in the UK. Electoral-reform.org.uk have a petition —

Voter ID: An Expensive Distraction - aimed at persuading the government to drop the photo ID plan.
