

The evening , including the bar (with an excellent barrel of 'Purity Gold') and delicious hot dogs, was ably organised by the Village Hall Committee who are to be thanked for providing this opportunity. A good time was had by all.

Film Show on October 9th

The History Group organised the screening of 'Wartime Secrets' and 'Chewing the Cud' to which at least 50 people came. Both films were of local interest.

'Wartime Secrets' was introduced by Maureen Beauchamp. Her father moved his factory, Baronia Metals, from London to Hereford after being bombed during WWII. The factory produced fuel valves for Spitfires and Hurricanes so everything was very 'hush-hush'. This archive film showed the workforce at work and play and was an excellent period piece.

'Chewing the Cud' was about Hereford Cattle Market and featured photos and film from all periods including interviews with many people involved in the market. There were very old photos of animals in town streets and then of the purpose built market at various stages in its development. Of interest were the tree-covered pens and sale rings and also railway lines coming right to the However animals were seen being driven along roads and streets even until the 1970s. New sheds shown were built in the 1950s and 60s then all was swept away for the new retail market. The relocated out-of-town market also Interviews caused much interest as people were reminded of many things and recognised some of the people being interviewed, including Gerald Skyrme.

In the interval an excellent 'Ploughman's' spread was provided by the Village Hall Committee.

Several residents have under gone surgery recently and it is good to hear that **Selby Lloyd** and **Margaret Blythe** have now returned home and we wish them both and any others, a speedy recovery.

As reported last month, **Jean Mason** sadly died in the County Hospital on 13th September, aged 88 years. Jean was brought up with 5 brothers and a sister in Stourbridge, West Midlands. This was a difficult time for large families as in the 1920's Depression, money was very scarce and families had to 'make do and mend' and clothes were usually handed down to younger children. It was an outlook which Jean never lost and constantly reminded all the family and friends that 'They never threw anything away'. In fact, the family described her as a real 'hoarder'.

Jean was married to Dennis and came to live in King's Thorn with their 2 sons, Jonathan and Stephen some 50 years ago and Sarah was born a few years later. They placed a huge emphasis on family life and surrounded the children with so much love that none of them were in a hurry to leave home. Finally, partners came along and pastures new beckoned and one by one they left 'Burcot' to start new lives.

Jean was a very sociable person and would engage in conversation with anyone she met and many a friendship was forged in this way. She loved cooking and caring for people and many visitors over the years and insisted that a piece of homemade cake and cup of tea were enjoyed before they departed. Dennis and Jean looked after their neighbours who were poorly for over 10 years, taking them a hot meal every day and making sure they were comfortable.

Other friends in King's Thorn were treated in the same way when they were ill or could not cook for themselves. Christmas time was special and year on year, Jean made mince pies and over time,

some 8 or 9 thousand were cooked and distributed to residents in the community. Dennis and Jean also delivered Meals on Wheels for over 10 years.

They also loved to cycle around the area and often finished at Lock's Garage for an ice cream. When Jean found cycling uphill was becoming too much, Dennis fixed her up with a motorised assist unit.

After the death of a close friend, Jean worked with **Jean Wylor-Owen** in St. Michaels Hospice shop as a volunteer for over 25 years which was recognised by the charity with an article in the Hereford Times. She also did a 'sponsored slim' and raised over £1800 for the Hospice.

Jean worked as a school dinner lady and later as a playground watcher at Much Birch School with Margaret, Jean, Shirley and Beryl for some 20 years or so, a job she thoroughly enjoyed as she befriended many children who then remained in contact as they grew up. Many of them in turn had their own children who came to the School and so Jean befriended another generation.

As many will know, another of Jean's hobbies was shopping and she would walk from one end of Hereford to find the best price for a particular item. When she could no longer catch a bus, Carmaine took her to town on Saturdays and later, Derek and Kath took her on Wednesdays,

When Dennis became ill, Jean looked after his every need with the utmost care and was most upset when her arthritis became so severe that she could no longer cope and he moved into Charnwood.

She visited him there on most days. After 63 years of happy marriage, Dennis died about 3 years ago and Jean was devastated, talked about him every day and looked forward to the time when they would be re-united. Both had a strong Christian faith and firmly believed in life after death and this supported them through testing times in their lives. They regularly attended Church and were very sad when deteriorating health forced them to give up, but Jean never missed 'Songs of Praise'!

Jean's passing leaves all who knew and loved her with sadness but also a legacy of lifetime community spirit, truly a hard act to follow.

The doctors and nurses gave Jean the utmost care over the last few years and donations in memory of Jean were divided between the Surgery and Much Birch Church.

There was a reminder to all to remember to clear up hedge trimmings after cutting the hedges as trimmings can lead to blocked gullies, drains and ditches and this can in turn exacerbate flooding issues.

Much Birch Community Hall The 100 Club celebrates its 10th year in 2015

As Chairman of the Much Birch Community Hall Management Committee, I would like to thank those who have supported the monthly lottery over the last ten years. It has helped us greatly to develop and maintain the venue for use by the residents of Much Birch and surrounding areas, we are therefore proposing to continue to run the lottery during 2015 and are looking for support once again to further our work. We are seeking continued support from existing members but would also very much welcome new members to assist with our efforts.

We have so far, with the community's help in previous years, improved the car parking facilities, replaced the heating system, provided an

additional meeting room, installed double glazing, upgraded insulation to the roof space and walls, installed access ramps, provided new window blinds and most recently installed solar panels. We are now at the point where we need to upgrade the cloakroom and disabled facilities to meet present day standards and to improve the kitchen. At the same time it is opportune to improve the lobby area and to provide a further meeting room/office. This project, which will further contribute to the needs of the community, is in the planning stage and will require funds to be raised.

As in previous years the scheme is that twelve pounds purchases a single entry into the draw each month. Entries for more than one per month require a further twelve pounds for each additional entry. In recognition of the support given to the 100 Club for the last ten years as a fundraiser, we have decided to allocate A THIRD PRIZE EACH MONTH TO CELEBRATE THE ANNIVERSARY.

Another in a series on Local Castles by John Kinross writes

We all know Kilpeck Church with its wonderful

carvings both outside and inside but few scramble up the motte and bailey to the castle next door, which still has two large wall fragments, which were excavated in 1997 (see Shoesmith, 2009 for details.) In Domesday Book, Kilpeck is the property of William Fitz Norman. The castle was in existence by 1124 and William's son Hugh, calling himself 'de Kilpeck' probably rebuilt the castle in stone. He had a chapel in the castle which he gave with the church to St. Peter's Monastery in Gloucester. His son Henry was fined by King Stephen for trespassing in Haywood Forest, a royal property. Henry died in 1204 leaving a son under age and a widow, Juliana. She gave King John a palfrey and 50 marks so she could now marry whom she chose. Alas, the King chose William Fitz Warren for her as a second husband and William de Cantilupe, her son's ward, looked after the castle. Hugh, when attaining his majority, became custodian of the Royal Forests of Herefordshire. He left two daughters, Isabella who married William de Walerund, a supporter of King Henry III and now the castle owner. The eldest, Joan, married Philip Marmion, hereditary champion of England. Robert, Isabella's son, left the castle to his nephew, Alan de Plokenet (also spelt Plugenet) a competent soldier, who managed to cultivate part of Haywood Forest, hence the name Alansmore (Allensmore) which we know today as a parish. De Plugenet also obtained an advowson of the grant of Lugwardine and the chapels of Hentland, St. Weonards, Llangarron and Little Dewchurch. Alan's son, another Alan, obtained a charter for a weekly market and annual fair at Kilpeck (perhaps the two wrestlers church sculpture and other fair-like images date from this period.)The castle then passed to the Earls of Ormonde, devout Lancastrians. The fifth Earl was captured at Towton (1467) and beheaded. King Edward IV then granted the castle to Sir William Herbert, Earl of Pembroke, who was captured at Edgecote (1469) and beheaded by the Duke of Clarence. The castle then passed to the sixth Earl, who died en route to Jerusalem and after passing to the Boleyn family, one of whom married James St. Leger, it passed to the Pyes of the Mynde in Much Dewchurch. Sir William Pye, a Royalist, garrisoned the castle for the King but he became an hostage when Col. Birch captured Hereford, so the castle was slighted and the owners of the Mynde exchanged it for some other property with the Clive family in 1859.
