# John Herbert Bryant BSc BEM 1933-2021

The well attended funeral and thanksgiving for the life of John took place at St Mary's church Little Birch Church on 7th October. It was taken by the Very Reverend Robert Willis Dean of Canterbury and included tributes relating to his upbringing, education, military service, working life and his outstanding dedication to Little Birch and Kingsthorne. John grew up on the outskirts of Bristol and with his sister Mollie attended the Baptist chapel and school at the nearby village of Hanham. With his Mother and sister, he was evacuated to Fownhope for two years, during world war two, where he attended the one-room school. Later he continued his schooling at Kingsfield grammar school. After leaving school John studied at Reading university where he gained a Bachelor of Science degree in Horticulture. He then spent two years doing national service, which was compulsory at the time. His degree qualified him to become an army officer and he was appointed teacher in Maths and English to troops in Germany.

Following national service, John gained employment as Technical Manager with the Murphy Chemical Company, Wheathampstead, near St Albans, Hertfordshire. It was here that he met Betty who was working as a secretary. They married at Edburton Church, Sussex in 1967. John did not enjoy the office based job and so moved within the company to a position that involved travelling around the country advising farmers, especially soft fruit growers. John was well respected in the industry and by growers, which meant they were happy to be involved in trials of new products.

John and Betty moved to Little Birch in the 1970s. John continued his work but they both soon became involved in village activities. At that time the village hall, built in 1951, was disused so John, with others, applied himself to it's re-opening which happened in 1977. The hall was registered as a charity and John and Betty are named in the Declaration and Trust deed as trustees. The charity document has stood the test of time because it is still used as the constitution for management of the hall. The hall has been run successfully ever since. John was active in both the administration and social activities Many photographs exist of John and Betty in the hall including one of a very smart looking John in a straw boater playing a part in a musical show looking very much like Maurice Chevalier.

When he gave up chairmanship of the hall committee in 2018 to live in full-time care at Holmer he left it in a sound financial position with a capable management committee. An apple tree selected by John and plaque were placed on the parish field in appreciation of his work. Many will always regard Little Birch village hall as a monument to him.

John had a huge influence on the content and production of the Birches and Aconbury newsletter that started in 1977 and has appeared monthly ever since. He posted most of the obituaries, often with previously unknown and interesting details of their lives as well as information about church services.

He - with a little help - personally made paper copies and arranged circulation to homes around Little Birch, Much Birch and Aconbury for many years. When new people moved into the area John paid them a welcoming visit and gave them a copy of the latest newsletter. Nobody asked him to do this. He did it because he thought it the right thing to do.

During this time John and Betty also ran the Kingsthorne Post Office and shop for several years. John joined with village friends to play bowls at Wormelow and the St Martins club in Hereford. He also managed a strawberry field whilst continuing his organising and involvement in numerous other village activities, being a churchwarden and helping with most funerals, making regular contributions, including a gardening column to the church magazine, the Wormelow Hundred, chairmanship of the gardening club and organising the very successful annual horticultural shows.

He was chairman of the local history group and wrote the chapter on churches, chapels and schools in the 2006 book *Little Birch on Aconbury Hill* and the Millennium project in 2000 for which almost all homes and residents were photographed (the prints were collated and deposited in the Hereford records office. Digital copies are also available) and the two day celebration for the Queen's diamond jubilee in 2012 that attracted a crowd thought to be the largest ever assembled in the village.

Following all this work for community benefit it was really good news when John was awarded a British Empire Medal in the 2013 Queens new years honours list. The medal ceremony was performed by the then Lord Lieutenant of Herefordshire, Lady Darnley, in a packed village hall. It was a proud but emotional event for John and he modestly displayed the medal pinned to his immaculate blazer. Photographs taken at the event are framed and hung on a wall in the village hall. It must have been the only event of it's kind ever to be held in the hall's 70 year history.

As a final tribute, these are extracts from some of the messages posted on Facebook by local residents.

.... he was a giant of our community and a very great man indeed....

John's life was all about service to the community, and service to everyone

John was a truly wonderful and faithful servant to us all...

Knowing John for the short time I did, was a privilege.

He was a remarkable man the likes of which we rarely see.

He did so much to make this parish such a special place.

John, farewell and thank you for everything.

We will miss you more than words could ever begin to describe.

## **Update from Herefordshire Advanced Drivers**

Despite the relatively warm temperatures and limited rain for much of September and the first half of October, the reduced hours of daylight have signalled the impending change in seasons. Leaf fall, reduced until now by the lack of cold weather is beginning to take place in earnest and combined with heavy rainfall is causing slippery road surfaces. Other hazards include flooding, strong winds, dark days and low sunshine which can be blinding. There is also the likelihood of frost and ice in the near future.

Anticipation, concentration and constantly checking the road ahead and behind are vital. Windscreens and side windows, mirrors and covers of lights should be kept clean to ensure good visibility. Additionally, windscreen wipers should be checked frequently to ensure they are operating effectively. Vehicle lights should be switched on when visibility is low and drivers should look out for walkers, cyclists and other road users as well as animals. Equally important is to ensure cars are serviced in accordance with manufacturer's schedules together with regular checks of tyres and their pressures, lightbulbs, battery charge, engine oil and other liquids.

We have continued to concentrate on mentoring those who had started the Advanced Driving Course before the lockdowns and good progress has been made with many test passes. We are now finalising our programme for 2022 and we are planning Driver Refresher Days spread across the county together with continuing recruitment and mentoring for the Advanced Driver Course. It is worthwhile emphasising that the aim of the Course is to make candidates safer drivers for the benefit of themselves and other road users.



### Jobs for the Garden in November

You have probably been enjoying the fruits (and vegetables) of your labours during the last couple of months together with all your flowers, and wondering how much taller all your plants and hedges are going to grow. Vegetables seem to have done well although talking to numerous growers it appears that there are big variations in the crops of onions and tomatoes. Now for November.

### Plant Tulip bulbs.

Rake up leaves or use your mower. Either compost them or if you have a large quantity compress into empty compost bag(s), tie up the top and puncture the bag. Set aside for a year or so and you will have some good leaf mould.

Raise containers off the ground to prevent water logging – use bricks, wooden batons or commercially manufactured 'feet'.

Take care not to over water plants outside, in the greenhouse and indoors. Look over house plants and move to a lighter position.

Check greenhouse heaters, if used. An electric fan heater has the advantage of keeping the air moving which can help to reduce fungal disease.

Bubble wrap the interior of the greenhouse at the end of this month to insulate – despite climate change we can still get some very cold nights.

Empty fuel from mowers and other power tools (if you think you aren't going to use them again until Spring).

Prune grapevine after leaf fall but in any case by the end of December.

Earth up carrots, parsnips and beet (mini version of potatoes) if over wintering in the garden. Still time to sow broad beans (Aquadulse variety) in sheltered gardens. Be prepared protect young plants if a period of frost and/or snow is forecast.

Net sprouts, kale, cabbage and cauliflower to keep pigeons off them.

Check stored fruit throwing out rotting items on the ground outside for the birds. Likewise, check for, and discard rotting potatoes.

Garlic needs a chilling period so plant now. However if you have wet/heavy soil start growth in seed trays or modules, keep in a cold frame and plant out in Spring.

If you still have a few tomatoes on their vines, pick them, no matter what colour and ripen them indoors or make chutney with the green ones.

Clean out nest boxes and rehang. Put a bit of straw or hay in the bottom of the box.

Check bonfires have no hibernating wildlife in them before lighting.

We are being encouraged not to be too tidy in our gardens these days so leave a pile of sticks, stones or other debris here and there – it does not have to be a 'mountain' – for small creatures to hibernate.

Clean bird baths and feeders and replenish.

Remove fallen leaves from ponds and thin oxygenating plants. It may be advantageous to remove pump if there is one, overhaul it and store in the shed.





I was so glad to be there and just revel in that moment, truly a moment of inspiration!
