#### Jobs for the garden in November

It is time for the autumn clear-up. Hedges have been cut and all the decaying vegetation cut off, collected and put on the compost heap. A week or so ago we had a couple of slight frosts and that has resulted in the leaves rapidly changing colour and dropping off the trees. Misty mornings are with us (or hop pickers mornings as I remember them being called years ago).

I hope you have all been able to cope with the huge crops of fruit, particularly apples. I have a feeling there are going to be a lot of apple pies and crumbles with custard eaten over the next few months – ahh what bliss!

#### Now for November jobs:

- Plant Tulip bulbs.
- Rake up leaves or use your mower. Either compost them or if you have a large quantity compress into empty compost bag(s), tie up the top and puncture the bag. Set aside for a year or so and you will have some good leafmould.
- Raise containers off the ground to prevent water logging – use bricks, wooden batons or commercially manufactured 'feet'.
- Take care not to over water plants outside, in the greenhouse and indoors. Look over house plants and move to a lighter position.
- Check greenhouse heaters, if used. An electric fan heater has the advantage of keeping the air moving which can help to reduce fungal disease. \*Bubble wrap the interior of the greenhouse at the end of this month to insulate. If you do not have a heater, invest in some horticultural fleece to wrap around tender plants.
- Empty fuel from mowers and other power tools (if you aren't using them again until spring). \*Plant bare root roses, winter bedding &new turf.
- Cut some small branches of holly (with berries), for the festive season, and put in a bucket of water in a shed or greenhouse. The redwings and fieldfares will soon be ar riving and will clear the berries off trees in no time!
- Check bonfires for wildlife before lighting them. \*Prune grapevine after leaf fall but in any case by the end of December.
- Earth up carrots, parsnips and beet (mini version of potatoes) if over wintering in the garden.
- Prune grapevine after leaf fall/by end December
- Earth up carrots, parsnips and beet.
- Plant new rhubarb crowns and divisions.
- Net sprouts, kale, cabbage, cauliflower to keep pigeons off them.
- Check stored fruit throwing out rotting items on the ground outside for the birds. Likewise, check for and discard rotting potatoes.
- Clean out nest boxes and rehang. Put a bit of straw or hay in the bottom of the box.

Plant bare-root raspberries now until March. Dig a
wide trench, add plenty of compost or manure and
include some slow release fertilizer. Spread the roots
out horizon tally when planting canes, cover, tread in
lightly and water. Cut canes to within a few cms. of the
soil surface. \*If you still have a few tomatoes on their
vines, pick them, no matter what colour and ripen
them indoors or make chutney with the green ones.

We are being encouraged not to be too tidy in our gardens these days so leave a pile of sticks, stones or other debris here and there – it does not have to be a 'mountain' – for small creatures to hibernate. Clean bird baths and feeders and replenish.

Remove fallen leaves from ponds and thin oxygenating plants. It may be advantageous to remove pump if there is one, overhaul it and store in the shed.

# Remember, remember the 5<sup>th</sup> of November

Hi Everyone,



November sees two pivotal events remembered, both involve sacrifice and violence. First we have the plot to kill King James 1st in 1605 by blowing up the Houses of Parliament. Guy Fawkes and co-conspirators thought England was too Protestant and needed a revolt to restore the Catholic faith. The idea was to kill James 1st and bring back a Catholic monarch. It failed due to damp gunpowder and Guy was caught bringing gunpowder into the cellar. This wasn't the last assassination attempt on the Monarch, but was probably the last done for religious rather than political reasons.

Secondly, we have Remembrance Sunday, focussed, not on destruction, but on hope for the future. The Armistice at 11am on 11th November 1918 was a cessation of violence; it wasn't a peace. The peace treaty came later, and we all know where that led us! Remembrance, ironically, is about looking forward, about remembering all who gave their lives in conflicts, recent and not so recent. It is a call to build a better world and we do well to harken to that call.

#### The Masons of Merrivale



It's months since I've done an update on the farm but that's because the summer has caused trouble and I couldn't sound cheerful. You will all know from your lawns that it's changed now & we are green again. Spring started well, the weather was lovely and the cows went out to graze in late March. As far as I can tell from photos on my phone, it only rained substantially 4 times from then until early September. We took a grass silage cut in late May & early July, together with a cut of whole crop peas & barley. The whole crop yielded well, unlike the grass due to the dry weather. We under sow the whole crop with herbal leys (a mix of grasses, clovers, chicory & plantain) to take a late cut of silage in September. However, the under sown grass didn't survive the dry weather so we had to get contractors in to direct drill grass back into the leys in August. We panicked a bit after, waiting for some rain, it did come, along with a big sigh of relief as the grass grew. As we are short of grass silage, we have been buying in artic loads from Devon and hay from South Wales. It takes guite a bit of effort for us to source Organically Certified feed but fortunately we've made some good contacts and they've really helped us out this year. This is something not all Organic Farms have been able to do, which has led to them having to apply to the Government Department for Environment Food & Rural Affairs for derogations allowing them to feed non Organic Forage. Alongside the silage crops, we also grow wheat and fodder beet to put in the cows winter diet. Not only do different food stuffs add nutritional value to the diet, they also spread the risk of what we grow. The 26 acres of winter wheat yielded really well, due I think to an application of cow slurry in April. Once harvested, the field had another application of slurry & was direct drilled with stubble turnips. They now look fantastic & the cows are going to have the first taste of them tomorrow. The cows will be housed for winter in a couple of weeks, at which point we will turn the youngstock onto them for the winter. We don't usually outwinter stock, but due to the lack of winter forage, this year it will have to happen. We have of course got lots of grass now and have just taken a final silage cut from 200+ acres. This, along with more deliveries from Devon should provide enough food until the spring. With all cattle outside it's still helping, with the shortage of both winter forage and straw bedding for this year. The vegetables suffered as well of course. The spring planted brassicas produced very little. Onions are 1/3 of our normal harvest. The last plantings in July have survived after two sessions of watering & then plenty of rain. The aphids are having a good go at them though and even the loveliness of ladybirds can't make an impression on them. There is always something!

I hope I've ended on a more optimistic note. I don't suppose I will write again before early spring so it just leave me to wish you all a Happy Christmas & peaceful New Year. Sue
